

### 'NOT GUILTY' IS PLEA OF BROOM

Application for the withdrawal of H. C. Hall of Cheshire as surety on the bond of Mark Broom, under indictment on six charges, was made in circuit court this afternoon after Broom had entered pleas of not guilty on the six counts. The matter of a bond for Broom had not yet been settled as to late this afternoon but arrangements were made to return Broom to jail if additional surety was not provided. The bondsmen in his application presented by C. A. Wintermeyer, local attorney, stated that he was not able to take up the share of the \$5000 bond which was signed Saturday with John Currie of Leaburg.

After Broom had entered his pleas today, Paul C. Dormitzer, his attorney, in presenting a motion to quash the indictments as they were "made for want of prosecution" also declared that the defense would prove that Broom was not in Oregon in 1923 when the indictments were found. An application for a change of venue for the trial was also made to the court. Judge G. F. Skipworth set next Monday to pass on the motions.
