

ROAD CASE WILL BE HEARD SOON

That the common user grant over the new Southern Pacific Eugene-Klamath Falls cut-off will be recommended for the Union Pacific and the Hill lines at the next meeting of the public service commission which will be held at Portland within the next three months, is the opinion of Dr. Peter C. Crockett, of the department of economics of the University of Oregon, who has returned after a conference with railroad attorneys at Salem. Dr. Crockett prepared a number of the briefs of the Union Pacific road in its effort before the state commission and also the interstate commerce commission to obtain the common user rights.

"The move of the public service commission of Oregon is confined to the railroads in Oregon and is to protect the carriers and public against a repetition of being compelled by defects to establish common user after costly duplications and originally been made, as in the case of the two lines up the Deschutes canyon to Bend. But also it is a move under the provisions of the transportation act of 1920 to protect the public, the Southern Pacific railway and other interstate carriers, with an adequate system of transportation, powerful balanced competition of through systems and a fair return on the investment," Mr. Crockett said.

"These moves in the case constitute nothing new in the record so far but have been present since the inception of the Oregon railway development case."

In his opinion, considering the stage of railway competition for Oregon's tonnage, these moves will not affect contemplated investments in terminal facilities of lines in established territory and tonnage, but will prove, in the event of hearings, to be wise solutions before an impartial body like the interstate commerce commission of what looks like a gigantic battle of powerful rivals.

Lane County Boys Are Commissioned

Three Lane county boys were among the 78 members of the class of 1925 at Oregon Agricultural college to accept commissions as second lieutenants in the reserve officers' corps of the United States army.

They are Harold Rowley of Eugene, commissioned in the motor transport unit; James W. Thurston of Eugene, field artillery; and Alvin Reetz, Junction City, cavalry.

Commissions were conferred officially at the commencement exercises by Colonel George W. Moses, professor of military science and tactics.

The election meeting will be held tonight at the home of Mrs. Emma Drain. The Eugene club is entitled to three delegates at the state meeting. Under the direction of Raymond Walsh, resident engineer of the state highway commission here, a survey of the highway north from Florence is now under way. Virgil Wagner is assisting in the survey work with six men in the party, it is announced. The highway survey will be completed as far north as Sutton lake from Florence, according to present plans. Several partial surveys of this route have been made during the past two or more years.

CHARITY BOARD OF LUTHERANS SUED

Suit against the Charity Board of the Lutheran Brotherhood was filed today by Edward Kjenab in which the plaintiff asks that two promissory notes, one for \$500 and one for \$1000 be cancelled. The plaintiff who is represented by Paul C. Dormitzer, Portland attorney, states in his complaint that the charity board of the brotherhood was not officially incorporated at the time the notes were signed and that "fraud" was practiced. Others named as defendants in the suit are the Lutheran Brotherhood of Oregon, S. P. Ness, Overst. Skilbred, Lloyd Martin and John Doe, and Richard Roe. The defendants organization is also known as the Sevenson Memorial Home for the Aged, the plaintiff states.

The charity board of the Lutheran Brotherhood is promoting the campaign for the memorial home in Eugene. Recently a suit was filed by the board to have a number of notes turned over which were alleged held by an officer of the organization.

Improvement Bonds To be Sold Friday

Sale of \$112,000 in Bancroft Improvement bonds of the city of Eugene will be made by the city council at a special meeting Friday afternoon. It is announced by Mayor Parks. Announcements have been published, calling for bids on these bonds, and judging from the sale last Monday, they will be disposed of at a handsome premium.

Abstract for the bond sales of \$200,000 McKenzie river water supply bonds, and \$135,000 water extension have been completed, and will be delivered today by Mayor E. B. Parks to attorneys for the buyers.

Boys and Girls to Get Labor Permit

Boys and girls of Lane county who have not had a permit to work before are required to obtain a record of their age from the school records, according to Frank Eberhart, secretary of the Eugene Y. M. C. A. and deputy of state labor board, who issues the permits for Lane county. "If there is no record here of the boy or girl applicants it is necessary to have a record obtained from the school clerk of their respective districts," Mr. Eberhart said. A number of inquiries are being received in regard to work permits for the summer, the canneries employ a large number of these boys and girls although later in the summer the hop yards also call for juvenile help. As a general rule no state permit is required for temporary work such as berry picking, the secretary states.

Snow in the pass country is melting quite rapidly, and it will be but a short time until the road will be ready for travel, according to the government workers.

Track Laying to Start on Cutoff

July 1 will mark the beginning of steel laying on the Paunina-Odell lake section of the Natron cut-off on the eastern side, according to word received in the local Southern Pacific offices. Crews will rush this work to completion by day and night shifts, it is stated.

Trains are now being run on schedule from the south as far north as Paunina, formerly known as Skookum, and when the extension to the summit tunnel is completed, these trains will go into the mountains as far as Odell Lake.

On the Lang county side the rails have been laid to McCredie, but the daily schedule operates only to Railroad. Tracklaying beyond McCredie is awaiting the arrival of the track-layers.

Distance between Paunina and Odell lake is approximately 33 miles, and engineers believe that when steel laying operations are started it will be possible to place one mile of track each day.


