No Mercy Shown to Surrendered Forces; Revolting Scenes Reported

Defending Troops Shot or Thrown Into River by Incoming Men

CANTON, June 13.—(AP)—The attacking Kwangtung and Canton forces under Bolsheviki officers after a fierce attack on the defending Yunnanese army today forced them to surrender Canton and today imposed extreme cruelties on soldiers and civilian population as well. The attacking soldiers landed 2,000 soldiers at Tungshan and from that point they attacked, leaving the defending forces without river transportation facilities and therefore unable to launch a counter attack. No Consideration Given After landing the Kwangtung troops gave the surrendering forces no consideration although the defeated troops had voluntarily given up their arms. The winning forces then began looting the city. This was not confined to stations of opposing army forces but extended to homes of non-combatant citizens. Revolting scenes followed in all parts of the city, many of which were witnessed by Europeans from the foreign quarter. Innocent people were stoned and beaten by mobs, members of which seemed to have lost their sense. The bodies of slain innocent bystanders are strewn along the road. Troops are Beaten The surrendering Yunnanese troops in many cases were beaten to death by the Kwangtung forces. From Shansien, the foreign population saw a captured soldier commit suicide by diving into the river after witnessing the killing of his comrades. The winning forces either shot or threw into the river the bodies of their defeated troops.

Voters in the China Vista addition to Eugene will be eligible to vote at the election Monday at the Condon school, according to Mr. Jones. Polling places and boundaries of the voting wards will be as follows: Condon school building, for all legal voters residing in the section lying east of University street. Patterson school building for section south of Eleventh avenue and between University and Mill streets. Frances Willard building for section south of Eleventh avenue and between Mill and Jefferson streets. Washington building for section north of Eleventh avenue and between Lincoln street and a straight line coinciding with and extending due north of University street. Lincoln building for section lying between Seventh and Eleventh avenues from Lincoln street to Chambers street, and the section south of Eleventh avenue and west of Jefferson street. Geary building for section extending from Lincoln street to Chambers street and north of Seventh avenue.
