

WILBERT ROBINSON NOT READY TO QUIT

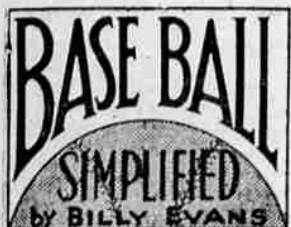
NEW YORK, May 26.—Wilbert Robinson, new president of the Brooklyn Dodgers, refused to lay down the managerial reins for a swivel chair.

"I want to remain on the bench and run this club through to the finish," explained the veteran manager, who led the Dodgers to two pennants and who now has the team in second place.

"I like the idea of being president of the club, but I also like the idea of being in the thick of the fight. The two positions will not be too much for me."

"You can't kill a Robinson with work," Robinson is the only president-manager in major league baseball. His election, brought about by the death of Charles H. Ebbets and Edward McKeever, was accompanied by an unofficial statement that the Dodgers would not be sold, for the time being, at least.

Babe Ruth expects to appear at the Yankee stadium today to see a double header between the Yankees and Red Sox. He has hopes of donning a uniform.



FOR 10 innings two teams play a ruthless ball. When the 11th inning started it was quite dark, and appeared that only about one more inning was possible.

In the last half of the 11th, with the bases filled and two out, the batsman hits the ball to the third baseman, who juggled it several times. He did not touch third base but managed to touch the runner coming from second on the hit.

The runner from third had crossed the plate before the fielder had touched the runner coming from second, which made the third out and retired the side.

Answer

It was a tie game, 0-0. The run scored while the third baseman juggled the ball and before he made the third out, did not count.

The play was a force-out and no runs can score on a force-out that is the third out.

A force-out is the result of a batsman hitting a ball on the field which compels the runners to advance. The bases being filled at the time, therefore all runners must advance.

It is not necessary that the base be touched to complete a force-out. It can be made by touching the runner with the ball.

Jones Soon Ready To Help Portland

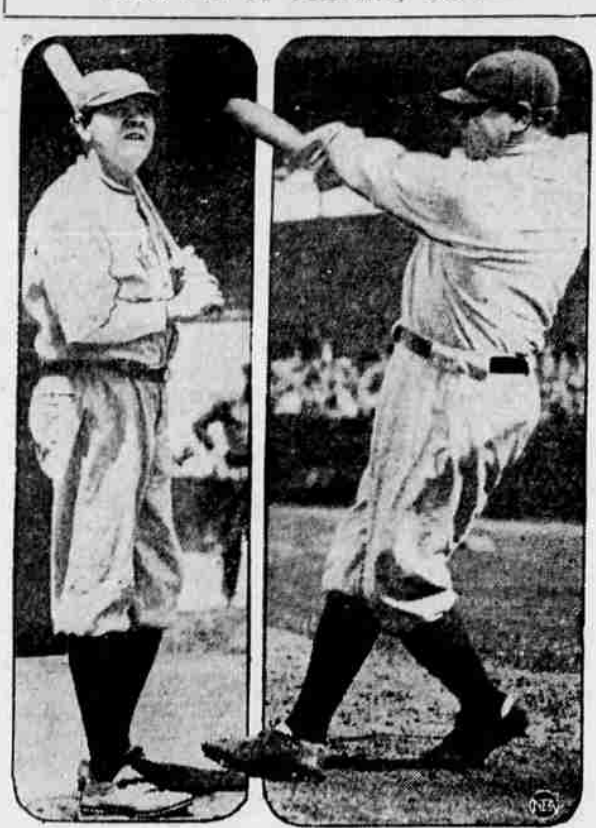

EUGENE SHOOTERS TO ENTER TRYOUT

Two rifle teams from the Eugene national guard units attending the annual summer camp at Camp Jackson, near Medford, June 12-26, will compete for a place on the state rifle team that will represent the Oregon national guard at the national shoot at Camp Perry, Ohio, August 24 to September 19. It is announced by Major W. G. White.

More than 150 guardsmen from Eugene will attend the summer camp, leaving Eugene at 10:40 o'clock a. m., June 11, in order to arrive at camp June 12, announces Major White.

The Oregon national guard rifle team defeated the crack infantry team of the regular army at the Camp Perry shoot last year, and won the infantry trophy. Every effort will be made at least to duplicate that performance again this year, and plans for a period of intensive training for men eligible to make the team are being worked out.
