During the coming two or three weeks several Eugeneans depart on itineraries abroad. Some plan to be gone only during the summer months while others expect to be gone for a year or more.

Miss Grace Knopp is to leave Eugene about June 15 or 16 for New York where on June 27 she will sail for Paris with a party of others. From there they will go to Spain. Later a trip will be taken to southern Spain. Miss Knopp plans to return to Madrid where she will take up advanced work in courses sponsored by the University of Madrid for foreigners. She expects to be gone perhaps as late as March or later.

Dean and Mrs. Colin V. Dymont announce that they will leave here June 29, sailing from New York July 25 for Europe. Included in their trip will be cities of interest in Czechoslovakia and Austria. They plan to be gone about a year.

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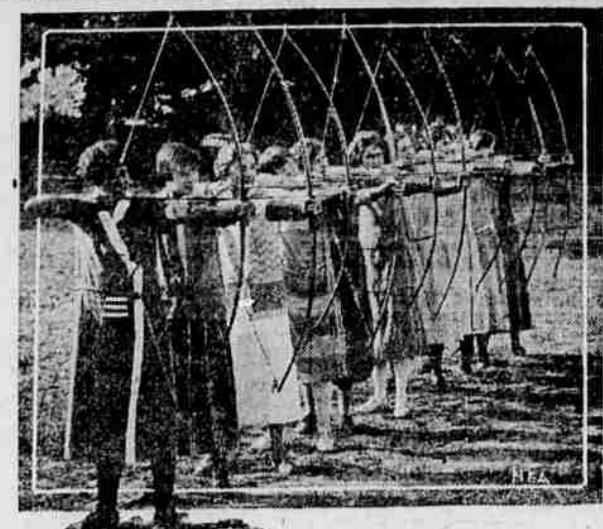
