

ONLY 12 LIQUOR SHIPS REMAIN ON ATLANTIC COAST

NEW YORK, May 15.—(By the Associated Press.)—A semi-official observation cruise over the Atlantic from Narragansett pier, R. I., to Atlantic City, N. J., which ended today, revealed only 12 rum carrying ships in that area, which provided anchorage for more than eighty rum vessels at the time the coast guard blockade was inaugurated May 5.

No Liquor Smuggled
It was further indicated on the cruise which took a party of newspaper correspondents to points between 30 and 40 miles from shore that virtually no contraband liquor is being smuggled into the country from this area.

As a result of the inspection, Lieutenant Commander Stephen S. Yeandle, chief aid to Rear Admiral F. C. Billard, coast guard commandant, announced that he considered the rum blockade in this area entirely successful.

NAVY TO KEEP OUT
WASHINGTON, May 15.—(By the Associated Press.)—There seems little prospect at present that the United States navy will be directed to take a hand in the campaign against the rum smugglers now operating off the east and west coasts. President Coolidge is of the opinion that the navy, the main of national defense, should not be required to police rum run. The coast guard, which has established a barrier of ships between the Atlantic and the Gulf of Mexico, and the user, should, the president feels, find its present appropriations sufficient for that purpose.

Many of those who signed the petition asking that the consolidation plan be put to a vote have withdrawn their names as it seems that considerable opposition to the movement has developed.

Covel and Peare Will be Hanged

SALEM, Ore., May 15.—Hope has been abandoned for executive clemency for Arthur Covel and L. W. Peare, who are sentenced to be hanged at the state penitentiary next Friday, the former for the murder of his sister-in-law, Mrs. Eliza Covel of Bandon, and the latter for the murder of his wife. Both are from Coos county. Covel is a helpless paralytic and Peare is an old man nearly 70. Governor Pierce has instructed Warden Dalrymple to prepare for the hanging and it is not believed the pleas now reaching the governor for clemency will be heeded.

PLANS TALKED FOR PLANT PROTECTION

To discuss possible steps that may be necessary to protect Lane county from the root knot nematode, a crop disease that has been prevalent in some parts of California recently, a meeting of the executive committee of the Lane County Horticultural society was held this morning at the office of O. S. Fletcher, Lane county agricultural agent. Several shipments of carrots from the south were recently intercepted here and orders not to unload the shipments were issued, according to C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector. Indications of the plant disease were found in Eugene recently, it is reported by the fruit inspector.

The committee of the horticultural society is composed of M. H. Harlow, George Jorris and C. E. Stewart. Plans and specifications for the improvement of the 78 miles of road approach to the proposed Hendricks bridge which will be erected this summer are at the office of Judge C. P. Barnard at the courthouse and are available for any local road contractor who desires to bid on the project, the judge announced today. As the work is in Lane county, comparatively close to this city, it is expected that a number of Lane contractors will submit bids to be opened at the meeting of the state highway commission at Portland May 28 and 29.

Oratorio Members Will be Banqueted

Members of the Eugene Oratorio society will be guests at a banquet to be held at the Oxburn hotel Monday evening, May 18, according to plans now under way. The organization tonight will close its second presentation of "The Creation" at the Methodist church. The success of the organization which was formed here early in the year has led to a discussion of plans as to the future program and objectives of the society and these will be discussed at the banquet, it is announced. It is expected that about 175 will attend the affair.

Petitions ask for New County Route

Petition for the establishment of a new county road near Coburg has been filed with the county court and the matter will be taken up at the meeting of July 1. It is announced. The petition requests a road 40 feet in width to provide route service for a number of residents now served. The road is described as from center of section 30, township 18 south, range 3 west, south one-half mile to quarter section corner, south side section 39, then east and south along property lines to the end of county road 329. The petition is signed by 39 residents of the area affected.

Examinations are Sent to Mr. Moore

Manuscripts from many of the Lane county school districts where the pupils yesterday and today had the eighth grade examinations, are arriving at the office of the county superintendent of schools where the grading will be done by the examining board starting next week, according to announcement today. It is expected that more than 6000 manuscripts will be turned in from the more than 1700 pupils that took the examinations. It will be two to three weeks before the results of the tests are made known.

PROGRAM OUT FOR STATE TRAPSHOOT

From 800 to 1000 persons are expected in Eugene for the thirteenth annual Oregon State Trap Shooting tournament May 29-31, and more than 250 of the best marksmen in the west will compete in the contests, it was announced today by W. W. McCormack, manager of the shoot, who made public the program of the week-end for the first time.

"Such world-renowned shooters as Frank Troch of Portland, who held the world championship for several years, and his brother, Jess Troch, will be here," said Mr. McCormack. Mark Richard of Corvallis, high gall man at the shoot last fall, and many others in Oregon and northwestern points will be here.

The tournament will be on the municipal aviation field, and will be under auspices of the Lane County Sportsmen's association. Four new Liggott traps in splendid shape will be used, and all shooters will have free access to the club house during the shoot.

By a new arrangement new shooters will have an equal chance with the experienced shooters. In this way persons will be able to shoot in competition against those in the same class as themselves. Amateur Trap shooting association rules and handicap system will be used, and squads will shoot in the order in which they are filed the day prior to the shoot.

Accommodations are in charge of Earl Simmons, president of the Lane County Sportsmen's association. First half of the Oregon state championship will be held in the afternoon of Friday, May 29, and the second half Sunday morning, May 31.

Pollenzation of Cherries is Best

"After inspecting the bumper yields on some of the cherry trees of Lane county where pollenzation has been practiced I am more than ever convinced of the success of this method," according to C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector today. "Some trees that I have inspected are bearing the largest crop ever recorded and this is due to expert cross pollenzation by the aid of bees," the fruit inspector states.

Mr. Stewart also reports that the loganberry crop of Lane will be a record one this year as the majority of the vines are showing a heavy yield of berries indicating the largest tonnage per acre in many years.

COUNCIL TO VOTE SELLING OF BONDS

Special meeting of the city council Monday night will consider, among other business, ordinances for the sale of city improvement bonds covering all paving and sidewalk work since the paving of Lincoln street from Seventh to Eleventh avenues, it is announced today by Judge George A. Gilmore, city recorder. Final reading of the ordinance establishing the proposed city planning commission will take place at this meeting. Several assessment levying ordinances have been prepared by the city attorney, but because the next meeting is not a regular session, they will have to wait until Monday, May 25.

The assessment ordinances are on the following projects:
Paving alley between Sixth and Seventh avenues from Willamette street to Oak street.
Paving Charnelton street from Eleventh to Thirteenth avenues and Thirteenth avenue from Charnelton to Lincoln streets.
Paving Thirteenth avenue west from Willamette street to Oak street.

Grading and graveling alley between Oak and Pearl street, from Fifteenth avenue to Sixteenth avenue.
Construction of sewer in that portion of South Willamette between Twenty-first and Twenty-fourth avenues and Willamette and Lincoln streets.

A number of referred matters, and special resolutions are up for consideration at the coming meeting, although up to a late hour this afternoon no petitions had been filed for action.
