Disabled Veteran Gets Compensation

Walter E. Perry, a disabled ex-service man of Lane county, whose claim for compensation from Uncle Sam has been pending in the United States veterans' bureau for months, has been granted a total temporary disability rating giving him \$100 a month, according to word received by Miss Grace Norton, secretary of the local Red Cross chapter. LIFESAVING CORPS HERE RATED HIGH. Eugene's Red Cross lifesaving corps are the highest rated in the Pacific coast division, which includes the states of Idaho, Oregon, California and Washington. It is announced today by Edwin H. Carroll and L. E. Palmer, Red Cross representatives of the American Red Cross lifesaving division. Four local men were appointed lifesaving examiners as a result of the tests conducted this week by Mr. Carroll and Mr. Palmer. Those appointed were Dan Woodward, Oscar Rice, Fred, Eugene Richmond and Perry Davis. They are now in a position to go before any lifesaving corps and conduct official tests for certificates. Mr. Carroll left for Tillamook yesterday to organize a corps of lifesavers, and Mr. Palmer left for points in California. Mr. Carroll declared the University of Oregon had the distinction of having the largest class of men and women to pass the lifesaving tests of any in the Pacific division, and the most active corps of lifesavers in the state. Four women also were appointed examiners, as follows: Elizabeth Lounsbury, Wanda Plink, Stella Houghlin and Dorothy Evans. These were recommended in the women's division by Miss Barbara Page, women's examiner. Considerable credit is due Lord E. Webster and Rudolph Fahl of Eugene for their work in building up such a strong lifesaving unit here, according to the San Francisco station.

Masonic Temple Work is Started. PORTLAND, Ore., June 11.—Turning of the first sod on the site of the new \$1,000,000 Masonic temple here today, marked the beginning of the work on the structure.
