

# BUDGET MISSES AMOUNT NEEDED BY CITY \$12,615

The city budget of Eugene missed the amount needed to run the city for the first four months of 1925 by only \$12,615.02.

Municipal departments have been going "in the hole" this year at the rate of more than \$3000 a month, according to the comparative analysis of money spent by the city and budget appropriations, made by Mrs. Grace Nehlska, city accountant, and furnished to the council today.

Only two departments—the fire department and building inspectors' office—show figures that are not red. The auto park, it is also revealed in self-supporting.

Following are the expenditures, budget appropriations and balances, of the various departments and month-by-month division of the city for the four-month period:

# CITY CONTRACTS FOR \$24,880 PAVING

Paving contracts for a total of \$24,880 were let by the city council at its regular meeting last night. The largest contract, for the paving of Madison street from Cherokee to Fifth avenue, was let to the W. W. Head Construction company for \$17,322.50.

Other projects, and successful bidders were as follows: Construction of a sewer in the alley between Pearl and High from Second to Third, \$582. Paving alley between Oak and Pearl from Eleventh to Twelfth, Oscar Snow, \$1144. Construction of a sewer across the R. O. E. C. field of the University of Oregon, Morris Marquis, \$1819. Construction of a sewer in the alley between First and Second avenues, from Pearl to Mill street, Oscar Snow, Paving of the alleys in the block bounded by Ninth and Tenth avenues and Oak and Pearl street, W. W. Head Construction company, \$2333.40.

Planning Ordinance Passed. The city planning ordinance was passed, and a commission made up of seven members, the mayor, the city attorney and the city engineer, is to be formed. Mayor E. B. Parks is to appoint the members. The commission will have jurisdiction over all matters of city planning in the city, and within a radius of six miles.

New concrete gutters for Wilamette street will be installed, the council decided. These will be from the Southern Pacific right of way to Thirteenth avenue east, and the cost will be assessed against the property.

Paving is provided. Paving of Chatterton street from Seventeenth to Twenty-fourth avenue was provided by ordinance. Plans and specifications approved. Intersections at Twenty-first, Twenty-second and Twenty-third to be graveled.

Construction of a sewer in the alley between Chatterton and Lincoln streets, from Nineteenth avenue south, provided for in plans and specifications, approved in ordinance. Petition for the paving of Eighth avenue from Van Buren street to Blair boulevard granted. Intersections to be graveled.

# HIGH SCHOOLS TO DEBATE TONIGHT FOR STATE TITLE

The state championship debate of the Oregon high school debating league will be contested by McLoughlin Union high school of Milton and Ashland high school this evening in Villard hall at 7:30. Professor E. E. De Cou will present the DeCou cup to the winning team.

The question for debate is the same used in the Oregon debate last winter: "Resolved, that the referendum is a desirable feature of representative government." The team from Milton will defend the affirmative, and the Ashland debaters will uphold the negative.

Each of the teams has shown its ability in debate by winning the championship of its district, and by defeating the other district winners in eastern and western Oregon, respectively.

Arthur M. Cannon, superintendent of schools at Hood River and president of the debating league, will preside. The judges are Professor Hugh E. Rosson, Dean E. C. Robbins, of the university and Robert W. Prescott, of Eugene.

# NEW STATE LAWS START THURSDAY

Abolishment of "speed traps" on state highways is one of the 235 laws comprising the work of the last legislature, that will go into effect at midnight Thursday night, it is announced today. Under provisions of this law it will be a breach of statutes for traffic officers to lie in ambush and arrest a motorist for some slight infraction.

Contrary to reports, the new law providing for the use of standard lights on motor vehicles does not become effective May 28. Eugene traffic officers assert. This law goes into effect September 1, at which time the secretary of state will announce official testing stations.

Decorating cars with emblems of associations of which the owner is not a member is made a violation subject to severe penalty.

Other laws that become effective next Thursday provide for increased salaries for justices of the state supreme court, district attorneys and a host of county officers. There also are laws creating many new boards and commissions, changing county boundary lines and providing protection for the property of farmers on the state and county highways.

Changing the time for paying taxes and giving the state highway commission additional powers also are provided in the new laws.

# REGENTS TO MEET IN PEACE COUNCIL

University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college boards of regents will be given a chance to bury the hatchet and settle their curricula disputes before the next conference of the board of higher curricula June 5. This, in effect, is the statement of the arbitration board, who states the conference will be private. The board, he declared, would give thorough consideration to the issues involved in the controversy, adding that there was no necessity for a decision until late this summer, if the decision required that length of time.

Representatives of both institutions are already working together toward a harmonious solution of the problems contained in the 50-page brief of the university and the 212-page brief of the college, it is understood.

The best of feeling prevails between regents, faculty, alumni and students of the two institutions, Mrs. G. T. Gerlinger, member of the university board of regents, declared.

"We are certain that a solution can be found to our common problems," she said. "However, I do not believe the proposal to unite the two institutions under one head, or with two heads, and a super board of paid or unpaid people in charge, would be successful for obvious reasons."
