

SURVEY MADE OF CITY'S FINANCES

Income of the city of Eugene during the first quarter of 1932 was \$16,726 as compared with a total expenditure of \$44,248.50, showing a net operating deficit of \$27,522.50. It is shown by the analysis of income and expense compiled by Miss Grace Schibba, city accountant, for the first three months of this year.

Credited to the amount "in the red" however, are the 1924 taxes payable in 1925, of \$144,745.92, which gives the city a surplus increase of \$117,223.07.

Income items are classified as follows: Recorder's court fines, \$144,500; building permits and inspections—general, \$1,571; franchise taxes, \$740.44; rentals, buildings, \$412.50; auto park rentals, \$107; dog licenses, \$540; miscellaneous licenses and permits, \$700; milk inspections, \$94.50; paving cuts, \$410; sale of animals, \$109; departmental sales, outside work, \$428.81; interest on fund balances, \$396.92; sinking fund interest, \$254.94; interest and dividends, \$5123.92; pound fees, \$2.50; refund on lights, park department, \$21.80; refund on freight, street department, \$70.72; total, \$16,726.55.

Division of expenditures were: Administrative, \$4.25; attorney's office, \$524.75; recorder's office, \$1519.08; treasurer's office, \$889.79; engineer's office, \$1370.51; fire department, \$4,578.98; police department, \$2732.22; police matron, \$380.19; street and bridge department, \$9787.80; parks, general, \$952.63; auto park, \$400.05; health department, \$554; building inspector, \$455.95; city hall maintenance and operation, \$483.70; milk inspector, \$120; aviation field, \$100.73; city pound, \$155.37; sewer maintenance, and operation, \$699; engineering, \$48.60; interest paid on warrants, \$10,917.13; interest on bonded debt, general, \$401.50; emergency, \$991.48; election expense, \$206.40.

'Hassan' Scores on Opening Night at University Hall

In "Hassan," the remarkable and unusual drama written by James Elroy Flecker, a cross section of the oriental life of old Bagdad is presented with its intriguing mysteries, feuds, miseries and romance. The University company, with Fergus Reddie in the leading role, produced this play in a very excellent way last night at Guild hall.

The lines of the play are full of rhythmic beauty and sparkle with aphorisms which interpret the philosophic wisdom of the oriental mind. It was written by a man who had lived and dreamed for many years in Bagdad. Fergus Reddie in the role of Hassan, the confectioner of Bagdad, scored a great success. Hassan is a man of dual nature. At times he is the petty minded vendor of sweets but reveals his real life in an atmosphere of romance and poetry. While Mr. Reddie's acting stood out for its sure technique and rare interpretative power, many among the supporting cast surprised this first night audience with their enactment of roles calling for sympathetic understanding.

Gerda Brown as Yasmin, the beautiful, alluring captive woman, Terva Hubbard as Rafi, king of the harem, stood up to the full measure of their parts. However it was Claire Gibson who divided honors with Mr. Reddie in the role of Persaneh, beautiful slave girl exalted by a pure and sublime passion for the reckless and bold Rafi, who carries him with her to a feast of torture, who in the wild scene in shadowy harem is seen still moved by her deathless love. Miss Gibson sustained this role of exalted delicate passion without a break through several long scenes.

The stage setting was well designed and the costumes true to the period and the historic background.

"Hassan" will be repeated by the University company tonight and tomorrow night at Guild hall.

LUMBER BUSINESS EVEN FOR WEEK

One hundred and nineteen mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending May 9, manufactured 107,555,440 feet of lumber; sold 107,709,028 feet; and shipped 115,138,508 feet.

New business offsets production. Shipments were 7 per cent above new business.

Thirty-nine per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 42,231,307 feet, of which 31,040,882 feet was for domestic cargo delivery. This amounted to 42,231,307 feet, of which 31,040,882 feet was for domestic cargo delivery, and 11,190,425 feet export. New business by rail amounted to 1,940 cars.

Forty-one per cent of the lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 47,415,187 feet, of which 33,064,405 feet moved coastwise and intercoastal, and 14,350,782 feet export. Rail shipments totaled 2,058 cars.

Local auto and team deliveries totaled 5,981,721 feet.

Unfilled domestic cargo orders totaled 151,840,063 feet. Unfilled export orders, \$2,125,750 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders 5,392 cars.

In the first nineteen weeks of the year, production reported to West Coast Lumbermen's association has been 1,891,247,276 feet; new business 1,904,282,944 feet; and shipments 1,937,971,051.

Veterans' Bureau Announces Ruling

Cases of disabled veterans who receive ratings on mental disability bring up some difficult problems for the Veterans' bureau to solve, says Miss Grace Norton, Red Cross secretary, through whose office the majority of claims are forwarded.

One veteran who carried \$10,000 war risk insurance was given a total permanent rating on a mental disability. His relatives were unwilling to have a guardian appointed, and for that reason no insurance payments were made to him. Later the rating was reduced to a partial rating, and the veteran declared competent.

The question then arose as to whether he could collect the accrued insurance payments which had been withheld because there was no guardian to whom they could be paid. The decision was in the negative. The fact that the man became sane is held as evidence that the former permanent total rating was a mistake, and therefore was no justification for insurance payments.

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LOCAL MAN NAMED FOR ROAD MEETING

R. A. Booth of this city, former chairman of the state highway commission, has been selected as a member of the committee to attend a meeting at Gearhart, Oregon, June 12 and 13, at which delegates are expected from all commercial clubs along the coast to discuss the completion of the Roosevelt highway. The meeting is called for the purpose of urging the government to increase appropriations for this route.

Twenty-five or 30 others will be asked to join in the work as committees. Gearhart was chosen as the meeting place because at that point the first highway meetings were held that resulted in launching the movement that led to building the Columbia highway.

The Roosevelt highway is 404 miles in length and 25 per cent of it is within sight of the Pacific ocean. It has been the endeavor of the state highway commission to bend every effort to complete first the north and south ends, so as to provide two big loops.

Center Section Unfinished

The center section, from Yaquina bay to the Umpqua river, passing through Lane county, is unfinished for want of finances. This section will require more than \$4,000,000 to construct, exclusive of ferries or bridges. The commission wants to finish in 1926 all the highway from Marshfield to the California line, the big job being from Pistol river to the state line.

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MOTORIST TO TAKE TRIP OVER SUMMIT

Plans to cross the McKenzie pass from central Oregon to Eugene are being made by Charles Gratke, automobile editor of the Portland Oregonian, on his return from Prineville, where he will accompany the Oregon news reel camera man who will take a series of pictures in that district.

Special pictures that will be taken will be of a delegation of legionnaires of central Oregon, and also the Willamette valley if these hardy and venturesome veterans can be induced to take part, shoveling snow at the summit in order to open the pass for auto travel prior to the annual state legion session to be held at Prineville June 25 to 27.

The party will be on the summit Sunday, May 31, one mile above sea level. Whether the contemplated motor trip through the pass can be made is still problematical as reports from the upper reaches of the McKenzie are that the snow is still packed in huge drifts making impossible any traffic over the highway.

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
