

FRANCE HOLDS ALL BATTLE FRONT AND RIFFIANS ARE HELD

FEZ, French Morocco, May 19.—The latest reports from the front where the French are opposing the Riffian tribesmen under Abdel-Krim, characterize the situation as good along the entire line. Marshal Lyautier has returned to Rabat after a conference here with General Count de Chambrin, director of French operations.

Considerable activity is observed among the Riffians, indicating that Abdel-Krim is resolved to continue the invading movement, despite last week's setback in the Ribane region. General Colombat's column passing through Beni-Hell, has reached Hafnait without incident. In the center, the Anza and Ainleuh posts have again been violently attacked. The Riffians are reinforcing and strengthening their positions in the upper Ouzgha river valley and the Senhadja mountains.

To the east the Riffians continue to threaten the Breznes front. General Cambry's group is at Oued Almar.

Colonel Freydenberg's group is now established at Garabes Mezza. A report is current that Abdel-Krim is considering an offensive in the Spanish zone, to which he is reported to have sent ten mounted guns and reinforcements.

Fletcher, county agricultural agent, who took out the seed for the project yesterday. The seed is furnished free of charge by the marketing department of the Portland chamber of commerce. Mr. Fletcher still has two bushels of the flax seed, which he is willing to appertain to farmers who will agree to plant experimental plots of one-fourth an acre or larger.

Ships Rights Held Over Search Pact

GENEVA, May 19.—(AP)—The agreement to establish the right to search ships suspected of conveying arms improperly was today eliminated from the proposed convention of the international conference for the control of traffic in arms and munitions. The American delegation led the opposition to the amendment. The Geneva conference also voted today to abandon the proposed plan of a central board under the League of Nations to regulate traffic in arms and munitions. The American delegation had opposed such a board.

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 19.—Believed by relatives to have been dependent over a love affair, Grace Esther Alway, 14, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred T. Alway of Washougal, Wash., took her own life this morning, by shooting off the top of her head with a .25-bolt rifle, the coroner reported. Her body was found by a younger sister on a trail about 500 feet from her home.

The body was taken to Camas, and the coroner said he did not consider an inquest necessary.

The girl was known to have quarreled Sunday while at a picnic with Ray Strange, a young friend. About 7 o'clock and members of the family were unaware she had taken a rifle.

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BELGIUM TO START STEPS FOR REFUND

WASHINGTON, May 19.—(AP)—The first break in the tangle of inter-allied debts was seen by high government officials here today in the determination of Belgium to take independent steps in negotiating a refunding settlement with the United States. In official quarters the information conveyed from the Belgian foreign office was accepted as being highly significant since Belgium must be classed as one of the major debtors to whom the United States extended financial aid.

At the Belgian embassy it was said today Ambassador De Marchienne would sail for home June 9. The whole Belgian debt situation is expected to be taken up by him with his government at that time.

It was believed here that Belgium's plans had been held back somewhat by the recent ministerial crisis but Under Secretary Winston of the treasury observed on his recent visit to Brussels that the feeling was evident among the government leaders that definite moves toward laying out a debt paying program should be made.

The under secretary believed that with a balanced budget, such as has been accomplished, Belgium will take rapid strides toward a sound economic basis. The statement that Ambassador De Marchienne was sailing for Brussels is believed to indicate that the officials in Belgium now see a more or less clear economic sky and are ready to tie up their government to definite commitments.

Wife Dead After Attack With axe In Hands of Mate

SAN FRANCISCO, May 19.—(AP)—Chasing a series of family quarrels, Antonio Monteverde, 55, attacked his wife with an axe in their home last night, wounding her so severely that she died while being taken to a hospital. A son, Roberto, 18, summoned by his sister, Mary, 12, rushed to the mother's rescue and beat the father into unconsciousness.

Police officers reported finding a blood-stained axe in a closet in the bedroom. The police said Monteverde confessed killing his wife.

States Will Help On Land Campaign

SALEM, Ore., May 19.—Governor Pierce, in reply to a letter from Governor W. P. Hunt of Arizona joins in the campaign for the purpose of having the United States turn over to the states all the remaining public lands within the boundaries of states. Oregon has nearly 10,000,000 acres set aside, and it is the desire of the government to have these kept on the tax rolls and revenue diverted to the school funds. Sixty-one per cent of the land in Arizona is tied up in some manner by the government, either as Indian reservations, national forests, national parks or withdrawals.

The substitute committee appointed by congress will visit the western states to investigate federal parks, forests and public lands reserved and unreserved early in June and will remain until late August.

Twilight League Game Tomorrow

The twilight league baseball game between the police and the hardware and sporting goods stores teams was postponed last night on account of the heavy rain. The next game is scheduled for Wednesday night when the bankers are to play a picked nine. Games are held every Monday, Wednesday and Friday evening at six o'clock on St. Mary's field on south Willamette street, and any teams desiring can participate, it is announced.

Indian war Relics Found in Wisconsin

ANKOSH, Wis., May 19.—A lost message from Fort Howard in 1839 located on the present site of the city of Green Bay, has been found here by Carlton Steub.

Mr. Steub turned up a peculiar appearing stone while spading his garden. Apparently the stone, which is granite had been sealed together with clay. Twisting the two, the clay fell away, and a bit of paper was exposed, bearing this message:

"Fort Howard, February, 1830. Indian ammunition running low. (Signed) 'J. D. Commander.'"
From the size of the two bits of

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granite it is believed that the message was placed where found and given to an Indian runner to carry to the Fort Howard commander's superior officer and that the runner was either killed or captured at the present location of Oshkosh and rather than have his captors have the message, cast it from him and it remained untouched until Mr. Steub picked it up.

RECLAMATION MAY GET PLAN CHANGES

SPOKANE, Wash., May 19.—Development of federal reclamation projects already established should not be made to await establishment of a new federal reclamation policy, Representative Addison T. Smith, of Idaho, chairman of the house committee on irrigation and reclamation, declared here today.

He asserted that active state participation with the federal government in future reclamation development is almost certain to become a permanent policy.

"Once a new reclamation policy becomes a law," he said, "all new proposed projects should be considered and constructed individually and not as a group. Representative Smith who came to Spokane to confer with backers of the Columbia basin irrigation project, predicted that construction of the Columbia basin project is only a matter of time but said he was certain that it will be impossible to get a new project through unless the state actively cooperates with the federal government, and there is a small interest charge."

DAWES PLAN GIVEN TRIAL BY GERMANY

BERLIN, May 19.—(AP)—Foreign Minister Stresemann announced today to the Reichstag that the German government will continue to carry out the Dawes plan.

Minister Stresemann said no country welcomed more than Germany the efforts of the Dawes plan to accomplish the economic pacifications of Europe.

He said that even those who opposed the acceptance of the Dawes plan were convinced that without it Germany would not have been able to establish its currency on secure basis and would have been obliged to wage a bitter struggle for her economic existence.

Minister Stresemann said "we will continue to carry out the Dawes plan in the same manner as we have heretofore. Parliamentary majorities and governments may change but I can not conceive any administration which would depart from the program and policies we have adopted."

He said Germany's relations with the United States are most satisfactory and all signs indicate that in the United States a genuine understanding of Germany's needs is increasing.

OIL REFINERY PLANNED

THE HAGUE, May 19.—(AP)—The budget estimates of the Dutch colony of Curacao for 1925 are accompanied with an official memorial of projects designed to make Willemstad an important port. It is proposed to erect a month-old refinery on the Caribbean island and to make the port one of the largest fuel oil bases in the world.

Another "Super" CNRV are to be the call letters of a new high power broadcasting station being erected at Vancouver by the Canadian National Railways. It is expected to be ready for broadcasting by the end of May.

43 Dead, 27 Injured In Mine Disaster

DORSTFELD, Germany, May 18.—(AP)—The number of known dead in the mine explosion here Saturday has reached 43 with 27 injured.

The work of the trapped miners' comrades in recovering the bodies and rescuing the wounded constitutes one of the heroic pages in the mining history of this region. The approach to the victims was both difficult and dangerous. Oxygen apparatus could not be carried on the backs of the rescuers, but had to be dragged with difficulty through narrow passages. Many in the rescue expeditions were overcome by poisonous gases.
