

LABORITES OPPOSE PACT OF SECURITY

LONDON, June 10.—While the proposed security pact negotiated with France at Geneva by Foreign Secretary Chamberlain is certain to meet strong criticism in the house of commons the laborites alone of the political parties have thus far expressed their attitude.

They are uncompromisingly hostile to the agreement on the ground that it involves Great Britain too deeply in possible European embroilments.

Former Premier Ramsay MacDonald, the laborite leader is quoted by the party organ, the Daily Herald as saying:

"The agreement is the beginning note of a general understanding to maintain peace, but of individual alliance and guarantee. It will not, in the end, promote peace but increase the organization for war and this is true whether it provides only security for France or security for Germany also.

The Westminster Gazette, one of the leading mouthpieces of the liberal party, says that while there is some anxiety in liberal quarters regarding the British commitments, no positive exception is taken in such a bi-lateral guarantee as outlined.

If accepted by Germany the pact will provide a guarantee of the frontiers of France, Belgium and Germany as established under the Versailles treaty. Great Britain would be pledged to use all her forces against nations making an unprovoked attack on the frontiers, such defensive action to be taken under the aegis of the League of Nations.

MILITARY SCHOOL LEADER DESERTS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 10.—Harry Johnson, superintendent of the Oregon Military academy at Greencreek, near Hillsboro, who a week ago Saturday deserted the 40 boys in his care, has been traced to Victoria, B. C., according to D. D. Hall, Portland attorney, who voluntarily assumed the task of sending the boys, who had come from the entire Pacific northwest, to their homes.

Johnson, Mr. Hall declares, left a trail of \$13,000 in bad checks and unpaid bills, extending over the last two years, when he mysteriously disappeared. Several warrants on the bad check charges had been placed in the hands of the Hillsboro authorities, he said, and it was reported that a fund would be started to return Johnson to this state.

STUDENTS PROTEST

PEKING, June 10.—(AP)—The students of the capital today were holding monster demonstrations in protest against the action of the foreign authorities in quelling the recent strike riots at Shanghai.

The students compelled the flying of anti-foreign banners on all cars and rickshaws. They also distributed anti-foreign literature, containing wildly extravagant statements and declaring the Shanghai affair "the most brutal and cold-blooded atrocity in human history."

SAILINGS SUSPENDED

SHANGHAI, June 10.—(AP)—The China Merchants Steamship company, Chinese owned, has suspended its sailings indefinitely. Some other steamship companies are instructing their vessels at outside ports not to return to Shanghai at present.

LONG SIEGE EXPECTED

CANTON, June 10.—(AP)—Efforts of the Canton chamber of commerce to induce rival Chinese leaders, now fighting for possession of Canton, to move the seat of warfare outside the business district failed today.

The commander of the Yunnanese troops is unwilling to leave his present position because he is drawing a large income from gambling, opium sales, and various other sources.

STATISTICS FILED

SPRINGFIELD, June 10.—(Special)—A total of 17 births and 3 deaths in Springfield and vicinity are reported in the vital statistics compiled by Dr. W. H. Pollard, city physician, for the period from May 10 to June 10. This is twice as many births as last month and only half as many deaths, the doctor reports. The birth rate is higher this month than at this time last year, he states, and the death-rate about the same.

DIRECTORY PLANNED FOR STOCK RAISERS

To compile a directory of all breeders of purebred stock in Lane county, O. S. Fletcher, Lane county agricultural agent, is asking the cooperation of Lane stockmen. A list of about 100 breeders has been obtained and letters are to be written to them asking their aid in listing additional breeders, Mr. Fletcher states. This plan is in accordance with the decision to revise the work of the Lane County Purebred Breeders association and a meeting of the executive committee of the organization has been called by President O. L. Dunlap for June 20. Two years ago the association had a membership of 170 and an effort will be made to get in touch with all members and others who have taken up the breeding of purebred stock, it is announced.

More Banknotes For France Asked

PARIS, June 10.—(AP)—Financial writers in newspapers here today credit Finance Minister Caillaux with a plan to print four billion francs more of bank notes and to increase the Bank of France's limit of advances to the government by a like amount so that the government can meet maturing bonds, M. Caillaux was to appear this afternoon before the chamber of deputies finance commission to outline his proposals for rehabilitating France's finances. It was assumed he had obtained, according to custom, the cabinet's approval of his ideas at this morning's session, but nothing was revealed officially. M. Caillaux plan was said to be to ask parliament to authorize additional advances of four billion francs from the Bank of France to the government, which would increase the bank net circulation by that amount.

Mr. Gerard Cleared Of Contempt Charge

NEW YORK, June 10.—(AP)—James W. Gerard, former ambassador to Germany, was cleared today of the charge of contempt of the supreme court of New York, based on his failure to appear for examination. Mr. Gerard had been summoned in connection with a suit against the national democratic committee. He appeared today before Supreme Court Justice Tierney and announced his readiness to submit to examination tomorrow.
