Shark's Teeth Found—Discovery of a shark's teeth in sandstone rocks brought into the geology laboratory from an old quarry near Monroe have convinced Don Zimmerman, 827 Eleventh avenue, that sharks were swimming around in the Monroe region about 2000 years ago. The specimens examined seemed unusually rich in fossils, and the first discovery was a cephalopod, a relative of the snail, but not like a clam in appearance. A cephalopod is a comparatively rare creature and dear to the heart of the geologist. Later Mr. Zimmerman thought he saw a bit of shark's tooth. He didn't follow up his finds at the quarry but mentioned them to a professor, who scouted the notion. Shark's teeth are extremely rare, and cephalopods had never been considered in the Monroe region. Later, after three hours hard work with a hammer Mr. Zimmerman found his cephalopod, and a shark's tooth, too. Later the rock disclosed more teeth and cephalopods and other fossils of the Eocene period.
