

EUGENE PEOPLE TO TRAVEL THIS YEAR

The summer tourist season opens tomorrow, with special rates going into effect on all railroads to the east. It is announced by local railroad officers. Traffic is expected to be unusually heavy this season, they state, since the round trip rate is cut to approximately one and one tenth. The low rates apply to all parts of the United States, and tickets will be sold from May 22 to September 15, with the final return limit October 31.

Local people are already taking advantage of the rates, and many are leaving for eastern points this week. It is stated, David J. Jones, new city school superintendent, will leave for Europe, where he will spend the summer visiting relatives. He will return in the fall, bringing with him his wife who has been visiting there. Other Eugene people who are to start travelling this week include H. E. McKay, of the Eugene gas works, will go to Detroit and return; W. Phares is leaving for Chicago where he will visit relatives; J. H. Finch of Gray's Cash and Carry store, will spend some time in Kansas City; Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Shepherd will journey to Detroit, where they will visit their daughter; J. A. McDonald of the Fischer-Shoults Lumber company will take a trip that will terminate in New York; Mrs. Griffin will take a trip to Chicago; H. A. Gustafson, will make a visit to Minneapolis and other Minnesota places, and Mrs. Drinn will go to Red Wing, Minnesota to visit relatives.

Many faculty members are planning to go to Europe this summer, and extended trips are being proposed by many residents to all sections of the United States.

WOOL PRICES SOON TO RISE, IS REPORT

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, May 22.—The world wool situation was discussed in a statement issued today by F. H. Marshall, secretary of the National Wool Growers' association, which has headquarters here.

In the opinion of Mr. Marshall, the low point of prices has been reached and with the sales closed in England and Australia and the bulk of the United States wools already owned by concerns fully familiar with market conditions, it seems certain the real statistical position of wool will determine future prices.

Manufacturers are again advanced wool prices, according to Marshall who declared that the values now being established will be accepted for some time by the wool buying interests.

Mr. Marshall's statement went into the question of supply and demand and stocks on hand in this country and the world.

"There is a strong demand for wool clothing and exports and the indicated demand for the present stocks and new clips is not likely to permit the continuation of recent low prices," he said. "The grower has been forced to insist upon recognition of this cost of production, under the new condition of business and economics and at least a part of the trade has recognized that a price of forty cents or upwards for average range wools is necessary today to make wool growing profitable or attractive."

Deaf may Hear as Radio Tests Made

SAN FRANCISCO, May 22.—The San Francisco Examiner today said that tests conducted with Helen Keller, deaf and blind woman, at the powerful KGO transmitting station here, give to radio engineers considerable encouragement in their belief that sounds can be perceived by deaf persons by impressions received through the finger tips from a vibrating diaphragm as used in the radio head piece.

The tests, the story says, were begun in a stumbling manner but the results were sufficient to cause the engineers to plan further experiments with Miss Keller as the subject. In the experiments, conducted yesterday, Miss Keller placed her fingers upon an electric diaphragm and found that she could distinguish the vibrations caused by instrumental music from those produced by the voice, the article states. One of the engineers then spoke through the microphone and several times words were repeated by the woman.

Court Drops Ross Commission Move

PORTLAND, Ore., May 22.—Circuit Judge Hewitt today threw out of court the quo warranto proceedings by which Dr. Thomas W. Ross attempted to regain his place on the fish commission.

Judge Hewitt held that Governor Walter M. Pierce was within his legal rights when he removed Dr. Ross, and refused to interfere. John W. Kaste, who, with W. W. Banks appear for Dr. Ross said the matter of appeal to the supreme court was undecided. If appeal is not taken John C. Veatch, named by the governor to succeed Ross will have his place on the commission free from attack.

Exploration Plan For Islands Made

WASHINGTON, May 22.—(AP)—The first comprehensive exploration of Ruffin Island, the "land of many lands," which lies spraved out for 1,000 miles with points and promontories and great bays north of Labrador and southwest of Greenland, across from Lavis Strait, is one of the aims of the MacMillan-navy Arctic plane expedition this summer.

Discovered 349 years ago by Sir Martin Frobisher, the English navigator, scarcely anything more is known of it than in that day, says a statement issued by the National Geographic society, which is one of the sponsors of the expedition. A vast virgin field there awaits the expedition's camera.

"Ruffin Island," the statement declares, "is the third largest island in the world, Australia and Greenland surpassing it."
"Ruffin Island has resisted thorough exploration by virtue of its vastness. It is larger than any state of the United States except Texas and would make almost four New Englands."

Senator Borah to Probe Commission

WASHINGTON, May 22.—(AP)—William E. Humphrey, general member of the federal trade commission in questioning the right of the senate to direct it to gather information for the senate, has drawn from Senator Borah the statement that the commission should be abolished. Indications are that efforts to that end will be made at the next congress.

The senator, commenting on an address by Mr. Humphrey before the convention of the United States chamber of commerce yesterday, said "it is perfectly apparent" that the commission "is not going to be of any service to the country."
"In the interest of economy and peace in the business world," Senator Borah said, "it would be better to abolish the commission. After a commission of this kind comes under the influence of politics and political pressure from the outside it can be of no possible service to the people."

Further Test for Ethyl Fuel Ready

WASHINGTON, May 22.—(AP)—Surgeon General Cummings of the public health service is expected to appoint a commission of seven to determine whether use of ethyl gas as a motor fuel produces injurious effects.

Appointment of the commission was requested in a resolution adopted yesterday by a conference called by the surgeon general to discuss the subject.

Action of the ethyl gas corporation is suspending distribution of its product until a decision is reached regarding its possible danger, was endorsed by the conference as "wise." Speakers at the meeting presented statistics to show that comparatively few ill effects had resulted to persons handling the gas and to show that its use is becoming urgent through diminution of the petroleum supply.

Bend Plant Plans On Building Ready

BEND, Ore., May 22.—A roller shade factory will be built in Bend within a few months by Stewart Hartshorn company of Muskegon, Mich., according to an announcement made yesterday by E. R. Dake, representative of the Michigan factory.

The Stewart Hartshorn company has a ten-year contract with the Brooks-Senton Lumber company and Shely-Hixon company of Bend for all the roller shade and shade slat stock which it manufactures here.

37-Year-old Lien Set Aside Today

Decree in favor of Walter K. McKnight and Marguerite McKnight against the city of Eugene, establishing their full ownership to a tract of land in what was formerly Packer's addition to the city and cancelling a lien on the city docket for \$60 for street improvement 37 years ago, on October 15, 1887, was issued by Judge G. F. Shipworth in circuit court this morning. The city of Eugene failed to answer or appear by attorney in the litigation, the decree stated.

Planes Start for Polar sea Search

NEW YORK, May 22.—(AP)—The North American Newspaper alliance announced that it had received a dispatch from Kings Bay, Spitzbergen, this evening, stating that the two flying boats of the Amundsen-Ellsworth polar expedition logged off there at 5:35 this afternoon for the North Pole. The dispatch says that each plane carried three men.

BANDITS ARE ACTIVE

MEXICO CITY, May 22.—(AP)—A special dispatch from Sinaloa today said bandits attacked the nearby American-owned Sahuilla ranch and killed the Mexican manager, Jose Perez. The dispatch says the American consulate protested and the military authorities are sending troops to pursue the bandits.

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FRENCH WILL SOON OPEN ON CAMPAIGN

FEZ, French Morocco, May 22.—(AP)—It was admitted in military circles here today that the menace of the Rifians under Abd-el-Krim, who recently invaded French Morocco from the Spanish zone, is more grave than had previously been stated. Every possible measure to deal with the situation at a minimum cost of life and money is being taken.

The campaign against the Rifians is about to enter upon a new phase. General Hoenrich, Marshal Lyautey's chief of staff, announced that the reinforcements thus far received will suffice to cover the whole front, permitting the troops to pass from a passive to an active defense and enabling the French to throw back the invaders.

French military works are nearing completion. They include vast bastions and curtains, protecting a network of highways and railroads.

Driver Fined \$5 for Overloading Truck

Ralph Brickley, truck driver for M. A. Chamberlin, paid a fine of \$5 for driving a truck on the Laturne highway with a load of more than 350 pounds to one inch tire width, in the justice court.

The defendant was under the impression that the load limit on this road had been raised April 1, but this was not done, it was stated by the judge. The order still remains that no load exceeding 350 pounds to each inch of tire width can be taken over the road.
