

BUTTERFLIES TAKE LONG JOURNEYS AT START OF SUMMER

LONDON, May 22.—(AP)—The Painted Lady butterfly is fond of travel over sea and land as she is of her gorgeous coloring. Her husband, too, likes migratory flights, and, according to scientific researches, these butterflies in great numbers have been known to make journeys from Turkey to England.

C. B. Williams, chief entomologist of the Egyptian ministry of agriculture, who has been studying the habits of the Painted Lady for several years, gave an account of his work in a recent issue of Nature. The butterfly of this species, he believes, originates somewhere in the south or southwest of the long line of desert stretching across North Africa and Asia Minor, 2,000 or 3,000 miles from England. They leave the desert early in the spring and arrive in the vicinity of the southern shores of the Mediterranean usually about April. From Palestine they appear to fly through Syria and Turkey to the Balkan states, and from Egypt, Tripoli and Algeria they cross to southern Europe. All during the flight stragglers and weaklings are dropped out of the swarms and left behind.

By the more hardy fliers England is reached late in May or early in June, Scotland a week or so later, and here many of them spend the summer. The Painted Lady, those which originate in the desert country, have been seen in Iceland in July, some 4,000 miles from their starting place.

Whether in crossing great stretches of water they continue flying all night or rest on floating masses in the water has not yet been determined. Neither is it known, so far as Mr. Williams was able to ascertain, whether a return journey is made.

Student Has Plan For Bagdad Study

BALTIMORE, May 22.—(AP)—Dr. Raymond P. Dougherty, professor of Biblical literature at Goucher College, has been appointed annual professor of the American Schools of Oriental Research at Jerusalem and Bagdad for 1925-26. He has been granted a year's leave of absence by the local institution, and will leave for the near east the latter part of July.

Dr. Dougherty said his work will include lecturing and field work along archaeological lines, with special time given to a study of the topography of the land and an examination of mounds with the possibility of identifying sites of ancient cities. His new appointment is well known for his work in the translation of Babylonian tablets.

and he was of the opinion "that we are in a worse position today than we were six months ago, and that was bad enough. If we look at the staple trades of the country we cannot help having a feeling of anxiety and apprehension as to the future."

Liquor Warning is Given to Germans

BERLIN, May 22.—(AP)—That the movement for prohibition in Germany is rapidly gaining ground among the working classes is indicated by an appeal recently issued by a number of Socialist party leaders, most of whom are members of the Reichstag.

The document declares that "the working class is the worst sufferer from the effects of alcoholism." It admonishes the workers to "keep alcohol away from all your meetings, associations and demonstrations, and establish people's houses and hotels that sell no liquor. Reduce the possibility of obtaining liquor wherever you can do so, and conduct intensive educational work concerning the harm done by alcohol."

RUSHING RULES ARE CHANGED AT U. OF O.

The sororities of the University of Oregon, at a meeting of Pan-Hellenic society, yesterday, made several changes in the "rushing" rules for women's living organizations, to go into effect next fall.

A decided cutting of activities tending toward "rushing" of prospective members during the year was one of the moves. If the new rules are lived up to, it will virtually mean that girls cannot invite their girl friends in the university to their sorority houses except on occasions approved by the entire group of organizations, represented in the Pan-Hellenic.

It was also decided that a meeting of all freshmen girls should be held on the first day of the fall term, and the sorority system explained to them in full. This, it is believed, will save much possible conflict, as the majority of girls know nothing of the sororities, their functions, nor their system of adding members, and consequently make many mistakes.

Girls Smoke Sets Blaze in Timbers

BERLIN, May 22.—(AP)—Longing for a smoke while walking recently through the pine woods of Tegeler, near this city, two young girls started a fire that consumed 20 acres of fine timber in two hours.

A lighted cigarette end, carelessly cast aside, ignited the dry pine needles. The girls tried to put out the fire, but could not, and then gave the alarm, but it was too late. They are now in jail, and will be sued for the loss of the forest.

2 WISCONSIN GIRLS TO CONTEST PLACE FOR GOLF LAURELS

MILWAUKEE, Wis., May 22.—(AP)—The major contests for golfing honors among the women this season will be played in the middle west. Among the contenders likely to take a leading part in attempting to wrest the national title from the east, where it is now held by Mrs. Dorothy Campbell Hurd, are two Wisconsin golfers.

The younger of this pair, Miss Bernice Wall of Oskosh, is now champion of Wisconsin for the third time, while the other, Miss Frances Haddfield of Milwaukee, has displayed expert golf at times, having been runner-up once in the western championship, as well as state titleholder. Both are faithful followers of the links, and are planning to participate in all the leading events of the season.

Game is Splendid

Miss Wall, although a rather slight girl, has a splendid game, playing both wood and iron in good form. She gets good distance from the tee and through the fairway, but her specialty is in the short game. She approaches and putts well when at the top of her form. To those who do not know her prowess on the links, she appears at the starting tee to be one of the adventurous girls who enter tournaments as a lark and giggle while they roll up a score in three figures for 18 holes. But when the well-timed swing, making up for lack of more hardened muscles, allows the Oskosh girl to send the ball whizzing down the fairway full 200 yards or more, the onlooker amazingly admits that masculinity can learn something from femininity, even on the golf links.

Student of Game

Miss Wall has been playing golf since she was a child, and while that is not very long, she has studied so assiduously that she has learned the intricacies of the game. She first attracted attention in her own state by winning the northeastern Wisconsin title in 1920, and she defended the title for two years thereafter. She was a strong contender from that time, taking the state title in 1921 and again in 1923. She still holds the championship by virtue of her third success last summer.

The Wisconsin champion proved her ability in larger fields by winning the medal score competition in the Chicago district in 1922, topping a field made up of the best western women golfers. Experience and maturity enabled her to reach the semi-final round in the national championship last summer, and last winter she was runner-up in the Florida West Coast event at Belleair.

And this attractive young miss has mapped out an extensive campaign for the coming season. She plans to enter the Buffalo Invitational tournament in June, to defend her state title at Kenosha, to renew her attack on the western title at St. Paul, to invade Canada for the championship meet at Ottawa, and to try for the national crown at St. Louis in September.

Better Houses to Be Plan of Study

NEW YORK, May 22.—(AP)—The need of proper housing for people of the middle class, for intellectual workers, will come up for serious study this summer at Paris. The subject will be given primary consideration at the International Congress of Building and Public Works, to be held in the French capital June 15-30, according to William Reed Messenger, of New York, who recently inaugurated a movement for better housing for intellectual workers in the United States following his investigations abroad.

"The conference will be under the patronage of the French premier and other high officials, and participants will be entertained by the President of the Republic," says Mr. Messenger. "Detailed comparisons will be made of the different methods of different ages. All new means and methods to reduce costs of building will be considered, and a practical constructive program fostered."

Trade Outlook of England not Good

LONDON, May 22.—(AP)—A gloomy view of Britain's trade outlook was expressed by Sir Robert Horne at a recent dinner of the British Overseas Banks Association. He said he had just come back from a journey abroad, which had taken some months.

Student Body Head To get Honorarium

Randall Jones, of Eugene, president of the student body of the University of Oregon, has been granted an honorarium of \$250 by the associated students of the university. It is announced.

The sum is not to be given as salary, or recompense for services, but is a recognition of the services Jones has done the university. It was stated by members of the executive council.

Jones has been unusually active as a student executive. Under his regime a student union drive was successfully staged that netted nearly \$70,000 from the first year class, and his project, that of adding \$5 to fees each term for student buildings, carried at the last student election by a large majority vote.

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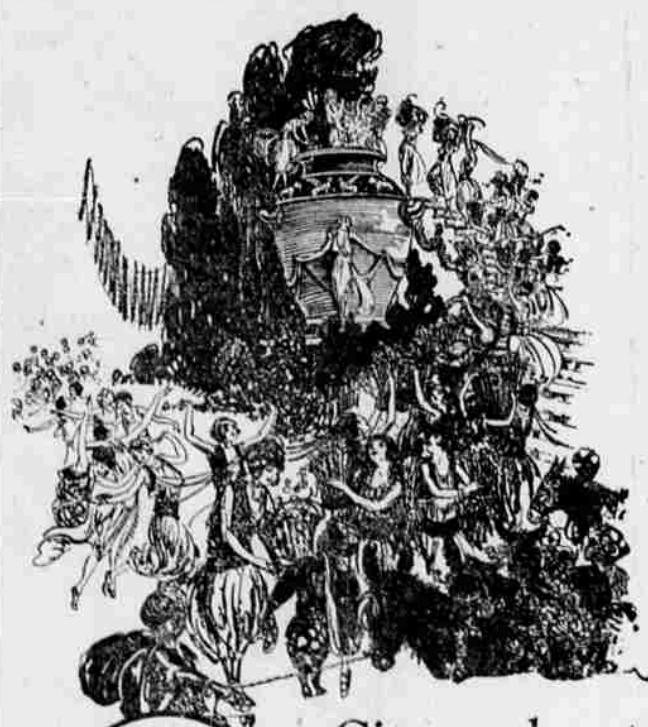
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Eugene Students to Take Master Exams
