McLean Suit is Opened in Court

To recover \$700 alleged due as the result of a real estate deal recently the case of George N. McLean versus C. P. Devereaux opened in circuit court this morning before Judge E. T. Skipworth. The plaintiff alleges

that he contracted with the defendant to sell a certain piece of property for \$1500 and paid a commission of \$100 on this. Later he alleges that he found the property had been sold for \$2100 and the additional \$600 and the commission of \$100 is now asked in the suit.

Two Balloons are Lost in Landing

BOULOGNE, France, June 8.—(AP)—The British balloon Elsie, participant in the Gordon Bennett cup race, was destroyed in landing today when its guide rope caught on a moving freight train, crashing the balloon on the tracks. The pilot was unhurt but a passenger was slightly injured.

PLUNGES INTO SEA BRUSSELS, June 8.—(AP)—The Spanish balloon Hespero Susana fell in the North Sea. Pilot De La Rocha and Senor Lopez, a passenger, were rescued by a passing trawler. The balloon was lost.

AMERICAN LANDS BRUSSELS, June 8.—One of the two American balloons entered in the Gordon Bennett cup race, the S-14, piloted by Lieutenants Flood and McCormick, landed safely at 3:20 this morning, near Trepport, France, 17 miles from Dieppe.

Four other balloons, the Ciampino, Italian; Maroz, French; Duro, Spanish, and an unnamed balloon piloted by the Spanish captain, Penderanda have also landed in France safely.

Powder Stolen From Magazine

Report was made at the office of Sheriff Taylor this afternoon that some time since Friday morning the lock on the door of the Budd Komp powder magazine near this city was broken off and three boxes of 20 per cent stumping powder were stolen. The boxes each weigh 50 pounds and contain one by eight sticks. It is believed that the powder was stolen by eggs and that it is intended to be mailed and "soup" used in safe blowing, made from it.

New Bonus Ruling Announced Today

If a veteran having an adjusted service credit of \$50 or less dies after making application but before he has received payment, the amount of his adjusted service credit is payable as soon as possible in a lump sum to his dependents, according to a decision received by Miss Grace Norton, secretary of the Eugene chapter of the American Red Cross.

The payment is made to dependents in the following order of preference: Widow, if unmarried, children, mother, father. This is true even though he may have named someone else as beneficiary.

If a veteran having an adjusted service credit of more than \$50 dies after making application, the amount of his certificate will be paid to the designated beneficiary in a lump sum.

Section Hands are Crushed in Wreck

PERU, Ind., June 8.—(AP)—Several section hands were reported to have been crushed to death today when an east-bound Chesapeake and Ohio freight train overtook near Converse, Ind.

Ambulances were being sent to bring the dead and injured here. First reports were that 18 men had been crushed by the toppling train.

The section men had been repairing the track and had retired into a ditch at the side of the track, while the train was passing.

Actors' Strike Holds up Show

MEDFORD, Ore., June 8.—According to a telegram received here by the local theater management today, Miss Jane Cowl, who was to have appeared here tonight in "Roméo and Juliet," will not be able to leave San Francisco owing to an actors' strike in that city.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 8.—Louis O. Maclean, theatrical manager of San Francisco and Los Angeles, announced here yesterday that he will dispose of his active producing enterprise on the Pacific coast until he has reached a settlement with the Actors Equity association, which Saturday night prevented the final performance of a two week's run here of "Roméo and Juliet" under his management with Jane Cowl starring.

The action in calling the strike was

taken by Theodore Hall, attorney and western representative of the Equity association, who asserted Mr. Maclean had abandoned rehearsals of another play in which Miss Cowl was to star and which was to have had virtually the same cast as that of the Shakespearean production without paying the actors the two weeks wages called for by the Equity contracts.

Wounded Bandit's Arms may be Saved

PORTLAND, Ore., June 8.—The condition of Alva R. Kilbourn, 24, who is at a hospital here suffering from wounds in his arms, received in a pistol battle at Bothell, Wash., on Friday, after the bank holdup there, was "not very good." It was reported by attendants this morning. Infection had developed in the wounds. It was reported yesterday, and amputation of the left arm was considered. No operation has been performed this morning up to 10:15. It was said at the hospital.

Dr. Fred J. Ziegler, who is attending Kilbourn said at noon today that he believed both arms could be saved. The wounds in the right arm are superficial and are healing. The infection in the left arm in which the elbow is shattered had improved this morning and circulation was being restored, so that the doctor thought an operation would not be necessary.

The plaintiff sues for \$10,000 damages as the result of alleged alienation of the affections of her husband by the defendant. Potter, Foster and Immel represent the plaintiff and Brownell and Brooks appear for the defendant.

Chilean Uprising Reported Crushed

SANTIAGO, Chile, June 8.—(AP)—The uprising in the northern provinces has been crushed by the Chilean troops, and official communique announced.

"Owing to the resistance of subversives," the communique adds, "thirty of them were killed and a number wounded. The leader of the revolt is among the dead."

"Four hundred prisoners were taken to Iquique, capital of the province of Tarapaca. The troops sustained no casualties."
