

PARADE FEATURE OF MEMORIAL DAY

Every patriotic organization in the city is expected to take part in the memorial day exercises Saturday, May 30, announces George Love, in charge of the affair. All stores will be closed, and special exercises have been planned for the entire day.

A parade at 10 o'clock will be the first event of the day. The American legion, with the drum corps, will march in a body. The G. A. R. veterans will also take part, and each veteran of the Civil war will be accompanied by a boy scout. A luncheon will be served to all men of the Grand Army of the Republic at the armory at noon.

The boy scouts of Eugene are to have a prominent part during the day. Their first duty will be to urge all school children to bring flowers to school on Friday, May 29. Troops will be sent around to each school for these, as the ladies of the G. A. R. Women's Relief corps, and legion auxiliary will weave them into wreaths for the graves. The scouts will place these on the graves Memorial morning. The scouts will also act as marshals during the parade.

Services at Cemetery.

The line of the parade will lead to L. O. O. F. cemetery, where services for the soldier dead will be held. Judge Brown, of Salem, will be a speaker, and Daniel Woods, a Civil war veteran, will read Lincoln's Gettysburg address. Flowers will be put on all soldiers' graves, and an American flag placed on each. A luncheon will be served to all men of the Grand Army of the Republic at the armory at noon.

Cars Furnished for G. A. R.

Cars will be furnished for all Civil war veterans, it is announced. The services for the soldier dead, with Rev. C. E. Dunham in charge, will be held from the Ninth street bridge at three o'clock.

Flowers will be placed upon the water by various organizations.

Veterans' graves in cemeteries in and near Eugene have been tabulated as follows: L. O. O. F., 130 Civil war veterans, 33 World war veterans; Masonic, 20 Civil war veterans, five World war; Pleasant Hill, 20 Civil war, four World war; new I. O. O. F., three Civil war, one World war; Mulkey, four World war. In these cemeteries are the graves of 15 Spanish war veterans.

**SEVEN INDICTMENTS
RETURNED BY JURY**

A total of seven indictments against nine men now held in custody were returned by the grand jury yesterday, and the men were arraigned before Judge O. F. Skippworth this morning. Pitt Moore is accused in an indictment of obtaining money under false pretenses. The crime is alleged to have been committed March 20, when it is said he passed a bad check for \$15. H. J. Hand is charged in an indictment with a crime against nature, alleged to have been committed April 15. He has just served a term for contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

George Hval is also accused of obtaining money under false pretenses, it being charged that he passed a bad check for \$100 on October 4 here. Lewis Taylor was charged with uttering a forged check for \$15 on March 25. Frank Vanderpool, alias Frank Johnson, is also indicted on a bad check charge, it being claimed that he obtained \$20 March 28.

Tom Lloyd and L. J. Lloyd were indicted for burglary, alleged to have been committed at Cottage Grove on February 17. Felix Exposito and Angelo Messilene were indicted for larceny of an automobile owned by R. C. Stay of Eugene, April 19. They were arrested at Roseburg April 20.

**RESERVOIR PLANS
TO BE READY SOON**

Plans for the reservoir in Hendricks park, which will supply the Fairmount district with water, are nearly completed, announces C. A. McClain, superintendent of public utilities, and it is expected that bids will be called for in a week or 10 days. Construction work is expected to begin as soon as possible it is stated.

The reservoir in Fairmount will hold 100,000 gallons of water, which will be used principally to supply homes in Fairmount which are located too high to be efficiently served by water from the main storage bases.

Work on the new reservoir to replace the one now in use on Skinner's Butte is not expected to start until fall, said Mr. McClain. The old reservoir will have to be wrecked, and it is believed that it is better to have a new water possible on hand during the summer. The new tank will hold 300,000 gallons of water, which will increase the total storage capacity of the city to 600,000 gallons. The one on Skinner's now holds 250,000.

5000 water rights have been obtained for the new water project that will bring water from the McKenzie river to Eugene, but not all claims are settled yet, it is announced. No definite plans on the route or the way can be given out until all right of way is obtained. The project was recently authorized by the city at the regular election.

**EUGENE BOYS IN
MILITARY TOURNEY**

Four Eugene students of Oregon Agricultural college, Robert A. Jones, Harold A. Rowley, J. W. Thurston and Cecil Griggs, have a part in several of the 15 contests in the annual military tournament at Corvallis the evening of May 30, according to tournament officials who visited the city yesterday. Robert Jones will be in the infantry exhibition drill, and others have parts in the parade.

A large number of Eugene people are planning to take in the tournament this year, special rates being offered on all railroads. The night show battle has been displaced this year by an afternoon program of spectacular contests.

Military training for the students close for the year with the tournament, hence this annual event takes on the nature of a celebration as well as a military exhibition. Jones has trained one year in the infantry. He is a member of Kappa Psi fraternity and is a Beaver Knight. Rowley has trained four years in the cavalry unit, gaining the rank of captain. He is a member of Sigma Phi Sigma fraternity, and Beta Alpha Psi, professional accounting honorary. Thurston has trained four years in the field artillery unit. Griggs has trained four years in the infantry unit, gaining the rank of first lieutenant.

The opening event of the tournament will be an air service demonstration by army planes, aerial acrobatics, dropping an aerial smoke screen, and a 2000 foot parachute jump.

Special Memorial day exercises will follow in the college stadium after which the contests will be held. These include a mounted unit of war, skillful race, girls' musical ride, rifle drill, barrel fight, cavalry drill, Roman riding and jumping, infantry exhibition drill, jumping in pairs, machine gun race, polo pony stick bending contest, rifle squad relay race, mounted musical chairs, and an engineer and tank exhibition.
