Answer us this: With the Shrine full of husky, upstanding young nobles, why are the temple patrols always made up of fat, old ones?

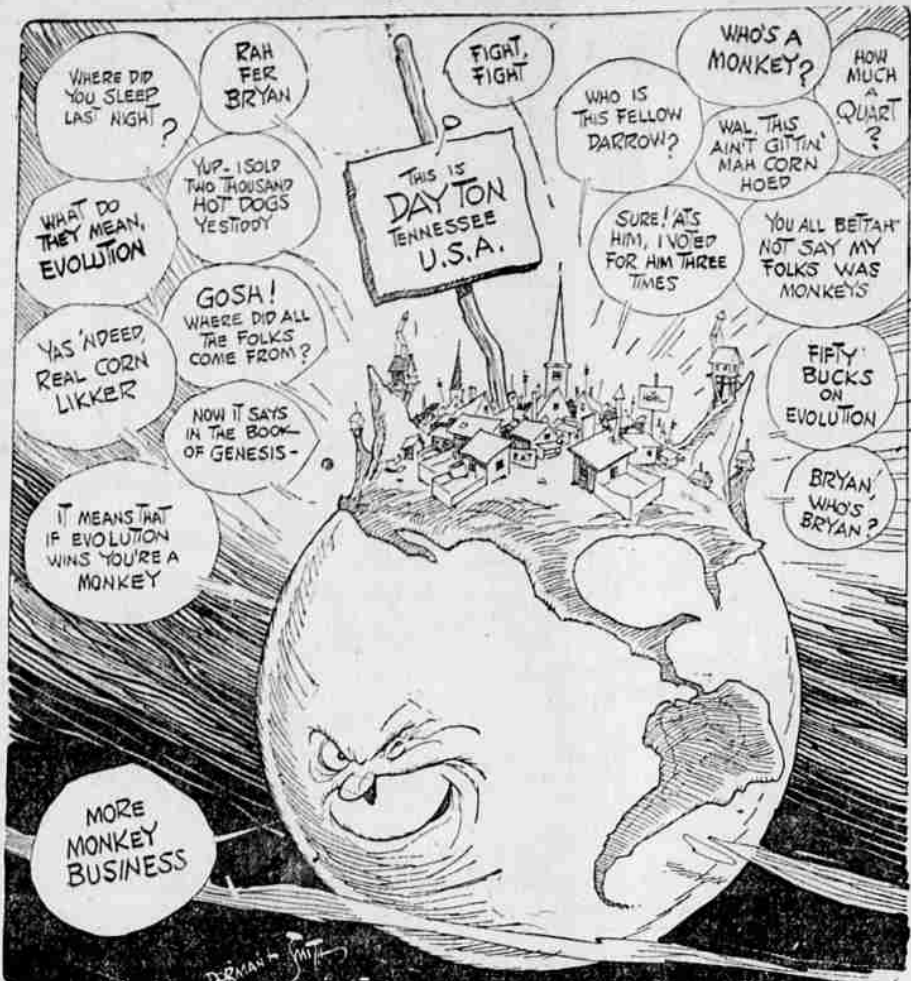

Miss Mercy Applegate who is a teacher in the public schools of Boise, Idaho, has returned home.

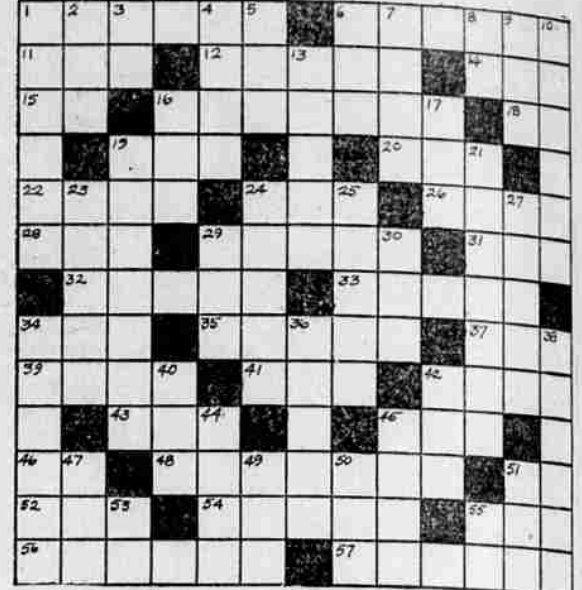
G. W. Griffin went to Portland to attend the wedding of Miss Carrie Matlock of this city and George F. Roundbush of St. Louis.
