

ABD-EL-KRIM TO EXTEND FRONT ON EAST IN MOROCCO

PARIS, June 4.—(AP)—Firmly held by the French center, Abd-el-Krim is seeking to extend his front to the east, according to the latest advices from French headquarters in Morocco.

The Riffian chief has been made wary by his defeat when attacking in force, however, and is reverting to guerrilla warfare and his previous tactics of filtering between the French outposts.

Meanwhile active preparations are being made by Marshal Lyautey, the governor-general of French Morocco, and the government in Paris to put a definite end to the Riffian activities.

It was learned that Foreign Minister Briand will continue daily conferences with the Spanish ambassador regarding Franco-Spanish cooperation in Morocco.

Premier Painleve told the cabinet the war situation in Morocco is stationary. He said there are only minor engagements.

NEW YORK, June 4.—A new angle in the Moroccan situation was seen today in dispatches from Gibraltar indicating that Abd-el-Krim was prepared to allow the Spaniards a nominal victory in their forthcoming attack on Alhucemas in return for peace and an appointment as chief of the Rif district under Spanish supervision.

This, it was pointed out, would leave him free to pursue his campaign against the French protectorate, without having his flanks constantly exposed to attacks from the Spaniards and their mobile columns.

The dispatches, however, are based on reports circulated in Melilla, in the Spanish zone, and lack confirmation.

DOUGLAS COUNTY CROPS DAMAGED

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 4.—Prolonged rains during the past ten days have seriously damaged prunes, apples and peaches in Douglas county, according to County Horticulturist, W. S. Carpenter. Petite prunes which had resisted the ravages of Brown rot, which caused much early damage among Italians, have been seriously affected during the past few days, and the continuation of the rain means much added loss. No more than a 50 per cent harvest is expected on Petites and 25 per cent on Italians, according to estimates. The warm rains are ideal for the rapid spread of the brown rot and effectively prevent any spray applications or other control methods from being attempted. In apples, scab is showing up in practically all orchards, and the yield of fancy apples will be extremely small.

Packers Granted Lease on Island

SALEM, Ore., June 4.—That the question of whether the state of Oregon or the federal government is the rightful owner of Sand Island, in the mouth of Columbia river, will be determined in court because certain yesterday when the state land board granted to the Columbia River Packers association a lease to the fishing rights of the island. The state is to receive 50 per cent of the proceeds of the fishing operations.

Since 1854 the federal government has had control of the island and has leased out the fishing rights. In that year the state ceded the island to the government, the terms being that it be used for military purposes. It never was used for military purposes, hence the state's claim that title should now revert to the state. The federal government is expected immediately to start suit against the state and in this way the title right will be tested. The Barbery Packing company recently received a lease on the island from the government.

If the state wins it is estimated that its returns from the fishing operations will be more than \$50,000 a year.

Mrs. Cunningham Indicted on Three Charges of Murder

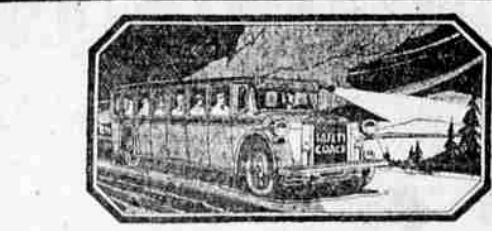
CROWN POINT, Ind., June 4.—(AP)—Mrs. Anna Cunningham, 40, Gary, Ind., widow, was indicted on three first degree murder charges yesterday by the Lake county grand jury. The state charges that she slew three of her children by poison.

Mrs. Cunningham was held without bail by Judge Martin Smith, of the superior court.

The indictments charge that the mother killed Isabelle, 18, Charles, 19, and Walter 13, upon whose deaths insurance policies were collected.

In her confession, Mrs. Cunningham said she killed only the ones she loved best and attempted to kill herself by poison so that they might "Join Pa in Heaven." Her husband, David Cunningham, Sr., who she called "Pa," died July 2, 1918, when the family lived at Valparaiso, Ind. After his death, Mrs. Cunningham and the children moved to Gary where all of the other deaths occurred.

AMERICAN AID IN AMUNDSEN SEARCH DESIRED BY OSLO

NEW YORK, June 4.—A suggestion for American and French co-operation in the search for the missing Amundsen-Ellsworth polar flying expedition is made in dispatches from Oslo, the Norwegian capital.

Two Norwegian seaplanes under the command of Lieutenant Lutro Holm, are being shipped to Spitzbergen on a steamer which expects to leave the Horten air base near Oslo tomorrow.

The Norwegian suggestion, which thus far does not appear to have any official backing is that Lieutenant Holm operate from Spitzbergen to East Greenland; Donald B. McMillan, American explorer from Etah to Cape Columbia and Dr. Jean Chateau, French explorer, along the east Greenland coast.

Commander MacMillan heads the all-American expedition, which is leaving Boston for the north this month.
