**Benefit Baseball Game Is Planned**  
A benefit baseball game will be played between the teams of University high school and Eugene high school Saturday on the South Willamette diamond, for the purpose of raising funds to build a concrete gymnasium court at the rear of Eugene high school, it is announced today.

An appropriation of \$150 has been made by the school board for the court, which will be 35x50 feet in size and used for tennis, volleyball and other outdoor games, it is stated, with the provision that the students raise the balance needed, approximately \$200. The junior chamber of commerce at the school asked the local chamber of commerce for suggestions as to the means of raising the money, and it was decided to schedule the baseball game, and sell tickets among local merchants.

Part of the work will be done by the students themselves, in spare hours during the remainder of the school year.

**Boys use Dynamite For Celebration**  
The explosions that rocked the west side of Eugene about \$200 and again at nine o'clock last night were not spontaneous rumbles, nor desperate charges blowing up safes, but were merely a celebration being held by several young boys, reports William Johnson, chief of police. The young boys found several sticks of dynamite near the city reservoir in the College Street district, together with some fuse and caps, and they took this over to Eighteenth avenue and Jefferson where they proceeded to set it off in the big blasts.

The explosives were being used by the boys to blast out sewers. Several sticks were set off by the boys, but the officers beat them to it in the afternoon, before the celebration was scheduled for the same time tonight has been postponed indefinitely, it is announced. No action will be taken against the boys, although they have been warned that such practices are dangerous.

## TWO MEN RECEIVE PRISON SENTENCE

Two men were sentenced to the state penitentiary by Judge G. F. Skipworth in circuit court this morning, after they had pleaded guilty to bad check charges. They were Frank Vanderpool, alias Frank Johnson, who admitted passing a bad check for \$20, and George Hval, who obtained \$100 with a forged check. The sentence was for not more than three years.

George A. Gilmore, city recorder, appeared in behalf of Hval's wife and children, and urged leniency in the sentence. However, Judge Skipworth had previously sentenced Vanderpool to the penitentiary for the same offense, and declared he could not discriminate.

The remainder of the prisoners indicted by the grand jury yesterday chose to have attorneys appointed for them, and will plead tomorrow morning. The attorneys appointed were as follows: H. M. Brownell, for H. J. Rand, crime against nature; F. C. Heffron for Pat Moore, obtaining money under false pretenses; S. M. Calkins for Tom Lloyd and L. J. Lloyd, burglary; C. N. Johnson, for Felix Esposito and Angelo Messilemo, larceny of automobile; Donald Young for Lewis Taylor, uttering forged check.

Two trophies are to be offered as prizes. One, a silver cup, is to go to the club making the best show. Attendance of the club, animals shown, best appearance of the animals and record of members in the judging contest will be points on which the winners will be marked. The other cup will be given the individual Jersey calf club member scoring highest in these points. The jubilee starts at 10 o'clock a. m.

Attempts were made to propagate the birds several years ago, but were unsuccessful. "But domestic turkeys thrive in Oregon," says Mr. Burgholff, "and for that reason, I don't see why the wild birds cannot be propagated."
