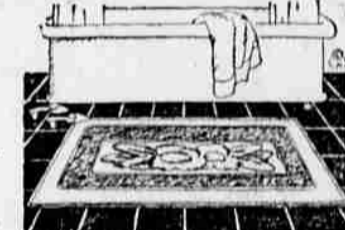

Moor to be Taken To California to Answer to Charge
SALEM, Ore., May 14.—California authorities at Sacramento will take immediate steps to have C. E. Moor removed from the Oregon penitentiary and taken to Sacramento to be tried for the murder of Harry Brown in that City September 18, 1923, says a letter received by Warden Dalrymple today from Bernard McShane, chief of police at Sacramento.

The letter from Chief McShane, which encloses a statement from Miss Florence Price, who was with Brown at the time he was killed, tends to corroborate the confession signed by Moor and his wife at the Oregon prison on May 1. Her story of the crime and also her description of the slayer tallies with the Moor confession and with his physical appearance.

Moor was sent here from Lane county for the theft of an auto.
