LOCAL OFFICERS UNDER NEW LAW
Police officers in the office of W. G. Jenkins, chief of police, and Frank Taylor, sheriff of Lane county, are automatically listed among the state employees in "hazardous occupations," and may come under the new amendment to the workmen's compensation law which goes into effect Thursday. It was learned today. This law was sponsored by Senator Maglady of Lane county, at the last legislature session.

Unless county courts and municipalities file objections with the state industrial accident commission by June 1 the law will automatically go into effect. It also provides that when workmen are associated in a partnership for a piece of work to be performed by themselves they may be deemed employees of the person having the work done.

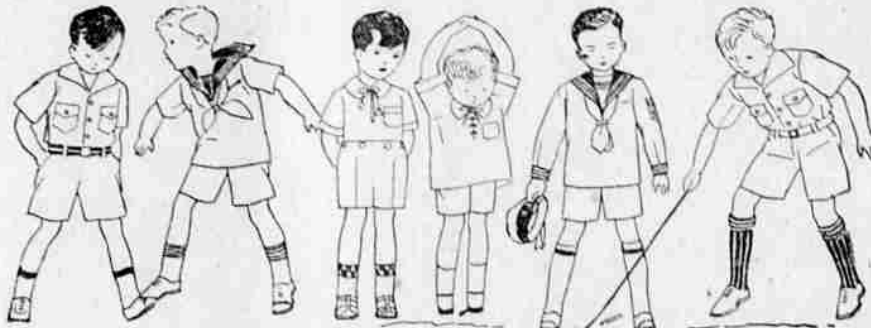

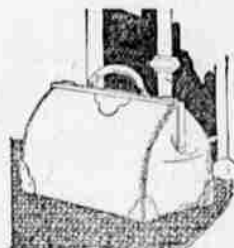
