Eugene on Route of All-Year Line To El Paso, Tex.

New stage schedule became effective today by the Pickwick system which puts Eugene on the all-year motor bus route to El Paso, Texas, by way of San Francisco, Los Angeles and San Diego. This announcement was made today by Richard Shepard, manager of the Terminal hotel.

The stage leaves Eugene at 6 o'clock noon daily, arriving in San Francisco the following night at 10 o'clock. The all-night stop is made at Yreka. The "daylight trip" stage leaves Eugene at 6 o'clock p. m. daily, stopping all night at Roseburg and Redding, and arriving in San Francisco at 5 o'clock p. m. on the second day's trip.

This schedule replaces the old schedule, by which the stage left Eugene at 2 o'clock on a three-day trip from Portland to San Francisco. At San Francisco direct connections are made for Los Angeles and San Diego for the southern trip to El Paso.

FIRST LOOKOUTS OF YEAR ON JOB

A puff of smoke, seen in a mass of trees at this season of the year, may mean a forest fire.

For this reason the Siuslaw national forest sent out its first lookouts this morning to their posts. From vantage points at the top of mountain peaks two university students will watch for the signs of fire, and report by telephone to their district ranger.

Eugene Callahan is to be the lookout at Roman Nose mountain, more familiarly known to Eugene as Saddle mountain. It appears west of the city about 30 miles on the divide between Smith river and the Siuslaw.

D. G. Backman goes back to his old post on Prairie mountain, about the distance southwest on the divide between the Siuslaw river and Alsea river.

Both lookouts are experienced men. They have spotted smoke as far distant as Eugene. They first saw the fire near Creswell last year, and also the one on Skinner's butte when the flames chased up the side of the peak. Air is exceedingly dry these days, and both lookouts have declared their intention of "keeping their eyes open."

Radio Waves to be Made Visible for Audience Tuesday

How does the human voice travel through the air by radio? This question will be answered by dealer members of the Northwest Radio Dealers' Trade association at a public meeting in the new Eugene hotel Tuesday evening at 8:30 o'clock, when a demonstration by which ether waves can be seen by the human eye, will be given.

"Waves" in the air over which the radio lectures and music travel, it is explained, and by means of a specially constructed machine these waves are made visible, through reflection on a large mirror. The process will be explained by Professor H. G. Tanner of the university and Professor E. R. Means of University High.
