

RADIO DEALERS TO STAGE SHOW

Plans for the first radio exposition to be held in Eugene in September were discussed at the meeting last night of members of the Northwest Radio Dealers' Trade Association at the new Eugene hotel. The show will be held jointly with Coos and Lane county dealers, and Mahlon Sweet was named head of the committee to plan the show.

The proposed broadcasting station for Eugene, to be erected on the roof of the Eugene hotel, was also considered, and Mr. Sweet was chosen to head this committee also. The problem of getting a wave length assigned to Eugene would be one of the first to be solved, it was stated.

The demonstration and lectures on ether waves attracted a gathering of more than 100 fans, following the meeting of dealers. Professors Blenns and Tanner gave lectures on the subject. Through means of a large reflector the audience was able to see the ether waves when set into motion.

Radio fans encountering unusual disturbance or interference with their reception are invited to report it to the association headquarters at the Eugene hotel. This includes code interference, X-ray, violet ray, power leak or regenerative noises. The aim of the organization is to aid the broadcast receiver, it is pointed out, and this can best be done when all interferences are reported promptly.

"The Show-Off" Is one of Year's Biggest Hits Here

"The Show-Off," one of best road shows to appear in Eugene this year, played to a painfully slender house at the Heilig last night.

The play was a three-act comedy drama by George Kelly, depicting a cross-section of the life of a middle-class Philadelphia family. The action hinges upon the complications arising out of the youngest daughter's marriage to a boating four-flusher.

Jessie Busley, who took the part of Mrs. Fisher, the mother of the family, carried the audience from tears to laughter through the scenes in which the daughter's death, her husband's "show-off" experiences with the law when he runs over a traffic cop with his auto; and the son's invention that makes the family rich. The denouement comes in the last act when it is discovered that the son's financial success with his invention is due to the bringing of impurities of the "show-off."

Hobart Cavanaugh plays the part of the "show-off" successfully, as judged by the deep disgust of the audience at his cockling laugh; W. F. Granger needs no make-up or false gray hair for his part as the head of the house; Beatrice Maude and Maude Franklin fight through the play as cordially as sisters usually do; and Hobart Cavanaugh is the youth who needs only the "show-off" to bluff to make a million. Channey Olcott is to appear in "The Rivals" at the Heilig July 21. If the play is as good as last night's it merits a bigger attendance.

Officers Will aid Defense Day Plan

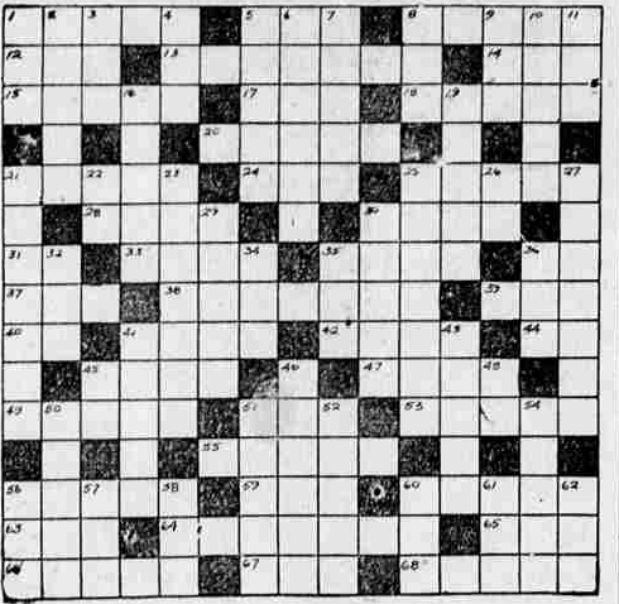
