

BALLOT TITLE OF CIGARETTE TAX REFERENDUM UP

SALEM, Ore., May 15.—On petition of C. C. Chapman, filed with the circuit court here yesterday afternoon, appealing from the ballot title prepared by Attorney General Van Winkle for the cigarette and tobacco tax referendum, Judge L. H. McMahon granted a temporary restraining order. Secretary of State Koser and the Oregon Retail Cigar Dealers' association, the defendants, are required to appear and show cause May 18, or earlier if an earlier date can be agreed upon.

Chapman alleges that the words "cigarette and tobacco tax bill" in the title should read cigarette, snuff and smoking tobacco stamp tax bill, and set forth reasons why he believes the title as prepared by Van Winkle is unfair.

The petitioner is upheld by the court and it is found necessary to alter the ballot title, all names so far signed to the petitions will be void, and it will be necessary to start the petitions in circulation again. Completed petitions must be filed on or before May 27.

The petition declares: That the ballot title provided by the attorney general for said law is insufficient and unfair in this: That it does not state that an appropriation is made for enforcement of said law and that it describes the said tax as an excise tax and does not state that it is a stamp tax law; that the words "excise tax" do not necessarily mean a stamp tax and do not convey the mind of the voters the knowledge that this is a stamp tax law. That the word "excise" is not a word in common use and not commonly understood while the word "stamp" is in common use to describe a tax and will clearly and instantly convey to all persons the character and method of levying and collecting this tax, and further said ballot title is insufficient in that it does not state that any penalty is provided for violation of said law and erroneously states the proceeds of said tax are part of the general fund of the state."

FOREST CAMP IS MOVIE SUBJECT

Moving pictures of the Oregon Agricultural college school of forestry camp will be taken by a camera man for The Oregonian news reel, who, accompanied by Preble Bailey, a writer for the newspaper, will leave for the camp at Big Fall creek this afternoon.

Lloyd Carter, junior forester, A. H. Wilcox, forest examiner, and O. F. Erickson, logging engineer, returned from the camp today, and C. R. Lockard, junior forester with the Cascade forest, will remain in the camp until it closes Sunday.

The forest students will stage a big celebration Saturday evening, and break camp Sunday, reports Mr. Wilcox. During their camp they will have cruised at least four sections of land, at least a 20 per cent cruise.

"One of the most important phases of this camp is that the young men are taught accurate methods of topographic mapping," says Mr. Wilcox. "The United States forest service will be able to use their data just as if it had been done by a timber survey crew. The plan as worked out by the forest service and the school is to take a large area where the students can camp and work each afternoon. The area will be big enough in the watershed to keep the school busy for six or eight years.

The whole valley is about 16 miles long and from seven to 12 miles wide. Stands of timber covered are in general very spotted but as the work progresses they will get into solid stands of timber.

"I think the boys are getting much more out of their camp this year than last. The big advantage of the present system lies in the fact that from now on they will know definitely where they will work from year to year, and just what they will do. It is the most practical training a forester can get. I wouldn't hesitate a minute to pick a crew from this group, and start work."

not recognize the distinguished soldier and it was some time before the news of his death became generally known. The performance of the circus proceeded.

Timber Sales for Quarter Reported

Timber totaling 3,346,000 board feet, and valued at \$6490 was cut on the Siuslaw national forest during the first quarter of 1925, according to reports announced today by R. S. Shelley, supervisor. Of this amount, 10,500,000 board feet were sold, for a total of \$2333.

During the three months included in the report 1075 pounds of cascara bark were also sold for \$53.75. Modified contracts previously reported as sold, but which will not now be sold, because of a change in plans include 10,500,000 board feet of cascara, valued at \$17,625, and 10,000 pounds of cascara bark worth \$510.

Anglers Licenses Rate has Changes

New laws on the prices of hunting and fishing licenses that go into effect May 28 have been listed at the office of R. S. Bryson, county clerk. A new flat rate for non-resident anglers licenses of \$3 has been provided. This is a change from the present law as non-resident anglers are charged the same as an Oregon resident would be charged in his respective state. The rate for non-resident hunters will remain at \$10. The rate for resident anglers remains at \$2 and for hunters \$3.

"No," when Bryan asked: "Then you don't believe in the bible?"

Evolution Denied.
Mr. Bryan declared that real science cannot conflict with religious teachings, but said that evolution is not truth. Its exponents, he asserted, are enemies of all religion, not only Christianity.

The question asked by Mr. Cassidy was: "Isn't it possible that there may be philosophy gained by evolutionary thinking which presents a worship and reverence for future generations as an ideal and looks toward the development of heaven upon earth through the use of science; and is not this ideal a fine and worthy one, capable of producing a not less noble standard of morality?"

BRYAN DENIES HISSES

BOSTON, May 15.—(AP)—Denial that he had heard any booing or hissing when the question period following his talk on science and religion was terminated at Brown university in Providence last night was made by William Jennings Bryan when he arrived here today. He declared that he had, for nearly an hour and a half been answering questions and that most of the audience had left owing to the late hour, when the incident occurred. He said that he had answered several questions put by his interrogator and that only when his questioner showed a disposition to present his own views and argue instead of asking questions did he offer to turn the meeting over to him.

Says He Was Liked.
"That dispatch illustrates," he said, "the unreliability of a newspaper report that picks out something sensational instead of reporting the truth. I spoke for two hours to a crowded house and the audience was very receptive. The applause was frequent and at the close continued until I rose and bowed my acknowledgments. I then took up questions that had been sent up and spent an hour and a half answering them."

Referring to the question which the student, George L. Cassidy had asked, Mr. Bryan said: "Finally, one man arose. He was

H. H. Long, chief clerk in the Siuslaw office, has returned from a trip to Mapleton, where he helped E. S. Kirby, district ranger, determine if the timber tract or not. A survey showed the land was right on the edge of the forest.

An unusually large section cut from a Douglas fir tree, 44 inches in diameter, was exhibited by Mr. Kirby in connection with American Forest Week. The tree was 60 years old, and the display stated that it came into existence the year Lincoln was assassinated.
