

DEFENSE WITNESS TAKES STAND IN ETHERIDGE CASE

PORTLAND, June 4.—The defense in the trial of John L. Etheridge, Portland bond dealer, accused of using the mails to defraud in advertising Seattle local improvement district bonds, was permitted to introduce one of its witnesses today before the government case was finished.

H. L. Boyd, secretary of John E. Price and company, Seattle, bond dealers, who wished to return to Seattle today, was the witness. He identified a circular issued by his house in April, 1932, upon which was printed in black face type:

"The faith of the city of Seattle is pledged to prompt payment of principal and interest of Seattle local improvement bonds through the local improvement revolving fund, writes City Treasurer Ed L. Terry."

The defense sought to prove that Etheridge based the statement contained in his advertisements on the declaration he read in the price circular.

Boyd testified that after this circular had been issued, Terry went to John Price and company and had the quotation corrected.

On the stand yesterday Terry denied ever having made such a statement.

J. W. McCoy, cashier of First National bank of Ashland, was a witness for the government today. McCoy's bank purchased \$5000 worth of the bonds in question.

When he was asked by Etheridge's attorneys, Martin L. Pipes, if he could read, he replied that he could read. Pipes then asked:

"If you can read, didn't you read across the face of these very bonds the statement that the city is not liable for the payment of these bonds?"

Cashier McCoy told of getting the circular through the mail, also various letters explaining the issue that were written by Etheridge. He declared no interest had been paid on the bonds since they were purchased by the Ashland bank.

Miss Anna Schmidt of Grants Pass, testified to buying nearly \$2000 worth of these bonds, and that several interest bearing coupons that past due had not been paid.

LUMBER COURSE PLANNED
SPOKANE, Wash., June 4.—Vocational course for training lumber workers was taken under consideration here today by the members of the Western Pine Manufacturers' association, meeting with the industrial department of the Western Vocational conference, in session here. Such a course never has been outlined by the federal and state vocational system. It was stated, H. A. Tiemann, regional director of the federal board of vocational training said, that a course to teach the handling of lumber in all its stages would be drafted, and that plans would be considered for obtaining teachers and organizing schools where the course can be offered to young men expecting to enter the lumbering industry, as well as those already occupied.

The contest for the office of imperial outgaurd, originally scheduled for an executive session today, was put ahead a day and resulted in the election of Dana E. Williams of Keosauqua, Iowa.

The balloting gave Williams 287 votes; Leonard P. Stuart of Washington, D. C., 155; J. P. Reid of London, Ont., 75; Allan McCanta, Meridian, Miss., 51; and Albert H. Ladner, Philadelphia, 1. Inasmuch as 300 votes were necessary for an election, Reid withdrew and then McCanta withdrew and moved the unanimous election of Williams.

During the afternoon the council discussed problems connected with the maintenance of the Shrine hospitals for crippled children. It was determined to carry on this work, begun several years ago, with even greater vigor and to extend the hospital system as rapidly as possible. The Shrine now operates seven hospitals and four mobile units and has two more hospitals building.

Barring repetition of yesterday's "unusual weather," the colorful pageantry of the 1935 Shrine convention will come to a climax tonight in two spectacular parades: one including all the Nobles with all their bands, patrols and chapters representing half a hundred temples, and the other dazzling with the massed Kieg lights of Hollywood and scintillating with the celebrities of the screen "in person."

The official Shrine parade was to have been held last night but a drizzling rain that blanketed the city all day caused its postponement. The rain also brought on a tidal wave of "hiding" from the wits of the various delegations.

An artificial blizzard manufactured with the feathery insides of several hundred pillows from the upper floors of a downtown hotel, furnished the piece de resistance of the day long jollification.

RE-OPENING OF RAIL CASE ASKED

for the Oregon commission today, "a hearing will undoubtedly be had on the several cases within the next sixty or ninety days, at which time both the Strahorn and Hill line applications will be considered together with the commissions petition. This hearing will be vastly different in many respects from the one held last summer on the Oregon commission's complaint. There the issue was whether Oregon was to have additional railroad lines. In the forthcoming hearing the question will be not whether we are to have the railroads, but rather who is to be permitted to build them. Examiner Kephart in his report suggested that both the Strahorn and Hill line applications should be built by the Union Pacific system. Both the Southern Pacific and Hill systems demand the right to participate in handling the tonnage. The interstate commerce sys-

tem is to handle the traffic. The re-opening of the Central Pacific control case will permit the commission to consider fully the entire question from every possible angle."

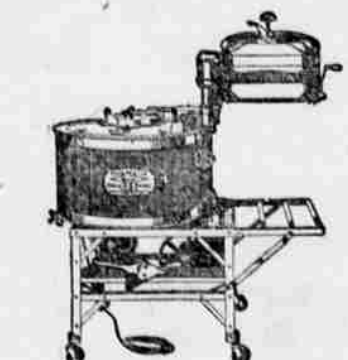
