CRISWELL, June 9.—(Special)—The 66th wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel F. Benedict of Criswell was quietly observed on May 31 at the home of their daughter, Mrs. R. A. Newhall. Many callers came to congratulate the couple.

Daniel F. Benedict was born at Crowlandville, Welling, Canada, on February 10, 1852. His parents had moved to Canada from Lincoln, Conn. His wife, Lauretta Doane Benedict, was also born at Crowlandville, Welling, Canada, on April 26, 1857, of pioneer English stock of the New Jersey region.

They were married at Manchester, New York, May 31, 1879. In 1884 they went to Illinois. Mr. Benedict working as machinery salesman, and farming until 1877, when they moved by covered wagon to what was then the territory of Dakota, living there until 1908, when they came to Criswell.

Five children are living, three having passed away in infancy. The living children are: Mrs. Helen Hackett of Eugene; Mrs. R. A. Newhall of Criswell; D. H. Benedict of Felida, Wash.; C. P. SOUTHERN PACIFIC TERMINAL SOUGHT

gon Electric line was pushed through from Portland to this city. This road looked big then and there was in Eugene a tendency to consider it of more importance than the present or future development of the Southern Pacific at that time. In 1912 owing to a number of economic causes there was a general slackening of business and the Oregon Electric did not meet the optimistic hopes of those who had forecast a general rise in business conditions and population as a result of the construction.

Later the plan of construction of the so-called Xetron cut-off of the Southern Pacific line was revived and this brought about a desire on the part of many in this city to have car shops and terminals here. Efforts along this line were for a time halted owing to the movement to have the Southern Pacific and the Central Pacific merged. This question, as it had a considerable bearing on the future of this city, drew the attention of the chamber of commerce and others who were active in the solution of the rail problems here and no definite results in the way of local development were delayed.

"With the starting of construction work on the Natron line and the near approach of the time when this will be completed, the situation is now in the desired phase where this city can go before the railroad officials and a definite offer looking to the location here of the terminals.

"The Southern Pacific payroll at present approximates \$100,000 a month in this city. This is an important factor in our business, and to retain it, as well as to bring about a definite offer looking to the location here of the terminals, the chamber of commerce railroad committee has taken the necessary steps on a site that meets all the requirements of the rail company; has fully completed its plans for exchange of this tract for the Springfield buildings of the company, and now is placing the proposition squarely before the people as to whether this development will go through or whether the shops and terminals will be located elsewhere.

"Present indications are that a total expenditure of more than a million and a half dollars will be made by the Southern Pacific company in terminals and other facilities here if our plan goes through. A tie-traiting plant costing approximately \$500,000 are included among the equipment planned by the company for its terminals.

"This will be a permanent location of terminals, not a make-shift that may be changed with later development of other rail lines in this part of the state. This exchange of sites plan has been taken up with officials high in the railroad company, and after a number of conferences with these railroad officials we are in a position to state positively that if Eugene shows its desire for industrial development, the terminals will come here to a certainty.

"The railroad committee after two years of effort to bring about a situation that would be to the advantage of the city, formulated its plans and then called in a number of other men, who by their influence and places in the community would be of able assistance in putting through this project, which we firmly believe is as important as any that can be planned and represent the beginning of a big forward step in the progress of this city.

"A total of \$30,000 has been paid down on options, this amount being guaranteed to the chamber of commerce committee by a number of men who have offered to underwrite the preliminary financing. The deeds on practically every foot of the proposed site for the terminals, costing approximately \$200,000, have been obtained and are in escrow. We of the railroad committee have nothing to gain beyond our share in the general prosperity that will follow the completion of this rail project. We kept no secrets from those from whom we obtained purchase options on their property.

"We have announced from the best legal talent in the city that a bond issue by the city for the purpose contemplated will be entirely sold and we believe there will be no opposition to this measure when the people realize that they are faced with a most wonderful opportunity for community advancement at a compar-

JOBS WANTED BY EUGENE SCOUTS

"Wanted—More Jobs"—This is the appeal going out from the Eugene Boy Scout office in the city hall today, with the report that hundreds of scouts, anxious for work to earn their expenses for the big summer camp this year, are unable to secure jobs.

The employment office for scouts, in charge of Leland Johnson at the Miner building, telephone 35, is besieged hourly by the scouts, and an appeal is going out today to local townspeople for work that the boys can do.

"If your car needs polishing or washing, call 359 and let a scout do the job," says Mr. Johnson. "We have boys for carrying wood, mowing lawns, making gardens, beating carpets, house cleaning, cutting weeds, running errands, or sawing eradication work. They work at a minimum wage, and are tickled to death to get a chance to earn the money for camp."

Philanthropic persons who wish to donate \$12 to send a scout to camp should turn the money into the scout office at the city hall, it is stated, so it may be expended in payment for work in cutting weeds from vacant lots, or beautifying the city. Scouts do not want charity, it is stated, and would rather earn the money they receive than take it as a gift.

When the scouts earn their money they are expected to bring it to scout headquarters where it will be placed on deposit, and kept until time for the opening of camp.
