

### CABINET MEMBER'S TOBACCO DEFENSE DRAWS HOT FIRE

WASHINGTON, June 12.—Dr. D. H. Kress, vice president of the Anti-Cigarette Alliance of America, has unlimbered his trusty harpoon, sharpened its keen point and lurled it against the quivering flank of Dr. William M. Jardine, secretary of agriculture.

For Dr. Jardine has put himself on record—publicly and unashamedly—as an advocate of Lady Nicotine.

He has characterized her as "an attractive and loyal friend."

He has pledged the support of his department to the domestic tobacco industry as "a major source of income for American farming."

And this is much too much for Dr. Kress.

As second in command of the federation of all the anti-tobacco organizations in the country, he asks: "Is the tobacco industry one to which the government should pledge its cooperation?"

"Is it an industry which the government should encourage?"

Then he answers his own questions in the negative—with a few digs at Dr. Jardine thrown in.

"As stated by the secretary of agriculture," he says, "it is true that Lady Nicotine has the qualities of loyalty and steadiness. She holds her old friends and gets new ones, as he says."

"This is the chief reason why the tobacco industry should NOT be encouraged!"

"Tobacco makes drug fiends! We have in the United States today not less than twenty-five million men, women and youths slaves to the use of Lady Nicotine!"

"Lady Nicotine is holding all these and daily adding hundreds of new recruits. Our boys and girls are being ruined physically, mentally and morally."

"It seems strange indeed that in view of all this the secretary of agriculture should pledge the government's support in the interests of the tobacco industry."

"We pass right laws to shut out of our country all defectives and criminals—we yet encourage a traffic which is daily turning hundreds of our most promising boys into criminals!"

"To encourage the tobacco industry is a short-sighted policy, unworthy of a nation of our intelligence."

"The tobacco habit is threatening the future of America!"

**Dealers' Licenses To Undergo Change**

Instructions as to the new laws affecting motor vehicle licenses have been received by county and city traffic officers in Eugene, and the sheriff's office has been provided with a supply of the blanks to be used hereafter in handling license applications.

One of the changes was in the cost of dealers' licenses. Original plates cost \$50 and additional sets \$10 each. Motorcycle dealers' licenses now cost \$25 and \$2 for each additional set.

Special season licenses for farmers' trucks have been provided for; a license which is in force from April 1 to October 31, at two-thirds of the regular fee for such vehicles.

Fees of 50 per cent in addition to the regular fee for vehicles of their weight, are to be charged to electric motor vehicles, and also for those which are not common carriers, but which are used for commercial delivery purposes, not exclusively within the incorporate limits of the city.

### RATE REVISION IN OREGON ORDERED

WASHINGTON, June 12.—(Special)—The interstate commerce commission today ordered a revision of rates on grain, grain products and hay from numerous points in Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Utah, Wyoming, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Oklahoma to points in the southeast and the lower Mississippi. October 8 was named as the effective date for the changes.

Points of Oregon affected are on the Oregon Short Line and its connections and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific. The rate structures involve in many cases, it was held, the charging of higher rates for short hauls than is charged for long hauls over the same line and in the same direction.

In the rate readjustment latitude will be given to the railroads and they may rectify the long and short haul violation either by raising the long haul rates or decreasing the short haul rates, or both.

### FIVE DROWNED IN BLAST AND FIRE ON BOAT IN EAST

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 12.—(AP)—Five persons are believed to have been drowned last night when an explosion, followed by fire destroyed the pleasure boat "Crystal," forcing 39 persons, including the crew, to leap overboard while on a pleasure cruise eight miles off Atlantic City.

The explosion is believed to have been caused by a cigarette end thrown down a hatchway.

The body of Deborah McKnight, 18, was being it ashore by coast guards, while a patrol boat is continuing the search for John Hannum, of Northfield; Warren Bilks, of Linwood; Joseph Wilson, of Northfield, and Martha Weiss, still missing.

A "dry navy" boat rescued 11 others.

Captain William Young, commander of the craft, is held in \$20000 bail pending an investigation.

Curtis Kyle, of Northfield, a passenger, said the merry-makers were singing and dancing on the top deck when the explosion occurred.

"There was a terrific blast—like a crack of thunder banging right into your ears," he said. "The boat seemed to heave right up off the sea. She rolled from side to side, long sickening rolls that threw us around and in a moment when we got to our feet, I found myself on the top deck. I must have been blown out of the cabin."

"The boat gave an awful lurch and I saw two of the lifeboats go spinning into the ocean. The next thing I knew most of us were floating around in the water."

### THEFT AND SALE OF EXAM PAPERS IS INVESTIGATED

MADISON, Wis., June 12.—University of Wisconsin officials continued their investigation today of what is said to be the most flagrant case of theft and sale of examination questions ever uncovered at the state school.

Although first reports said the theft had been wholesale, it was believed after the investigation had been under way that only examina-

tion questions in the romance language and Spanish departments were involved.

Members of the faculty of the romance language department were reported to have been in session until after midnight Wednesday comparing class grades with examination grades following the complaint of a student, who gave the faculty the first clue.

It is also reported that at least three of the university buildings were broken into and professors' desks rifled to get copies of examination questions. Students have reported that they were approached by persons who offered to sell mimeograph copies of questions for \$5 to \$10 a set.

If it is impossible to deal with individual cases, it may be found necessary to repeat examinations in all courses where there is suspicion that the questions were stolen and sold, it was hinted.
