

FRANK TROEH IS BEST PERFORMER AT STATE SHOOT

Frank Troeh of Portland was the stellar performer in the Oregon state championship trapshooting tournament which came to a close yesterday on the traps at the municipal aviation field.

In spite of the unsettled weather conditions and occasional showers, the shooters made fine scores. Frank Troeh broke 396 out of 400 targets from the 16-yard line.

By breaking 97 targets yesterday in the second half of the state championship shoot and 100 Friday, when the first half was run off, Troeh won the singles title with a score of 197.

Jim Seavey of Eugene fell one target short of Troeh's performance and finished second. Third honors went to R. G. Lacey of Parker, who smashed 194 bluebirds.

Forty-six bluebirds were shattered by Frank Troeh in the 25-pair doubles shoot, giving him top position in his class.

Henry Veatch of Cottage Grove led the class B shooters with 43. E. J. Payton of Roseburg was high man in class C with 42 and Ray Hubb of Eugene and J. W. Morris of Portland, tied for high honors in class D with 38 each.

Dr. A. W. Simmons of Silverton had no targets to spare to win the state handicap championship. He broke 97, one more than did G. N. Ford of Portland and L. L. Spencer of Roseburg.

Ed Payton won the state miss-and-out title with Lee Bennett of Corvallis second and W. W. Brannister of Eugene third.
