

EARWIG IS HERE; BATTLE AGAINST INSECT TO START

"The pesky earwig is here, several thousand strong!"

This was the emphatic statement made today by E. R. Parks, mayor, on a visit to the northwest section of the city this morning revealed the fact that this vicious insect was already gaining a foothold there, and that drastic measures would have to be taken at once to prevent a general earwig epidemic, says Mr. Parks. A single old sack on a vacant lot was found to be the home of over a thousand of the pests, it is reported.

The city has a drastic ordinance on earwig destruction, and this will be strictly enforced, says Mr. Parks, although he believes that people will take enough interest in the campaign to use all possible means to exterminate the insects.

A large quantity of poison has been received by local drug stores, and will be sold at cost, it is announced. At least 25 pounds of this should be ap-

plied to each lot in order to be effective, it is said. Prompt removal of all trash piles and overgrown shrubbery is absolutely essential to the extermination of earwigs, city officials say, and all owners of vacant lots are urged to clean them up at once. "The earwig must be exterminated now, or in a few days it will be too late," says Mr. Parks. "This is one of the worst pests that could come to a city. Unless absolutely killed off, these insects will do thousands of dollars worth of damage in a few weeks, besides making many sections of the city undesirable for residential purposes."

MORE HEAT FORESEEN

CHICAGO, June 5.—(AP)—After nearly a week of continued torrid weather, the middle west today gave up hope of an immediate drop in temperature. Having yesterday withdrawn his prediction of showers throughout this territory as far west as the Rockies, the weather man

again posted the familiar summer forecast—"Continued warm" for virtually all central states.

He said that possibly there would be local showers in Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska and Wisconsin, but indicated that they would not bring any appreciable change in temperature. The heat fatality toll jumped every hour.

101 AT BALTIMORE

BALTIMORE, June 5.—(AP)—The temperature continued to mount here today. The official record at 2 p. m. was 101, breaking all heat records here for June.

Schools closed at noon and shops worked on half time. Four prostrations were reported.

THREE PROSTRATED

ST. LOUIS, June 5.—(AP)—The intense heat prevalent throughout the section indirectly caused the death of one person and prostrated three others here yesterday and today.

TWO ODIE IN MICHIGAN

DETROIT, June 5.—(AP)—Two more deaths from heat in Michigan were reported today, bringing to nine the number of fatalities in the state.

Seven more prostrations also were reported, several of the victims, aged persons, being reported in serious condition.

FIVE DEATHS REPORTED

PHILADELPHIA, June 5.—(AP)—Five deaths from heat were reported here today making a total of 11 since the torrid wave struck Philadelphia Monday.

At 3 p. m. the weather bureau thermometer registered 99.
