APPEGATE MOVING TO MINER BUILDING

The entire first and second floors of the new Miner building on Ninth avenue east have been leased by Albert Applegate, who will move his furniture business to that location from the Heilig theater building, it is announced. Work on fitting up the space is being rushed, and it is expected that the new quarters will be occupied by July 1.

A floor space of 60x100 feet, nearly three times that occupied at present, will be available, it is said. The store will be conducted on the departmental plan. On the ground floor living room furniture, pictures, and similar articles will be featured; the second floor will be given over to rugs, floor coverings, and bedroom furnishings, while the exchange department will be in the basement. Window displays will be a prominent feature of the new store. Windows will be 20 feet in depth, and will be nicely finished. Elevator service will also be available for the patrons.

Mr. Applegate established his business here in 1912, and has grown steadily since that time.

4 PLEAD GUILTY IN CIRCUIT COURT

Percy Lasselle to Study in Chicago

Percy A. Lasselle, of Eugene, a graduate assistant in the department of chemistry of the University of Oregon, will leave the campus in June for the University of Chicago, where he will study for a doctor's degree. He has successfully passed the examina-

tion for a master's degree here, presenting as his thesis a continuation of work which has been published by Dr. Roger J. Williams, professor of chemistry here. The title of the combined work is "A Study of the Highly Reducing Substances Occurring in Fresh Wood Distillate." The thesis has been accepted for publication by the Journal of Industrial and Engineering Chemistry. Lasselle graduated from the university in 1921. He has been elected to Sigma Xi, national honorary scientific fraternity, and is the first student to be granted this honor since the chapter was installed.
