

LEVI ANKENY, JR., SECRETLY MARRIED

Levi Ankeny, Jr., grandson of the late Senator Ankeny of Washington, was married in Dallas, Oregon, two months ago to Blanche Kirsta Corbett, daughter of a former Princeton, Ind., business man and niece of R. B. Smith, former chairman of the Oregon state highway commission. It was revealed today upon an investigation of a report from Walla Walla, Washington, when it was found that a license had been granted to Levi Ankeny, Jr., and Blanche Corbett, 18, on April 17, and that they were married the same day at the Presbyterian church by Rev. J. E. Youel.

Mr. Ankeny, a junior in pre-law at the University of Oregon, admitted the marriage when questioned. This is his first marriage, but he and his bride had planned to keep it a secret until the university closed. Following the end of the university term Mr. Ankeny will receive his commission as second lieutenant in the reserves, and will leave for Camp Lewis. His young bride is at present in Walla Walla, where she is attending the high school. Mr. and Mrs. Ankeny, where he will be later. According to the press, Mr. Ankeny will complete his college work. He attended the University of Washington one year. He is a member of the Chi Psi fraternity.

ALICE DAY IS NEW SENNETT STAR

Manager Who Once Starred Mabel Normand Says Alice is Very Wonderful

HOLLYWOOD, June 4.—Mark Sennett has found a new girl star and a new type of comedy.

Only once before in all motion picture history has this master comedy producer starred a girl. She was Mabel Normand, now in retirement and undecided about a screen return.

His new star is Alice Day, diminutive, shy and sweet.

"There is no limit to Miss Day's possibilities," says Sennett. "Either in dramatic parts or comedy roles, she will go far. Appeal, looks, character, willingness and intelligence, these I confidently predict, will soon rate her among the screen's leading luminaries."

Sennett has starred many men: Charlie and Syd Chaplin, Charlie Murray, Ben Turpin, Ford Sterling and others too numerous to mention. Also many girls destined for stardom have received their initial engagements upon his lot: Gloria Swanson, Bebe Daniels, Louise Fazenda, Marie Prevost and Mabel Normand. But only the latter was ever starred by him, until the advent of Alice Day.

With the acquisition of Miss Day, Sennett decided upon production of a new type of comedy in addition to those for which he is famous. Slapstick, burlesque, impossible makeups, long chases—the earmarks of Sennett's past product—are to be eschewed unless strictly inherent in the story. The latter is to predominate, centering around a live interest, and unraveling in approved dramatic fashion but in comedy vein.

The story of Miss Day's elevation to stardom is, in modified form, a new Betty Bronson episode.

One day, almost entirely unknown, she was chosen for a part with possibilities in Norma Talmadge's "Secrets." From there she went to the Sennett lot, and was given a bit which consisted of doing no more than walking on and handing a paper to a more important character.

In the projection room, Sennett, viewing the film, exclaimed: "Who is that?" And added, "If she can do bigger parts that well, I'm going to star her."

The picture which was to test Miss Day's possibilities is "Love and Kisses," a two-reeler soon to be released.

It satisfied Sennett fully, and so the name of Alice Day was added to the list of potential stars.

The story was written for Miss Day, and with an eye upon the new type of comedy Sennett believes in demand.

Thus a wide range of test is given the star. First she is our American equivalent of a slave. From this she graduates into finery and ruffles. In both she demonstrates her appeal. She is pretty and cute and, as Sennett declares, "the type of girl men want to marry, which, after all, is the one they like best and longest."

Michigan Normal And University Men Have Battle

SPRINGFIELD, Mich., June 4.—(P)—A ducking given three University of Michigan students Tuesday night by a group of Michigan State Normal school seniors had its aftermath last night when 150 university men and a few women from State Normal used a free-for-all, no decision fight at the campus here.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 4.—With 60 Oregon reviews—four of which are new since last year—represented in the assembly, the Women's Benefit association opened its annual two-day state convention today.

Moose Convention Opens in Spokane

SPokane, Wash., June 4.—Some 3,000 members of the Loyal Order of Moose and the women of Mooseheart from Washington, Oregon, Idaho and British Columbia, gathered here today for their annual convention, heard Governor Harney in an address of welcome in which he offered himself to the Canadian visitors as an example of "what happens to you when you leave there and come to the United States."

64 DEAD IS TOLL OF HEAT IN EAST

places, from the greatest heat in many years.

Continuation of high temperatures, prevalent from the Rockies to the Atlantic ocean for several days, was forecast by the weather observers for at least 45 hours longer at many points. Particularly were the middle Atlantic states, where the heat had been most intense the last day or two and the southern states due to have the heat wave with them.

Only Kansas, of the middle west commonwealths, was favored in the weather bureau's prognostications.

Showers and thunderstorms, the weather man said, are to be the order in every state from Michigan and in to Montana and Wyoming.

Iowa, whose famed "fall corn" is not yet tall enough to stand up under such violent rain and windstorms as have hit that state this week, received the forecast with apprehension. It has had more of the disturbances of late than probably any other central state and just last night another severe wind and rain storm struck western Iowa.

While the Midwest had several deaths due to storms during the past 24 hours, in addition to several others previously, the east announced a death toll of 12 in three days, due to heat and prostrations.

STORM DAMAGE HIGH

OMAHA, Neb., June 4.—Seven injured and \$100,000 property damage.

was the score of the elements yesterday, when, for the third successive day violent windstorms, called baby tornadoes in the Missouri valley, swept across northwest Omaha, leveling trees, houses and wires.

While the death toll in Nebraska of the three day's debauch of the storm king stood at 4 and the injured numbered over a score, additional reports of violent weather continued to reach Omaha. Midwest and State, Neb., and other isolated points reported wind and rain.

Three deaths near Madison, Neb., Tuesday and one at Orchard, Neb., the same day comprised the fatalities. Yesterday's storm unroofed and in some cases, caused several houses.

DEATH REPORTED

NEW YORK, June 4.—(P)—One death and six prostrations were the toll of the heat wave for the first few hours this morning as New York sweated through its fourth consecutive day of stifling weather. Beginning at sunrise the temperature mounted steadily, while a haze like humidity blanketed the city. At 11 a. m. the thermometer stood at 84.

marines aboard, bound for Shanghai, the U. S. S. Jason departed from the Cavite naval station today. The gunboat Sacramento, now at Hong Kong, has been ordered to Shanghai also.

SITUATION SERIOUS

WASHINGTON, June 4.—(P)—Disturbances in Shanghai and Canton have been extended to include Shanghai, where the situation is reported today to the state department as "serious but under control."

Vice-Consul Carl D. Meinhardt telegraphed from Shanghai that students of all the schools there had gone out on strike as a result of the Shanghai incidents. The students declared a boycott against British and Japanese, and many private businesses were demolished in the streets Tuesday.

Consul-General Cunningham at Shanghai reported that a strike of waiters occurred today at the Astor house and other Shanghai hotels and at the Shanghai club.

Domestic servants, he said, were leaving their employers.

The Great Eastern and Harlington hotels in Shanghai were searched on Wednesday and munitions and "considerable Bolshevik literature" the officials said, were found in some of the rooms. All public wharves with the exception of the Bell and Jardine Hutchison piers were closed on account of the strike. Chinese banks in Shanghai have been closed for two days.

STRIKE INCREASES

SHANGHAI, June 4.—(P)—The strike in the Japanese cotton mills which was the cause of the rioting here is spreading but no further attacks on foreigners are reported.

The strikers are now estimated to

number 10,000, most of them the "coolie class."

Police today raided several suspected Bolshevik nests, made several arrests and seized quantities of literature.

Although the strike is spreading, the majority of the workers are reported to be making efforts to induce them to quit work.

JAPANESE ACTIVE

TOKYO, June 4.—(P)—The Japanese government today ordered the small cruiser Tatsuta from Saigo to Shanghai with 200 marines for duty there in connection with the disturbances in the Chinese city. The cruiser was under orders to sail late this afternoon.

Before the decision was reached to send troops to Shanghai, a government spokesman said the situation there "having become aggravated, the government intends to take the necessary steps to meet the circumstances."

Noted Astronomer Of France is Dead

PARIS, June 4.—Camille Flammarion, the noted French astronomer, is dead.

Camille Flammarion, the French poet-astronomer, made astronomy popular to the layman. He wrote several astronomical facts, but while he was not known from the layman some of his serious-minded contemporaries in the study of astronomy attacked many of his theories as pure fantasy.

He was the founder, however, of the famous observatory at Suresne and of the Astronomical Society of France. His books include "Marché of the Heavens," "Popular Astronomy," and "Mysticisms of the Cosmos."

In October, 1920, when in his 78th year, M. Flammarion married Miss Gabrielle Henssler, who collaborated with him on the writing of some of his best known works.

LOCAL MAN ASKED TO DIRECT TRIAL

C. R. Clark, Boy Scout executive of Eugene, has been invited by the national council of Boy Scouts to direct the work on the Eagle trail in Yellowstone national park for two weeks in August, according to a letter received by Mr. Clark from the regional office in Spokane today.

The invitation will be submitted to the local scout council tomorrow at the regular meeting of the executive board.

The Eagle trail will be built by 40 scouts, picked from various troops throughout the northwest. The Eagle rank is the highest rank in the scout organization, and while there are no Eagle scouts in the local troops, several are expected by the end of this year's summer camp.

After the scouts' arrival at the park they are under no expense whatever. The national park pays for their right seeing, food, campfires, tents, food, supplies and transportation. The trail work will start at the lower falls of the Yellowstone and follow the east rim of the canyon. The work will probably be limited to about 40 young men, who will be selected from ranking troops of the northwest.

Moore Trial Open On Fraud Charges

The next criminal case on the criminal court docket which is expected to be started this afternoon is that of the state against Pat Moore charged with obtaining money under false pretenses. An inspector of the immigration office was here recently to investigate the Moore case as it is said that he is a Canadian citizen as well as his wife who has been taken care of by the county for a time since her husband has been in jail. A jury to try the case was being empaneled late this afternoon.
