

### SCOUTS WELCOME CAMP VISITORS

Every day will be visitors' day at the first annual Boy Scout camp July 13 to August 10, says Kenneth C. Ables, chairman of the camp committee. Sunday, however, will be set aside for the regular weekly program as a visitors' day, who will be invited to bring their swimming suits and lunch boxes.

If a visitor wishes to eat at camp mess, he is asked to make reservations by mail. The price of a meal will be one white enamel plate, cup and bowl, and one knife, fork and spoon, which the visitor will bring, eat from, and leave at the camp.

"Camp Siuslaw" is the name chosen for the Boy Scout camp this year, judges decided. Roy E. Foss, a Cassman scout, submitted the name, and for his award will receive a week's free board and lodging. Other good names, turned in were Camp Ta-Nuc, Camp Alapelon, and Shookum Hillee. Reuben Haulalaugh of Eugene won half a week's free board as second prize.

A series of awards will be made for advancement in scoutcraft, camp helpfulness and camp activity, consisting of emblems and honor hats. Every scout is expected to come back with an honor hat.

High spots of the camp include an inter-patrol baseball league; two and three-day hikes, guard duty, baseball golf tournament, bird study hikes, minstrel show, inter-patrol swimming meet, inter-patrol scoutcraft competition, handicraft contest, treasure hunt, vaudeville show, water carnival, yacht race, court of honor installation, horsehoe tournament, stunt nights, and auction sales.

### Grants Pass to Stage Roundup

Eugene is invited to the Grants Pass rodeo July 3, 4, and 5, announced Jack Schenk, advance man and publicity director for the show, who was in the city today. The big celebration will be conducted after the fashion of the Pendleton roundup, and is expected to draw heavily from all parts of southern Oregon.

Bucking, bulldogging, steer riding, relay and horse races will be featured every day of the show. Other attractions will include wild cow milking, roping, tying, etc., and a 40 carnival show. Addresses will be given by Judge Thomas of the south district circuit and Senator Ed Miller.

Forty-five head of wild horses from the Klamath Indian reservation will be used for the bucking stunts, as well as 25 heavy wild steers. A hundred Indians, in full war paint and costume, from the reservation, will lend color and take part in the parades, shows and contests.

Mr. Schenk is expecting to make arrangements for special railroad rates for the three-day show. He left for Portland this afternoon.

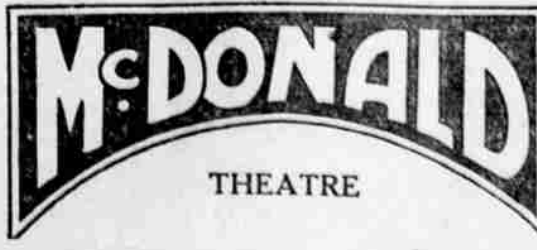
