

# SCOPES IS 'GOAT' IN COURT FIGHT, NEW YORK IS TOLD

NEW YORK, June 11.—(AP)—Scopes is being figured largely in the closing hours of the New York visit of the Scopes trial, high school teacher on trial next month at Dayton, Tenn., for violating the state law against the teaching of evolution.

Visitors here last night to New York to attend the trial, Scopes told of his experience over being the "goat" in the trial and of freedom of thought.

Scopes, who has been released from the state prison, was a guest at a dinner of the club last night. He said he was depressed in addressing the distinguished group of liberals and radicals because he was young and inexperienced, and recently, while because of his inexperience had been sent to get Charles Darwin, one of his counsel, to lead to walk to the club and get a goat.

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# TRAFFIC HALTS ON APPEARANCE OF HARRY THAW

NEW YORK, June 11.—(AP)—Traffic was jammed this morning when Harry K. Thaw, who came back to Broadway last night after a week's absence at Winchester, emerged from a cabaret. He spent the evening and early morning there doing nothing much but responding to well-wishers by taking hellos and sipping ice water and orangeade. Several hundred curious folk lined up through Central park, then left him alone when he returned to the cabaret.

His bill for the evening, which included \$2 table d'hôte dinners for himself and two male companions, amounted to \$35. Of this amount \$5 went for a tip to the head waiter, \$3 to his table waiter, and \$1 to the hat checker.

Chorus girls amused him during the evening and he was introduced to a woman who took part in a review. He told one she reminded him of Lillian Russell.

Thaw declined to dance, as he said he had not kept up with the modern steps. Even an old-fashioned waltz played for his benefit, failed to shake his determination not to appear on the floor. He said he was going to stay in New York until he had seen every cabaret.

# Mark Broom Plea Is set Wednesday

PORTLAND, Ore., June 11.—(AP)—Mark Broom is set for Wednesday afternoon in court on his plea of insanity in the case of the possession of liquor, possession of mash and operating a still.

Broom is charged with the possession of a still in his home at 1000 Commercial street. His attorney Paul C. Dornmeyer requested more time of the court and this was granted by Judge G. F. Skipworth who set 9 o'clock tomorrow for the hearing of the plea. The bail for Broom is now \$800, including \$1000 on each of the six counts in addition to \$2500 on liquor charges on which he was recently bound over to the grand jury. It is understood that an effort to obtain this bail is being made, according to county officers.

# SPRINGFIELD TO CONTEST ACTION

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., June 11.—(AP)—Material increases in the cost of living in the past 12 months are shown in a comparison of prices which the state will have to pay for its supplies at this time with the prices paid a year ago. The most radical increase is noted in the price of bacon which shows a gain of more than 100 per cent from \$15 per 100 pounds a year ago to \$30.00 on the present bids. Hard wheat flour which was purchased by the state last year at \$5.24 per barrel is now quoted at \$7.40 per barrel although this last figure represents a slight decrease in the price over the state last year at \$7.80 paid last December. Soft wheat flour has jumped from \$4.45 a barrel last year to \$5.85 at this time. Ham which was quoted at \$22.25 per 100 pounds a year ago is now up to \$27.20. Compressed lard has increased from \$10.45 to \$12.80 and pure lard from \$10.50 to \$12.80. Coffee which was quoted at 22 1/2¢ last year is now up to 34 1/2¢. Reduced prices are noted only in a few instances, notably in the price of sugar which has slumped from \$7.05 per 100 pounds a year ago to \$6.15 at this time. Fresh beef is also a little cheaper at \$7.20 per 100 pounds as compared to \$7.80 a year ago.
