

HIGH PREMIUM IS PAID FOR EUGENE BONDS BY BUYERS

High value of Eugene city bonds was indicated last night at the city council meeting when \$355,000 in water improvement bonds were awarded to Portland firms for bids offering the largest premium in the city's history.

Ferris and Grady, and Halsey, Stuart and company, bidding jointly, offered \$1.35 per \$100 premium on the \$355,000 issue for Skinner water receiver and extension, and \$1.35 per \$100 additional on the \$200,000 issue for beginning construction on the new Lakeview water supply line.

Both issues bore interest at 4 1/2 per cent yearly.

McClain and Williams received the contract for paving Charnell street from Nineteenth to Twenty-fourth, for \$21,050.00, and High street, from Thirtieth to Sixteenth, for \$10,500.00.

Fairmount sewer work was let to Oscar Snow for \$8,570.75, and Charnell sewer for \$7,500.00. Mr. Snow also was given sewer construction jobs on First and Second avenues.

Major Morris Marquis was awarded sewer contracts for Second and Third avenues between Pearl and High, and between Beech and Emerald streets across the university campus.

Restriction of carnival was proposed by Dr. E. V. Stivers, speaking for the Lions club. An ordinance to this effect will be drawn up and submitted to the council, it was decided.

Major William G. White, national guard commander, asked for the remittance of \$440 license fee paid by the guard, to swell their mess fund at summer camp. He claimed the guardsmen had not made any money on the carnival, and lacked \$70.81 of paying expenses after paying the carnival a \$380.00 guarantee. The council voted to remit half the license money, or \$220.

An assistant building inspector may be employed by the city, according to two ordinances presented by electricians and plumbers, who wish to have someone oversee their work. They call for payment of \$100 yearly license fee by all firms doing electrical or plumbing work. The assistant will work under W. H. Alexander, present building inspector for the city.

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LABOR HOLDS UP WELL ON COAST

Employment at west coast centers held steady last week and except for common labor the demand and supply of help appear to be fairly well balanced, according to the weekly 41. employment survey received in Eugene 41 headquarters today. Loggers who recently have been laid off in considerable numbers have largely secured employment in other industries. It is stated, and many have migrated to the pine districts and to harvest fields of the southwest.

Large surplus of all kinds of labor is reported from the inland empire and many logging companies there have gone to the extent of posting notices that no men are needed. Condensed reports from various 41. employment service offices are as follows:

Calls for help at berry picking plants, both in Portland and in nearby districts, lead last week's demand for labor. No further shutdowns of Columbia river logging camps have been reported and labor turnover in industry has been small. Sawmill op-

eration here remains unchanged. Some new construction work has been started but the total number of new jobs offered has been insignificant.

There are more than enough men in Bend to fill all local jobs. Sawmills are operating two shifts and several small crews are busy on the new municipal paving work. Home building within the city is active but there is no shortage of help.
