When a player throws a cap or glove at the ball it is necessary that the part of the paraffin ball thrown actually come into contact with the ball and what is the penalty attached?

The mere throwing of a cap or glove at a batted ball or thrown ball is no crime unless same comes into contact with the ball.

If the player misses the ball no attention is paid to the foul play, as on which nothing can be gained and much lost.

When the cap or glove actually comes into contact with the ball, the team in the field is subject to a stiff penalty, which varies according to whether it is a thrown or batted ball.

If it is a batted ball the batsman shall be entitled to three bases and all runners on the bases at the time score.

If it is a thrown ball the runner or runners shall be entitled to advance two bases.

Thus it is apparent that nothing is to be gained by throwing glove or cap at the ball and much can be lost. Yet it is not unusual for major league players puffed at the break of the game to do such a thing.

Just remember, the glove or cap must actually come into contact with the ball and the penalty on a batted ball is three bases; on a thrown ball, two bases.

Triple plays, no unrelated affairs, are more common now than was a case years ago. In the old days, a three-play killing was quite unusual. For it was only put over once a season or so.

Nowadays, however, a triple-play doesn't cause much more excitement than does a double play.

Last year there were 11 such plays turned in on major league diamonds. The American had six of them; the Red Sox leading the list with three. The Cardinals ranked next with a pair.

Three seasons back the American did even better, hanging on seven triple plays. This stands as the high mark for both leagues over a season's stretch.

Making a triple play, unassisted, is, of course, something else again. It's about the maximum effort in defensive work.

"Take nothing for granted in baseball," has long been a general slogan. It's an appropriate one, too.

For instance, consider the game played between the Giants and Phillies the other day.

Going into the ninth the McGraw team was on the wrong end of an 8 to 2 count. It looked all over but the well-known shouting. The tilt appeared to be in the old bag for the Phils.

But the Giants produced a sensational rally that netted nine runs, giving them the game, 11-8. In turning the trick, they pounded three Philly pitchers from the box, and made 11 hits, nine of them coming in succession.

"Take nothing for granted in baseball," is indeed a mighty good slogan to follow.
