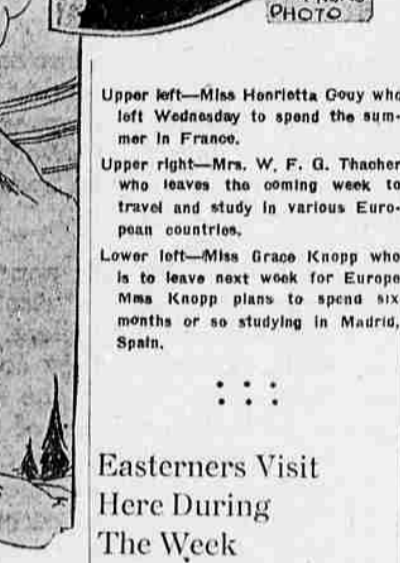


Social Events of Week
