

### 32 FACE CHARGES AFTER ATTACK ON PARADE OF KLAN

CLINTON, Mass., June 10.—(AP)—Thirty-two men were under arrest today as the result of a riot after an outdoor meeting of the Ku Klux Klan.

All the defendants pleaded not guilty when arraigned in Clinton district court on charges of violating a town law by participating in a parade for which no permit had been issued and of disturbing the peace. They were held in jail of \$100 each for later hearing.

Scores apparently were injured in the fighting, which was not quelled until twenty state police patrolmen had charged a battling crowd. Only three men, however, were hurt severely enough to be treated by physicians. They said they were innocent victims, being the target for missiles while passing through the town in automobile trucks.

Everett Rice, 17, was accused of assault with intent to kill and of carrying dangerous weapons. The police said that some time after the rioting ceased, he threw his neighborhood into excitement by firing three shots at three men near his home.

Fifteen clubs, 12 pieces of lead pipe, pieces of rubber hose and a revolver used in the battle were seized by the police. The rioting started shortly before midnight, when a procession of more than 200 Klansmen's cars were suddenly attacked. As the first cars have in sight, a crowd rushed in, throwing bricks and swinging clubs.

Lieutenant Roy Kimball and 20 state troopers, who had patrolled the grounds surrounding Brewster field, near Berlin where a Klan meeting had been held, were escorting the Klan machines through Clinton when the riot started.

### 250,000 Years old SKULL SHOWS NO TRACE OF SIMIAN

OMAHA, Neb., June 10.—Here is a reconstruction of the oldest skull yet found on the North American continent.

The most accurate scientific measurements known show the skull to be that of a fully developed man. It has no trace of the ape of monkey. If a man has descended from some ape-like ancestor, the descent was just about complete when this man lived.

The reconstruction was made at the University of Nebraska, Dr. Irving S. Cutter, dean of the medical college there, is authority for the statement that the crinical man was just about as far advanced as man is today.

Fragments of the skull were found in glacial drift on a side hill near Omaha. They are believed to be from 250,000 years old.

Very careful facial and cranial measurements are used to reconstruct an entire head when only a few pieces of the skull are had. They are as accurate as science can make them.

In the case of such remains as the Heidelberg man and the Java man, the reconstructed skull seemed to be of a primitive, undeveloped type, resembling that of an ape nearly as much as that of a man.

But in this case the reverse was true.

Scores of centuries ago, when humankind was supposed to be only slightly higher than the ape, this man apparently was fully developed—as much a man as the Indians Columbus found.

### Expert on Indian Affairs is Sued

LANCASTER, Pa., June 10.—(AP)—Captain John Richmond Eddy, who wrote, under commission from the federal government, a history of the American Indian in the World War, was found dead in his office at Paradise, near here, today with a bullet wound in the head.

County officials said he committed suicide, the result of worry over business matters. He was an authority on Indian affairs, having served as secretary to the general superintendent of Indian affairs and was superintendent at one time of the Cherokee reservation at Lame Deer, Mont.

### United Church of Canada Dedicated

TORONTO, June 10.—(AP)—The United Church of Canada, into which the Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational denominations of the dominion of Canada, have merged and which embraces nearly 9000 congregations, was officially instituted and dedicated before an audience of 8000 today.

By act of parliament the three denominations ceased to exist as separate entities at midnight.

The sale will be held at Coeur d'Alene on October 5 in tracts ranging from 90 to 190 acres. Any coal or oil deposit that might be found on the land will be reserved by the government.
