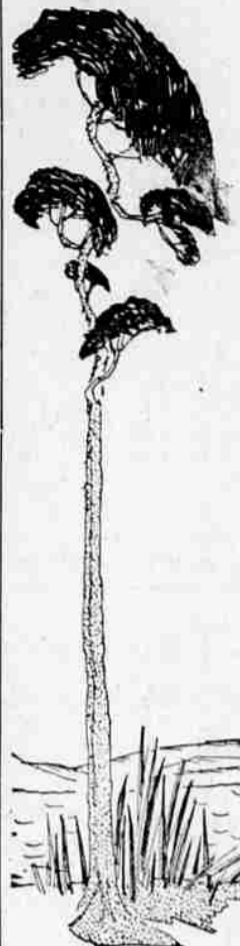

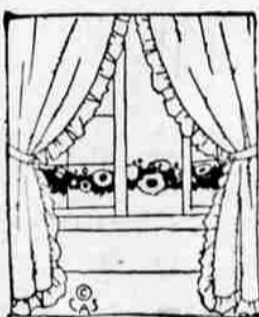

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MONTHS' FINES NET CITY \$1494; ANALYSIS FILED

Sanitarians paid \$1,494.50 to the state treasury during the first four months of 1925, according to the analysis of income and expense of operating the city government given out today by Judge George A. Gilmors, city recorder.

Total income from all sources during the months of January, February, March and April was \$22,451.08, the report shows, while expenditures ran \$20,956.58. This gave a net operating profit of \$1,494.50, which would be offset by 1924 taxes payable in 1925 and credited against this amount. The net profit will accrue to \$144,745.92, giving a surplus of \$98,730.95 for the city to date.

Income items were as follows: Licenses, permits and inspections, \$1,000.00; franchise taxes, \$745.44; parking permits, \$400; auto park rental, \$25; dog licenses, \$640; miscellaneous licenses and permits, \$718; health inspections, \$67.50; pound fees, \$250; parking cuts, \$400; sale of surplus, \$150; departmental sales, \$497.04; interest on outside work, \$471.85; sinking fund and laborers, \$5,468.96; interest and costs (improvement liens), \$66.84; refund on freight (street department) \$70.72; refund on lights (street department) \$21.80; accrued interest on bond sales, \$1,651.40; premium on bond sales, \$187.75. City expenditures were divided as follows:

Administration, \$5.10; attorney's fee, \$88.75; recorder's office, \$1,000.00; treasurer's office, \$1,000.00; auditor's office, \$1,776.98; fire department, \$6,000.00; police department, \$1,500.00; police station, \$311.11; street and bridge department, \$2,200.00; parks (general), \$1,416.37; city park, \$769.57; health department, \$204.00; building inspector, \$90.20; city hall (maintenance and operation), \$670.87; milk inspector, \$20; aviation field, \$140.48; city hall, \$150.37; sewer maintenance operation, \$856; employment office (maintenance), \$172.80; legal office, \$23.00; interest paid on war bonds, \$21,002.41; interest on bonded debt (general) \$9,000; emergency, \$2,000; election expenses, \$727.80; city maintenance and operation, \$1,000.00.

PUBLIC LIBRARY IS ENTERED BY THIEF

A burglar entered the Eugene city library some time last night, propped the cash drawer and escaped with about \$5 in small change, it was reported to the police this morning. The robbery is the work of some one who is familiar with the library, it is believed, since nothing but the cash drawer was unlocked. The thief opened a back window, which he reached by climbing upon a shed. The screen was torn from the window, part of the glass broken out, and the intruder escaped. The library's drawers were found to pry open the cash drawer.

The occurrence is similar to that reported about two years ago, it is noted, when a party entered the library, and used the scissors in the cash drawer. The librarian had just banked the cash last night, it is stated, hence no amount left in the drawer was small. All was in dimes, nickels and pennies, it is stated.

F. A. Nagley Writes Business Article

"The Conflict in Management" is the title of the leading article in the current issue of the Oregon Merchant magazine, written by Frank A. Nagley, of the University of Oregon school of business administration. A series of articles on various phases of business are now being run regularly in the magazine. Management may be defined as the discovery, application, and execution of principles and policies governing business activity, says Mr. Nagley. "The old idea of management was bossing, ordering, and forcing the will of the manager upon the workers, he says. "The new idea is the human idea in which the individual is considered the right to live, to have and to be." The conflict in business is between producing and service, between execution and adequate remuneration, the article says. A better business philosophy is recommended, and less competition is urged.
