

COMMISSION TO RECEIVE BIDS ON MANY PROJECTS

SALEM, Ore., May 14.—Bids on highway and bridge construction projects in about a dozen counties will be opened by the state highway commission at a meeting in Portland on Thursday and Friday May 20 and 21. The projects are:

- Bids to be received May 20: Curry county—Gold Beach-Hunter creek section of the Roosevelt coast highway 2.5 miles of grading and surfacing.
- Douglas county—Approaches to the Oakland bridge and overcrossing on the Pacific highway .42 mile of grading and surfacing.
- Lane county—Hendricks bridge section of the McKenzie highway .78 mile of grading and surfacing.
- Linn county—Otter Rock-Norport section of the Roosevelt coast highway 8.5 miles of surfacing.
- Siletz Bay section of the Roosevelt coast highway .67 mile of embankment construction across the tide flats.

Malheur county—Bum creek-Cov valley section of John Day highway, 29.28 miles of grading to be let in two units.

Tillamook county—Hobsonville-Wilson river section of Roosevelt coast highway, 6.7 miles of resurfacing.

Hay City section of Roosevelt coast highway, .24 mile of grading.

Josephine county—Nine concrete box culverts, a small concrete bridge, and one 180-foot steel span with trestle approaches on the Redwood and Oregon Caves highways near Kerby.

Wasco county—A crossing of the O. W. R. & N. tracks at Moscham. Bids to be received May 20.

Cook county—The furnishing of 9,000 cubic yards of broken stone for maintenance work on the Cook Bay-Roseburg highway.

Curry county—Cheto river-California line section of Roosevelt coast highway 5.85 miles of grading and surfacing.

Josephine county—Redwood Junction-Wells ranch section of Oregon Caves highway 4.82 miles of grading.

Tillamook county—Brighton-Jetty creek section of Roosevelt coast highway, one mile of surfacing.

Washington county—Jackson bottom section of Hillsboro-Laurel market road, 1.62 miles of grading.

National Defense Muster Considered

WASHINGTON, May 14.—(AP)—A concerted movement was in progress today to have state executives place before President Coolidge their views regarding the proposed "national defense muster" on Armistice day.

The president before reaching a decision in the plan, drawn by a committee of reserve officers association and submitted by the war department, desires to know the attitude of governors. With a view to expediting the matter, appeals for prompt consideration were being sent to state capitals by the reserve, national guard, and veterans organizations.

Sale of Elk Horns Results in Fines

ROSEBURG, Ore., May 14.—Frank Gatens and C. H. Ridgeway, both of Reedsport, were fined \$250 each this morning following their arrest on a charge of selling elk horns. According to District Attorney Guy Gordon, the men are accused of having secured the horns from the herd ranging along the coast on the border between Douglas and Lane counties. He stated that they sold one set of horns to a game warden for \$25 and were placed under arrest for that offense. They entered a plea of guilty to the charge, when arraigned in the justice court in this city.

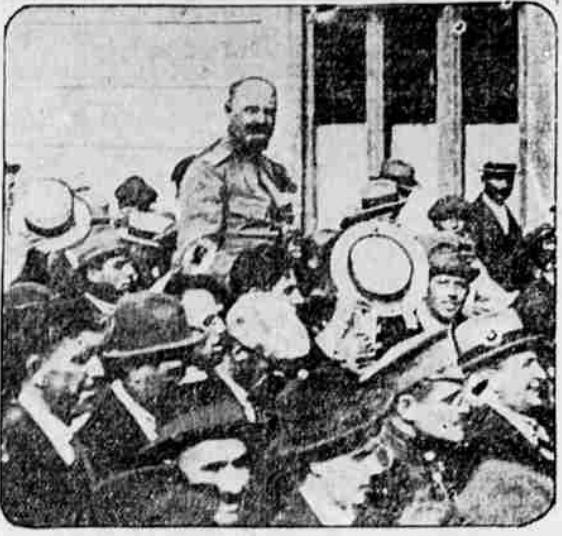

STANDARD WOOL BASIS IS SOUGHT

WASHINGTON, May 14.—An effort is being made by the department of agriculture to place the wool industry on a standardized basis through extension of standard grades for raw wool and development of methods of determining the grade of wool in yarns. A large volume of wool sold in the United States, the department's standards and preliminary investigation has demonstrated the possibility of determining the grade of wool in tops and yarns. "The official standards so far established," they said, "are based on diameter of fiber. The factors, such as length of the staple, spinning properties and shrinkage must be studied and if possible standards for them worked out. The support and approval of all branches of the industry will be sought in taking up these phases of the standardization work."

Charge of Attack On Baby Scouted

NEW YORK, May 14.—Charges that Agnes Tinsley, 18 months old, was held by the heels and dashed against a wall at a baby home conducted by Mrs. Helen Gissen-Volk have collapsed as a result of an autopsy which followed exhumation of the body. The attack occurred the day before the child died, according to the uncorroborated testimony of a nurse, but no signs of physical injury were found on the body yesterday. An autopsy is yet to be performed on the body of William Winter, one month old, who so died at the baby home and whose body also has been exhumed. Mrs. Volk is under arrest on a charge of baby substitution and violation of health code. Health department records have disclosed that 44 babies died at the two establishments maintained by her since January 1, 1918.

BARTHELMESS AND WIFE TO SEPARATE

NEW YORK, May 14.—Richard Barthelmess, motion picture star and his actress wife, Mary Hay, have agreed to separate, but only because their professional careers require that they work in different cities, it is stated.

Mrs. Hay, who in private life is Mary Hay Caldwell, daughter of Colonel Frank Merrill Caldwell, U. S. A., will leave soon for England to dance in music halls with Clifton Webb. Mr. Barthelmess will remain in New York making pictures.

A statement issued by Miss Hay says that neither party will seek a divorce and their two-year-old daughter will remain with Mr. Barthelmess, while the mother is abroad, after that spending six months at a time with each parent.

From Hollywood comes news that Bert Lytell and Claire Windsor screen stars, will be married at Jaurez today. Mr. Lytell was divorced last October from Evelyn Vaughn. Miss Windsor whose real name is Ola Kronk, was formerly the wife of William Doles.
