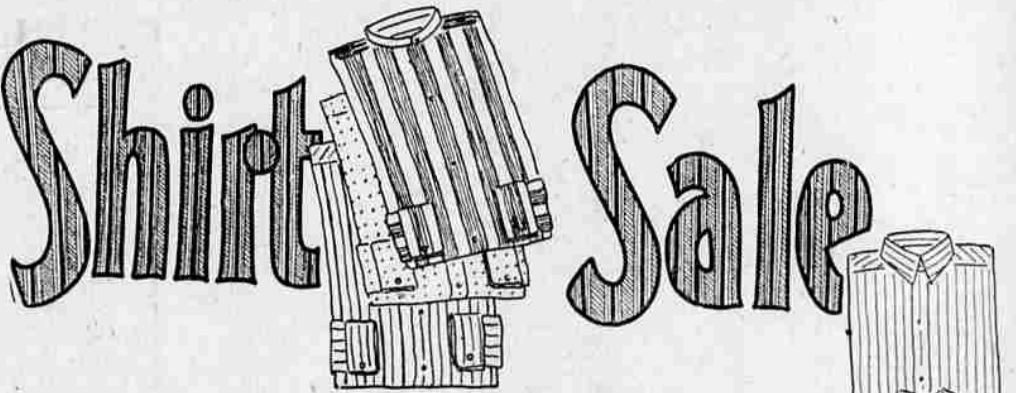

JACK M'GUIRE WINS FIFTH IN ORATORY

Jack McGuire, of the University of Oregon, placed fifth in the national oratorical contest held last night at Los Angeles, according to a wire received today from Oscar Brown, forensic coach, who accompanied McGuire on the trip. McGuire will share in the \$3,000 prize offered in this competition.

The Oregon man placed first in the Pacific coast division, at the semifinals held at Palo Alto a few weeks ago. This entitled him to participate in the national contest, as well as giving him the Pacific coast title. He competed against six other speakers representing different sections of the United States.

McGuire was the only freshman entered in the competition, it is stated, and his presentation was warmly praised. Dwight E. Baker, of Northwestern university, won first in the contest. It was announced, Oregon prize winners were: William R. Ryan, St. Edwards university; Edward F. Barrett, Canisius college; J. Duane Squires, North Dakota, and Clarence M. Gifford, Wesleyan.

June 15 set as day For Hotel Opening

June 15 has been set as the official opening date of the new Eugene hotel, it is announced. A banquet and dinner dance will feature the first day. It is stated the dining room will comfortably seat 400 persons at a time.

The final work on the interior of the building is being rushed, and the furnishings are also being installed. Everything will be open to the general public for inspection on the opening day, it is announced.

GEORGE GEARHANT DIES HARRISBURG, June 6.—(Special.)—George Gearhart, who died in Harrisburg Tuesday night, was a resident of this place and the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Baumgartner. Long time residents here, Mr. Gearhart served in the World war and was gassed, the effects of which caused his demise. He came here with his parents about two years ago and in March of last year was married to Miss Mabel Baumgartner. He was 29 years old.

Camp Made Ready For Oregon Guard

Extensive preparations are under way at Camp Jackson, Medford, making the site ready for the annual encampment of the Oregon national guard which starts the latter part of next week, according to Sergeant L. Vaughn, United States army instructor of the Eugene units of the state guard. Sergeant Vaughn has just returned after visiting the camp and reports that the tents for the housing of the troops are being erected and that all will be ready for the invasion of the Oregon guard. About 125 to 150 officers and men will attend the camp from Eugene leaving here on the special troop train at 10:45 Thursday evening, June 11.
