

### RUM SHIPS REFUGE IN CANADIAN PORTS

NEW YORK, May 20.—(By the Associated Press)—Rum ships, driven from off American shores by the coast guard blockade are jamming Halifax harbor as one result of the determination of the administration from President Coolidge down to enforce prohibition to the limit.

Thirteen steamers and schooners are tied up at Halifax. Five arrived yesterday. They don't know where to turn. Some of them intend discharging their cargoes and returning to legitimate freight traffic.

The Halifax situation confirms statements in coast guard circles that rum row has virtually been cleaned up. One ship of a fleet of 50 rum ships remains. It is a German vessel, anchored forty miles off Sandy Hook.

The dry campaign, ashore and inland, continues apace. A fleet of armed craft is being mobilized at five bases on Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence river to cope with the expected deluge of liquor from Ontario, where 44 percent beer goes on sale Thursday.

### DEALERS HOLD TAX REFERENDUM SURE

Judge McMahon's decision that it meant that the cigarette tax referendum would go on the ballot. The cigar dealers obtained 18,000 signatures to the petitions, which must be filed before May 27.

C. C. Chapman, who attacked the bill, claimed it was void because it described the measure as the "cigarette and tobacco tax bill," and contended that the title should have been "cigarette, snuff, and smoking tobacco tax bill." Judge McMahon granted a temporary restraining order last Friday, when the suit was filed. Stating his reasons for attacking the referendum Mr. Chapman said today:

"I was fighting to uphold the cigarette tax because I believed that every legitimate effort should be made to protect the revenue of the state and I favored the cigarette tax because it falls with less severe burden upon the pocket books of the people than any other measure. Industries, property and necessities are carrying all the burdens they should carry and the tax on the cigarette is neither onerous nor does it strike industry, property nor necessities."

Chapman said that the situation now is that the measure will go to election and the fight will have to be made there.

### State Crop Data Hold Yields Fine

PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—(By the Associated Press)—Rye is ripening in Umatilla county and is being cut for green feed in the Willamette valley, says the weekly crop report, issued by the weather bureau here today. Seeding of spring wheat and oats continues in elevated districts, while in some western localities spring wheat is heading in most of the milder sections. Conditions have been mostly favorable for small grain. Planting of corn continues and early plantings are coming up well.

Prunes are good in some eastern localities, but are poor elsewhere, and are very poor in parts of the Willamette valley. Cherries are mostly poor. Pears are dropping heavily in southern Oregon. The set of apples is uneven. Strawberries are in market in increasing quantities.

There is little clover in some western sections, owing to unfavorable weather in 1924, and alfalfa in places shows much winter-killing. Some alfalfa has been cut. Vetch is doing well.

### Police Agent who Was Shot is Sued

PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—John E. ("Handsome Hans") Fagerlie, special police agent, who has been recovering from wounds received when shot recently in the course of a raid, was today made the defendant in a \$15,000 damage suit for alleged alienation of affections. Guy A. Allmon, longshoreman, filed the suit, charging the Fagerlie had paid attentions to his wife and that as a result she had obtained a divorce.

### WOMAN KILLS SON

SAN FRANCISCO, May 20.—Mrs. Norine Taubhauss, wife of a barber, killed her nine-year-old son Walter with an axe at their home here today and then swallowed poison, from the effects of which she is expected to die. She left a note indicating that slander had driven her to her act.

### BEER COMING BACK

TORONTO, May 20.—(By the Associated Press)—With haste and expectancy, the province of Ontario today completed preparations for the morrow when 4.4 percent beer may be dispensed in hotels under government license and supervision.

Hostelries rushed to complete their renovation of long neglected bar-rooms, moving out brass rails and bars to comply with regulations that the beverage may be served only at tables.

### Refund Debt Plan Agreement Urged

WASHINGTON, May 20.—At a conference with President Coolidge today B. F. Yoakum, retired capitalist, outlined a war debt settlement plan under which all debtor nations to the United States would enter into a common agreement for an international funding scheme resting on a long term basis.

He proposed that an arrangement be effected giving debtors one hundred years in which to repay the United States and each other for loans at two and one-half per cent interest per annum beginning two years after date of obligation.

The plan submitted by Mr. Yoakum, was transmitted by President Coolidge to the state department. The president had no opportunity to go into its merits in detail.

### Range Sheep Food Method is Faulty

WASHINGTON, May 20.—(By the Associated Press)—Faulty feeding methods, in the opinion of department of agriculture experts, form the sources of 75 per cent of the troubles affecting range sheep.

"Failure to diagnose properly much of the sheep sickness," a department statement said, "caused by digestive derangement has led sheep men to resort to medicines and vaccination as a way out of their difficulties. They have spent thousands of dollars for medicinal remedies when the real preventative was in proper feeding."

### PRINCE IS GREETED BY AFRICAN TRIBES

KING WILLIAMSTOWN, Union of South Africa, May 20.—(By the Associated Press)—Thousands of Kaffirs, garbed in fantastic combinations of native costume and improvised European dress, gathered here today from all the surrounding countries and hailed the Prince of Wales.

One Zulu in full fighting trim and with a war shield lashed to his back, smashed through the streets on a motorcycle to reach the prince's levee.

A Kaffir paraded the ground near the prince's headquarters attired in navy blue trousers, a black dinner suit waistcoat and a rough imitation of a tail coat made from wild cat skins.

The place of honor fronting the platform where the prince received addresses from the chiefs was occupied by an ancient Kaffir, dressed in a black bordered red blanket and a soft felt hat four sizes too small and covered with the accumulated dirt of many years.

The prince personally conducted the orchestra during one of the orders at a dance given in his honor here last night.

### Spy Serving Army Now Resides Here

NEW YORK, May 20.—The New York Times today says that Alvin Karpis, a German aviator, whose plane was shot down behind the American lines in the World war and who subsequently became a spy in the American service, has settled in a large city in this country under an assumed name and is becoming a man of affairs.

Alfred Scholtz, a lance corporal, also became a traitor to the German imperialistic cause. He and Grothe, viewed German prisoners and then turned the information over to the American army. Trace of him has been lost. He is said to have mapped the German batteries whereby the American artillery was able to silence the guns in the St. Mihiel drive.

### France Starts to Arrange her Debt

PARIS, May 20.—(By the Associated Press)—Premier Painleve, Foreign Minister Briand and Finance Minister Caillaux today held a conference to study the French financial situation, including the question of inter-allied debts, and the decisions which were arrived at, will be submitted to the next cabinet meeting for approval. The French position in Morocco also was discussed.
