Cattle Inspector Pends
Appointment of an inspector to take charge of the tuberculosis tests of cattle for Lane county will be made by the county court in the near future, according to announcement by members of the court today. The new state law passed at the recent meeting of the legislature provides for compulsory inspection of herds and the enforcement of the law here is urged by the Lane County Agricultural council. There will be no expense to the county in the tests as the inspection work will be self-supporting by fees where herds are tested, it is announced. A trained veterinarian will be appointed for the work, the county court announces.

General Uprising Feared in China

UNITED STATES MARINES SENT TO SHANGHAI

Russian Bolsheviks Blamed For Trouble; Denials Are Issued

Strike Increases; Japanese Cruiser And Marines Ordered on Way

LONDON, June 4.—(AP)—A very grave view is taken here of the disturbance of Shanghai and the outlook in China generally, fear being expressed that things are moving toward a situation resembling the Boxer uprising.

As regards the agitation among the workers and students, the editorial writers of the London papers are almost unanimous in attributing it to Bolshevik influences, especially the activity of the Soviet minister, M. Karakhan.

RUSSIAN DENIES REPORT

SHANGHAI, June 4.—(AP)—The Russian consul general, E. Osarin, today denied that Soviet propaganda was responsible for disorder, unrest and riot conditions now obtaining in Shanghai as the result of demonstrations by Chinese students, protesting against the action of the mixed court in sentencing the strikers.

The consul general declined to be interviewed by newspaper men, but he replied in writing to a series of written questions submitted to him branding the statements from other quarters attempting to connect his government with the disorders, "as nothing else than prevarication aiming to discredit the Soviet government."

M. KARAKHAN SPEAKS

PEKING, June 4.—(AP)—M. Karakhan, Soviet ambassador to China, today denied that his country was responsible in any degree for hostile activities of Chinese students at Shanghai.

The Soviet ambassador, said in his opinion America might well take this opportunity to prove profound friendship to China by standing aside, saying to the other implicated powers: "This is your business, not ours."

COUNCIL TO SELL M'KENZIE BONDS

City water board will advertise for bids for constructing the new pipe line to Hayden bridge on the McKenzie river for a new water supply soon after the bonds are sold, reports C. A. McCall, superintendent of the board.

Monday night at the meeting of the city council, bids will be opened for the \$375,000 in bonds \$200,000 of the McKenzie river bonds, as well as \$175,000 of the water extension bonds, for erecting the new reservoir on Skinner butte, and extending the present city water system.

From inquiries received about the McKenzie project, there will be a large number of bidders for the job, according to Mr. McCall. Crews of men are now working on maps and specifications, and getting right-of-ways through the land leading to the river.

Two pipe-laying crews are now working in the city, one on a small city main on Charleston street between Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets, and another on Twenty-fourth avenue east. Another is working on the 12-inch pipe line covered by the newly-routed city bonds.

\$360,000 in Bonds Voted At La Grande

LA GRANDE, Ore., June 4.—La Grande voters yesterday accepted for municipal bond issues totaling \$360,000 at a special election by a vote of nearly five to one, unofficial figures this morning show. The vote was medium, with 1041 ballots cast. The vote follows:

For \$185,000 to improve water system and build auxiliary supply—yes 836, no 205.

For \$105,000 for sewage disposal plant—yes 872, no 163.

For \$25,000 for storm sewers—yes 787, no 235.

For \$45,000 for additional fire pump, equipment and housing room—yes 751, no 265.

This is the first bond election resulting favorably in La Grande in 18 years, city officials declared.

HARTFORD, Conn., June 4.—(AP)—A reprieve from execution for Gerald Chapman from June 25 to December 3 was issued today by Governor John H. Trumbull on the application of State's Attorney Hugh M. Alcorn. Chapman was convicted at the March term of the superior court for the murder of Policeman Skelly in New Britain and after a sensational trial was sentenced by Judge Jennings to be hanged at the state prison on June 25.

MR. BRYAN TO END LECTURES AFTER JULY 10

Time Will be Devoted to Writing Memoirs, he Tells Folks

Cites Oregon School Case as Indicative of His Tennessee Affair

CHICAGO, June 4.—(AP)—William Jennings Bryan's "swan song" of oratory probably will be heard at the Tennessee evolution trial at Dayton, July 10.

The great commoner announced at Springfield, Ill., that he intended to retire from the lecture platform to devote his time to writing his memoirs.

Mr. Bryan made only a brief reference to the coming evolution fight in a speech yesterday at Jacksonville, Ill., his former home, before continuing to Nashville, Tenn., where he will be joined by counsel for the prosecution of J. T. Scopes, indicted Dayton school teacher.

Speaking to old friends and neighbors at a celebration of the city's centenary, Mr. Bryan mentioned the recent decision of the supreme court in the Oregon school case, indicating that it was significant of what might be expected in the Tennessee trial. He said the decision gave parents a right to safeguard the religion of the child and also affirmed the right of the state to regulate the schools and what shall be taught in the schools.

The evolution fires also were kept burning by a statement of Governor Austin P. Ray of Tennessee at Clarksville, Tenn., his home town, that "evolution was all bosh," and that he expected to get as far as possible from the Scopes trial.

Portland man Arrested on Fraud Charge

PORTLAND, Ore., June 4.—Harry E. Wochnick, for five years an employee of the receiving department of Swift and company, was arrested today on charges of defrauding the firm out of \$7500 to \$10,000.

Although on a salary of slightly more than \$100 a month, Wochnick has been living at an expensive hotel, riding about in an expensive automobile, according to Deputy District Attorney Leon Behrman.

Officers who arrested him, reported that they found a quart of gin on his hip.

Possession of liquor charges were also placed against him. According to Deputy District Attorney John Mowry, a confederate who delivered cracklings to the Swift plant, cashed fictitious receiving invoices, supplied by Wochnick and split the proceeds.

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RE-OPENING OF RAIL CONTROL CASE IS ASKED

Petition Filed by Public Service Commission of Oregon

WASHINGTON, June 4.—(AP)—A petition for re-opening of the proceeding by which the interstate commerce commission has allowed the Southern Pacific railroad to retain control of the Central Pacific was filed today by the public service commission in Oregon.

In approving continuance of the merger of the two railroads the commission attacked certain conditions and the Oregon petition asked for the enforcement of rights to use Central property which other railroads may be entitled to exercise.

The Central Pacific now has a line through Oregon, the "petition" said, which the Oregon trunk railroad has been entitled to use between Shoom and Klamath Falls. The general complaint was made that the merger in Oregon had reduced competition in railroad service.

The annual dues of the order were raised from \$5 to \$10 and the annual fee to maintain crippled children's hospitals was fixed at \$2.

MAIL DELIVERY SERVICE IN CITY EXTENDED TODAY

Mail delivery service for a number of streets of the city not before included in the work of the local post office was started today and others will be added, according to announcement today of Darwin E. Moran postmaster.

The service will be extended to those streets that have been listed just as soon as the necessary requirements have been complied with. The postmaster stated today, these requirements are that sidewalks must be installed and that proper mail receptacles must be placed at the houses.

MOTHER SHOT; FIVE CHILDREN ARE VICTIMS



Brother And Sister-in-Law Are Others Slain by Lloyd Russell

HAMILTON, Ohio, June 4.—(AP)—Becoming violently insane, Lloyd Russell early today shot and killed eight members of his family, according to police who arrested him after he had shot and slightly wounded himself. His victims are the five children of his brother, his mother, brother and sister-in-law.

Russell is in a padded cell in the county jail. The dead:

Mrs. Rose Russell, 60, mother.

John Lowell Russell, brother.

Emma Russell, 35, wife of John Lowell Russell.

Julia, 12; Robert, 8; George Francis, 6; Paul Lewis, 3, and Richard, 4 months, all children of Mr. and Mrs. John Russell.

Dorothy, 10, saved herself by hiding in bed when she heard shots.

Russell then turned the weapon on himself, shooting him in the left lung.

After the shooting he riddled the bodies of several of the children with bullets. He had talked incoherently about a mortgage on the house and said he would shoot the pictures off the wall. Russell is 43 years old.

Most of those killed were sleeping.

Robert Leonard and Louis Keller, policemen, and Captain Wesley Wolsten, deputy sheriff, were summoned.

As they approached the house, Russell, who was employed as a laborer, appeared at a window and told a story that a \$1000 mortgage was due on the place, and that they would have to move today.

"I'll shoot the pictures off the wall and then surrender," Russell told the police.

With that the slayer turned about and fired more bullets into the bodies of the children lying in the room.

Russell then appeared at another window and the police broke in a door. Russell then turned the pistol on himself. He fired one shot before the police could reach him, and the bullet penetrated his lung, near the heart, but he will live, according to reports from the jail.

"I made a poor job on myself," Russell said when taken into custody.

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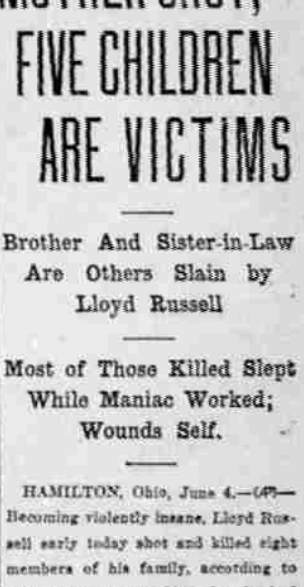
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
