Home Hints

All cooked starch should be used very hot. After wringing garments out of the starch they should be rubbed between the fingers so as to help blend starch and fabric.

Hang Up Clothes A clothes horse on which to hang clothes after ironing is essential so that garments may be well aired and absolutely dry before storing.

So Soup Won't Curdle Add a pinch of soda to the tomato before combining with the milk for tomato bisque and the mixture will not curdle.

Takes Off Rust Obsolete rust spots may be covered with kerosene, allowed to stand some time and then scoured off.

Making Pies Brown Before putting a pie in the oven, brush it over with milk. It will impart an inviting brown glaze.

Clean Willow Baskets Reed and willow baskets are best cleaned by rubbing with a stiff brush.

Use in Cold Water Naphtha soap should always be negated with cold water as hot causes the petroleum product to vaporize and the cleansing effect is lost.

Buy in Quantities It is economical to buy soap in large quantities so that it may dry out and harden during storage.

To Set The Color A little alum in the water in which you wash any cloth of bright colors will help set the color.

Home Menus

Breakfast—Halves of grapefruit, broiled salt mackerel, potatoes hashed in milk, toasted corn bread, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Scalloped celery, cottage cheese, whole wheat bread, cut-up cakes with never-fail icing, strawberries, milk, tea.

Dinner—Bouillon, toast sticks, baked stuffed halibut, potatoes with parsley, butter, creamed kale, cucumber salad, pineapple bavarian cream, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

KALE is green leaf vegetable, valuable both for its mineral matter and its vitamins content. It requires longer cooking than spinach and should be chopped very fine before serving.
