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BERRY PRICE WEAK IN PORTLAND MART

PORTLAND, Ore., May 29.—Strawberry prices, closing the week today interfered with picking and were moved to outside markets. Though there will be no trading tomorrow and Sunday because of the holidays.

If the weather is favorable for picking during the next four or five days berries should be extremely plentiful all next week.

Berry prices this morning range from \$2 a crate for poorly picked grades to \$5 for choice. The general run was from \$2 to \$2.75. There was little undercurrent of steady and unchanged. Supply and demand are about evenly balanced, and no immediate change is in prospect.

Country supplies are clearing up for the week-end. Country dressed hogs and veal are steady under a light demand.
