

### TWO ARE STABBED BY JEALOUS MAN

Two persons are in the Pacific Christian hospital with injuries received from a man crazed by jealousy, on the Pacific highway near Springfield Saturday night.

Harry Brink of Springfield was stabbed in the neck and his jugular vein punctured, while his companion, Mrs. Flossie Hurd, was cut about the head and back by the knife wielded by John Sollowack, alleged by officers to have been a rejected suitor of Mrs. Hurd. Her husband committed suicide here about a year ago.

The three were motoring from Springfield to Eugene, with Mr. Brink at the wheel. Sollowack, it was related, suddenly leaped forward and began to carve the couple in the front seat. The auto ran off the road into a ditch and the injured persons, who fell out of the car, were picked up and brought to Eugene by Virgil Signer, Eli Signor and Russell Stewart, passing motorists.

Search is still being made for Sollowack, who escaped after the stabbing. Both victims will recover, it is stated at the hospital.
