Scouts to Hike--

An all-city Boy Scout hike, in which more than 100 scouts are expected to participate, will be held Saturday morning from the city hall. It was announced today from scout headquarters. The route to be taken by the hikers will be kept a secret, according to officials, who promise to make the hike for the boys making the trip. Scoutmasters who will be in charge of the hike will be expected to get away for the day will be expected to hike with the boys. Scouts are asked to bring a supply of raw meat, wafers being talios, a supply of raw potatoes and a canteen of water, together with bread, butter, sandwiches, cake, etc., as desired. The hike will be made from the city hall at 9 o'clock, and the scout who arrives five minutes late will not only be late to join his comrades, but will not know where to go.

Maps to Use Maps--

Organization charts for fighting forest fires in the Cascade national forest this summer are now being prepared by the various district rangers of the forest. These charts contain lists of men available for crews, as well as material and equipment. The maps will also be installed at the district offices of the forest, showing by means of colored tracks the positions of men and equipment during the course of a fire. When a crew is moved from one place to another the corresponding track is moved on the map, giving the district ranger a complete picture of the fire situation in his section at all times.

Chamber Gets Inquiries--

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TERMINAL IS OFFERED

SECURITY PACT CONCORD LENDS JOY TO LEAGUE

Entrance of Germany Into League One of Steps Now Necessary

Great Britain Throws Her Power Behind Four Power Pact

GENEVA, June 9.—(AP)—European peace and security seemed almost an accomplished fact to the league of nations group today, with France and Great Britain finally agreed on a past program.

England's great war strength is thrown behind a four power pact to guarantee the inviolability of the Rhine frontiers as delimited by the Versailles treaty.

The other participants, besides France, would be Belgium and Germany, provided Germany agrees to the conditions.

Fellows German Proposal

The agreement which was announced yesterday is the outcome of the proposal recently made by Germany and the ensuing negotiations between the British and French, culminating in the meeting here this week of Austen Chamberlain, the British foreign secretary and M. Briand, the French minister.

Great Britain, it is understood, undertakes to come to France's support with her entire naval, military and air forces in the event of any aggression across the Rhine district.

This is an elaboration of the Versailles treaty obligation regarding the sanctity of the demilitarized zone along the Franco-German border.

The British, however, adhere to their refusal to extend the guarantee to the eastern frontiers of Germany for the reason, it is declared, that the dominions would hardly support such a commitment on the part of the London government.

League Entry Necessary

Conclusion of the pact is conditional upon Germany's entry into the league of nations. The next step, now that an agreement has been reached among the interested allied powers will be the dispatch of a reply by France to Germany's past proposal on behalf of herself, Great Britain and Belgium. It will then be up to the Germans to decide whether the terms are acceptable.

Italy was not included in the agreement because of her distance from the Rhine, but the text of the agreement will be transmitted to her as a matter of courtesy and leave her free to make a separate agreement with the other powers.

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Gains Much Advice

MR. SCOPES GIVEN PLENTY OF ADVICE ON TRIAL CONDUCT

NEW YORK, June 9.—(AP)—John T. Scopes, young Dayton, Tenn., high school teacher, has found himself the subject of all sorts of advice from New York liberals as to the conduct of his trial next month for violating the Tennessee law against teaching of evolution.

While he favors accepting offers of aid from Clarence Darrow, Chicago criminal lawyer and Dudley Field Malone, New York, others urged the selection of Charles Evans Hughes, former secretary of state, who recently returned to the practice of law here, United States senator George Wharton Pepper of Pennsylvania was also suggested.

Plainly Bewildered.

At a luncheon of the Civil Liberties union, which has guaranteed his financial backing, Scopes was plainly bewildered. He insisted that he was to be the final arbiter in the choice of counsel to assist John R. Neal, former dean of the University of Tennessee, his friend and chief counsel.

Speakers at the luncheon opposed Darrow and Malone and argued that outside counsel should be a man who religious views could not be attacked by fundamentalists.

Speaks Three Times.

Scopes spoke three times in reply to various suggestions. He said he considered Darrow an agnostic and as such would not prejudice any fair minded juror. He called himself an agnostic, devoutly religious in his own way.

When no decision had been reached in the matter of counsel late last night, Mr. Hughes was advised. Supporters of the former secretary of state argued that Darrow's selection would inflame the Leopold-Loebl murder case into the trial and put a club in the hands of William Jennings Bryan of counsel for the prosecution.

Darrow defended Leopold and Loeb and probably saved them from the death penalty for the murder of Baby Face Nelson in Chicago.

Mr. Hughes Favored.

Bryan in his speeches has held up the youthful slayers as "specimens of the evils of over-education." Advocates of Mr. Hughes' selection believe he would accept.

Scopes indicated his willingness to accept any assistance which means the approval of the Civil Liberties union. To that end a sub-committee of the union will confer today with him, Darrow, Malone and Neal.

"I want this to be an open-making case," he said, "and I don't want anything to spoil it."

Richard Loeb is Greatly Improved

CHICAGO, June 9.—Richard Loeb, one of the slayers of Robert Frank, who became subject to post-infection delirium following an attack of measles, improved greatly yesterday, according to his physicians at the prison hospital at Joliet. They reported he was free of delirium and that the slayer, who had held him to his bed, was removed.

RESOLUTION OF COUNCIL CALLS SPECIAL VOTE

Site For Southern Pacific Terminal Here Embodied In Plans

Election Will be Held on Tuesday, August 18, is Announcement

Resolution passed at the meeting of the city council last night calling for a special election to vote on charter amendments that will assure the purchase of a site for the proposed Southern Pacific railroad terminals and shops provides for a vote on the proposition Tuesday, August 18.

The resolution follows:

Be it resolved, by the common council of the city of Eugene, Oregon, that there be submitted to the electors of the city for their approval or rejection at a special election to be held in said city on August 18, 1925, the annexed proposed charter amendment, entitled:

"An act to amend the charter of the city of Eugene, Oregon, by adding a new chapter thereto, authorizing and empowering the common council of said city to acquire, by purchase, condemnation, or otherwise, within and without the city of Eugene, Oregon, any and all real estate, right of way, easements and licenses, to be used for municipal railway terminals, municipal belt line railroad, municipal parks, and any other municipal purposes, and to issue and sell the negotiable bonds of the city in the sum of \$175,000, or so much thereof as shall be necessary for such purposes, and to expend the proceeds in payment thereof."

Be it further resolved, that the following is the form and numbers in which the question of the adoption or rejection of such proposed amendment will be submitted to the electors of said city on the official ballot:

Proposed by resolution of the common council of the city of Eugene, Oregon, and referred to the electors: Shall the charter of the city of Eugene, Oregon, be amended authorizing the common council to acquire real estate and such other property and rights within and without said city as may be necessary or desirable, for municipal railway terminals, municipal belt line railroad, municipal parks and other municipal purposes, and to issue and sell the negotiable bonds of said city in sums not exceeding \$175,000 for such purposes?

SHALL THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF EUGENE, OREGON, BE AMENDED AUTHORIZING THE COMMON COUNCIL TO ACQUIRE REAL ESTATE AND SUCH OTHER PROPERTY AND RIGHTS WITHIN AND WITHOUT SAID CITY AS MAY BE NECESSARY OR DESIRABLE, FOR MUNICIPAL RAILWAY TERMINALS, MUNICIPAL BELT LINE RAILROAD, MUNICIPAL PARKS AND OTHER MUNICIPAL PURPOSES, AND TO ISSUE AND SELL THE NEGOTIABLE BONDS OF SAID CITY IN SUMS NOT EXCEEDING \$175,000 FOR SUCH PURPOSES?

BERKELEY, Cal., June 9.—(AP)—A ten year old boy's stomach has revealed to the Berkeley police the maximum gastronomic capacity of an American youth. Confessing the theft of \$30 from a bakery to his mother and then to the police in explanation of certain severe pains with which he was stricken, he gave his menu of sweets for a single day. It included a meal in a restaurant, peanut brittle, a hot dog, hamburger sandwich, soda pop, a chili pickle, salted potato chips, bananas, two ice cream sandwiches, a sack of peanuts, gum, a whole mince pie, root beer, two all day suckers, three cream puffs, one butter horn and assorted candies. A picture show and the purchase of three tops accounted for the balance of the \$30 which he spent of the stolen money.

CHINESE FIRE ON AMERICANS; ONE WOMAN INJURED

NEW YORK, June 9.—(AP)—A dispatch to the Evening Post today from Hongkong said four Americans in a launch flying the American flag had been fired on by Yunnanese at Canton, China.

The party, composed of Frank Crompton, head of an American contracting firm at Hongkong and Montgomery Ogden, bursar of the Canton Christian College, and their wives, was endeavoring to cross the river at Canton from Honan Island to Shamoen, the foreign settlement, when the firing started.

Mrs. Crompton was wounded in the arm. The others of the party were injured by splinters of glass. The firing continued thirty minutes and compelled the party to return to Honan and take shelter in the Canton Christian college, the Evening Post said.

Crompton was said to have told friends the anti-foreign feeling was intense and that he hoped the United States would intervene.

CRUISER LANDS SHANGHAI

SHANGHAI, June 9.—(AP)—The British cruiser Hawkins arrived at Wusung, the port of Shanghai today. Her departure for Singapore has been postponed indefinitely.

WORKER IS KILLED

SHANGHAI, June 9.—(AP)—Chinese volunteers today fired on Chinese workers in a Belgian mill for refusal to join the general strike, killing one and wounding several others.

STRIKE AGGRAVATED

SHANGHAI, June 9.—(AP)—The situation created by the strike of dock workers has become aggravated through the decision of the Chinese seamen to join the movement. Three hundred men on six privately owned coastal and river steamers walked out today.

Southern Pacific Company to Locate Division Facilities Here If Land for Site is Furnished

Bank Presidents Of City Pleased

Eugene bank presidents speaking on behalf of their associates in the financial institutions of the city are a unit in expressing their opinion that this city is on the threshold of the greatest single development in the way of industry ever offered. This opportunity must be grasped now, at once, too much delay and over-conservative caution may defeat every effort and the loss to the community will be keenly felt for many years, they declare.

The following statements were made today by the presidents of the three local banks, men who are versant with the railroad situation here and what it means to this city:

"Time and effort have been given generously in the move to bring the railroad terminals and shops to this city and now it is put up to the community to display that spirit of progress that in the past has made a success of anything undertaken here. An appeal to the citizenry is being made to their share instantly and bring about this development that means so much to the future."

"Railroad enterprises are not established without years of forethought and a keen analysis of existing conditions. Eugene has been selected for this move of the Southern Pacific, at least it is being considered to the extent that outclosures are strongly favored, and the city as a whole should immediately give the fullest measure of support to those who have made it possible. Encouragement and an incentive should be made the rail company to go through with the plan that is now within the grasp of the community."

"Years of effort to bring to Eugene a large and permanent railroad industry are now bearing fruit and the city should do all in its power to see that this endeavor is not wasted. We must have these terminals and shops here, it means a lot to the future development of Eugene, the initial cost is nothing compared to the many years of future business progress that the plan carries."

Deaths From Heat

NEW YORK, June 9.—(AP)—Despite the drop in temperatures along the eastern seaboard heat deaths continue to accumulate. More than 427 persons have died in the east, during the heat wave.

While no deaths were reported in New York last night, Philadelphia's casualties increased by 24. An aged woman died in Hahoken, N. J., and insanity brought on by heat caused two other deaths. Three more heat deaths are reported in Ontario.

OREGON ON WAY

SEATTLE, Wash., June 9.—(AP)—The battleship Oregon, handsome with paint, was towed past here today from the Puget Sound navy yard, Bremerton, on her way to Portland, Ore., on the Willamette river, for a permanent berth as a historic relic.

Bond Issue for City Proposed as Means of Buying Land

The Southern Pacific company will locate its division terminals and carshops in Eugene, provided this city will furnish to the railroad company a suitable tract of land in the northwest edge of the city. The tract has already been selected and optioned. Carrying through of the project will mean an additional investment of upwards of a million by the Southern Pacific company here and the bringing in of at least 1000 employees.

This question was put squarely up to the city last night by simultaneous action of the chamber of commerce and the city council, when the first steps toward what is declared to be the biggest single industrial development in the history of the city were taken.

Options on a tract of land comprising 209 acres northwest of the city have been obtained through the efforts of the railroad committee of the chamber during the past several weeks and it is planned that this plot shall be conveyed to the Southern Pacific company in exchange for a tract of 275 acres owned by the company in the vicinity of Springfield.

A bond issue of \$175,000 for the purchase of the tract here will be voted on at a special election set for August 18, according to the terms of an ordinance passed at the meeting of the city council last night. The chamber of commerce at a special meeting last night went on record by unanimous vote of members present to support the development, and two resolutions, one ratifying the action of the rail committee in obtaining the options and the other supporting the proposed bond issue, were adopted enthusiastically.

The developments in the local rail situation which culminated last night are the outcome of vigorous effort on the part of the chamber of commerce railroad committee. Rumors prevalent in Eugene for the past few weeks concerning options being taken for the railroad company were fully explained by W. W. Calkins, president of the United States national bank and chairman of the committee.

The site of the proposed terminals is along the main line of the Southern Pacific south of the tracks extending west about three miles from the Blair boulevard "Y" to the vicinity of Aved station. The site is a long narrow strip with an average width of about 40 rods and is ideal for the purposes of terminals and shops such as are planned by the railroad here, it is stated. The site was carefully inspected by the committee engineers in company with the chamber railroad committee composed of Mr. Calkins, Carl G. Washburne, E. L. Chambers and B. B. Brundage.

"Gards on Table"

"Although there seemed to be much secrecy concerning the obtaining of these options, our cards were all on the table and in dealing with property owners there was no mystery as to what the purpose of the option was or what was intended if the contract to purchase shall be exercised."

Mr. Calkins in outlining the plan at the chamber meeting pointed out the value of having the railroad company enter its operations here, explained the need of community backing for this enterprise "the biggest single development in the industrial history of Eugene," told of the assurance of a site and the plan for exchange whereby the Southern Pacific officials would take over the tract offered by Eugene in exchange for the 275-acre site held near Springfield and which, according to former plans of the company, were held as a site for terminal facilities.

No Profits Involved

"No individual in any way was concerned in these preliminary plans for the bringing of the terminals here will reap any profit whatever," was the declaration of Mr. Calkins. "This is a community project, conceived by a group of men who for a number of years have looked into the future of railroad development in Eugene, and who with courage and confidence in the destiny of this city have brought the project to the point where the citizens of Eugene are asked either to give their backing to the plan and share in the general impetus that will be the result in business increase and rise in property values, or by their votes on the proposed bond issue declaring willingness to lose an opportunity that will perhaps not come again during the present generation."

"We are placing this question up to the chamber of commerce as the first step in obtaining city-wide endorsement of the project. We have the location for a large and prosperous city, we have a citizenry that firmly believes in the future, and now we are offered an opportunity of which we should take advantage."

"In a study of the Eugene rail situation it is necessary to go back a few years to the time when the city
