3 EUGENE BOYS ENLIST IN NAVY

Three more Eugene boys have enlisted with the United States navy, and will select their own trades to receive training while in the service, reports L. R. Swalla, United States navy recruiting officer today.

Lawrence Hayes has signed up for electrical instruction, and will specialize in radio—one of the attractive offers made by the navy to its recruits. He expects to go to school at the big electrical school maintained by the navy at San Diego, Cal.

W. E. Wray and Ronald C. Myers have both signed for duty on one of the navy's big battleships. They have not elected the trade in which they will be trained, but will take their time to make the choice after they get into the service.

Inquiries from a large number of young men have been answered on this trip by Mr. Swalla, who also is accompanied by his wife. His office is at the Hoffman hotel, where he is supplied with all the detailed information about the navy, including movements of its big vessels, the 55 trades from which an applicant may select training, and the opportunities to see the world at the expense of Uncle Sam.

SUIT IS OPENED AGAINST EUGENE

Intercession in the suit of Ulysses Flourney and Nellie Flourney against the city of Eugene to quiet title to a strip of land on Ferry street has been made by E. S. Rolfe through his attorney, Fred E. Smith, who today filed a complaint as intervenor.

The case involved a strip of land 80 by 27.2 feet and the plaintiffs ask for a court decree to quiet title to the land. It is alleged by the intervenor that this strip of land is a part of the right-of-way for Ferry street and that as the city of Eugene refuses to contest the case and that this may give clear title to the land to the plaintiffs that the intervenor suit has been started.

In the complaint filed by Mr. Rolfe he states that the street was platted prior to 1884, and that it is 60 feet wide and that if the plaintiffs in the action are allowed title to the land that this will cut the width of the street to 24 feet, and this will cause depreciation to the value of property owned by Mr. Rolfe and hamper ingress and egress to his property and a number of other property owners on Ferry street south of Third avenue toward the mill race.

Application for Road Dismissed

Dismissal of the application for a new road in the Coburg district as contained on a petition recently filed has been ordered by the county court. A remonstrance petition containing 42 names was filed with the court in opposition to the new county route. When a remonstrance petition contains more signatures than a petition requesting that a new route be established the court decided against the plan. The petition listed the proposed road as the Grant Gray route.
