

OREGON ALUMNUS TO PREACH HERE SUNDAY, JUNE 14

Rev. Frank B. Mathews, pastor of the University Baptist church of Seattle, has been chosen to deliver the baccalaureate sermon, June 14, at the graduating exercises of the 1925 class of the University of Oregon.

TEACHER TELLS OF SCHOOL AT CANTON

Canton Christian college is the first Chinese college to have co-educational work, said Ivan Ware, former business manager at the college, in explaining the function of the school.

The school is composed of seven colleges, the primary, the middle (corresponding to the American high school), the girls' school (which is really nothing more than the dormitory where the girls live), the Waku, a school for foreign reared Chinese boys, the western college, the college of science and arts, and the college of agriculture.

The campus is spread over 300 acres, and the buildings, plant and equipment are valued at over \$1,000,000 gold. There are foreign teachers, as well as Chinese, and many courses are given in English.

The buildings are very big, and spacious, said Mr. Ware, showing some small snapshots. The lanterns with their long, hanging fringes are special features among the trees. The sampans, translated, meaning three boards, corresponds to our boats and the boatmen will conduct a trip of reasonable length for 20 cents.

The western college is for the children of the foreign instructors. It would be impossible to educate the American and English children in the Chinese school with the young Chinese students, said Mr. Ware. The difference in language, of course, is the most apparent reason.
