City Boxes Made—
The trapshooting tournament concluded last week at the municipal school field by the Lane County Sportsmen's association furnished the equipment for the coming summer camp of Eugene boy scouts, reports C. R. Clark, scout executive. Several scores of the solid cases in which the cartridges were packed were made by the executive for the boys' boxes. In which the scouts will store their mess kits and other equipment for the camp. Each scout will be asked to make a hinge and lock for the boxes, which, because they are uniform in size, can be easily handled by the auto truck to carry the provisions and camping equipment.

Forest Laws Received—
Copies of the state fire warden's laws of Oregon were received today by the office of the Eugene Loan and Savings national forests. These are the up-to-date statutes by which prosecutions will be made in the forests in 1925, for failure to provide spark arresters on forestry engines, leaving camp fires burning, failure to obtain a camping permit, or starting a forest fire. A number of variances are already taking out camping permits, and from the number listed thus far, a record season is anticipated, according to the national forest officials.

Riots Averted—
Most of the local national guard companies of Eugene are rapidly clearing their tanks for the big annual summer camp at Medford this year, although a few vacancies remain in some companies. Headquarters company is at full strength; Company C, which can use a few more men, enlisted Johnnie Everett last night, and the medical detachment added Byron T. Elliott, Robert W. Watt and Ernest L. Murray. Five more men can be used by the medical company. Enlistments close Tuesday.

The transfer of the property took place some time ago. LIONS PLANNING PLAYGROUND FOR LOCAL CHILDREN

Establishment of a children's playground in the southeast area of the city park opposite the courthouse is planned by the Eugene Lions club and the matter was taken up with the county court this afternoon by a committee headed by Dr. P. J. Bartle, newly elected president of the club. The other members of the playground committee are George Korn and Howard Hall.

The Lions club plans to install all the apparatus, such as swings, slides and other play material and the cooperation of the University of Oregon has been obtained to provide supervision," according to Dr. Bartle. No action has as yet been taken by the county court although it is said that the plan is being considered favorably.

In planning the new playground the club committee states that there has been found a need of such a place especially in the downtown district as many children at present are forced to play on the streets.

COUNTY AGENT'S REPORT ISSUED

Reports on the work of the office of O. S. Fletcher, Lane county agricultural agent, for the past month were compiled today.

The following is the report issued by Mr. Fletcher:
1. Agricultural and home economic extension work carried on at twelve meetings with a total attendance of 694 by county agent or specialists from extension service of Oregon Agricultural college working in cooperation with county agent.

2. Four special farm extension service worked a total of seven days in Lane county in cooperation with county agent.

3. Two hundred ninety-one office calls and 19 telephone calls regarding farm problems.

4. One hundred seventy-one individual letters written.

5. Twenty-three farms visited to help start alfalfa and other farm crop demonstrations.

6. Traveled 1187 miles by automobile and 138 by train.

7. Principal projects given attention during month were farm crops, dairying, rodent control, and horticulture.

M. J. DURVEA DIES IN MASSACHUSETTS

Morris J. Durvea, who was prominently identified with the development of Eugene for about nine years following 1907, died suddenly at Greenfield, Mass., Monday, and will be buried at Pine Plains, N. Y. He was 59 years of age.

Mr. Durvea platted the Hillcrest addition to Eugene and for several years was secretary of the Eugene chamber of commerce in this city, afterwards serving the city of Ashland in the same capacity and later the state chamber of commerce at Portland.

For the past year and a half he has been in a similar capacity at Greenfield, Mass.

Mr. Durvea was a member of the Masonic order, the Eastern Star and the Episcopal church.

LEON EDMUNSON IS FOUND GUILTY

Only 20 minutes were required for a jury in district court today to bring in a verdict of guilty against Leon R. Edmundson who was being tried on a liquor charge on appeal from a conviction in justice court. Judge Robert Tucker announced that sentence would be given Friday. An appeal for a new trial will be made by Paul Hogmiller, defense attorney. It is understood. The new trial appeal must be filed within 10 days. The Edmundson case has been under way for the past three days in circuit court.
