

# SEN. L'FOLLETTE DIES FROM HEART ATTACK; AGE 70

career, he passed away very quietly. Shortly before the end he mustered all his waning strength in a vain effort to murmur a last word to those at the bedside. Then he lapsed into unconsciousness and without any evidence of pain passed almost immediately from life.

A heart attack coming during the morning hours found the patient weak after a long fight with grip and asthma, but he continued to fight death with the old time tenacity of purpose, which has carried him through many a dramatic political battle.

**Barely Conscious.**

He remained barely conscious and appeared to realize the seriousness of his condition. Only occasionally did he speak to those about him and when he spoke it was with apparent great effort.

"I think I have earned a long rest," he said yesterday, when a change for the worse apparently had brought to him some premonition of the end. But today, as his plight grew hourly more precarious, he preferred to fight. It was his stubborn reticence of consciousness against the pressure of waning strength that gave those about him a flicker of hope.

Arrangements for the funeral, completed today call for departure from Washington tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock. The train bearing the body will reach Chicago Sunday morning. From there the party will go to Madison, arriving not later than 5:30 Saturday p. m.

On request of Governor Blaine, the body will lie in state in the capitol Sunday.

Senator LaFollette will be buried Monday in Madison, Wis., his home city after funeral services in the state capitol.

Robert Marion LaFollette, considered one of the most powerful orators of his time, was a storm center of personal and political controversy throughout the nation in his home state of Wisconsin for more than a quarter of a century.

"Fighting Bob," the name by which he was known to political friends and enemies alike, was a title well earned almost from the moment he stepped into the political arena when scarcely more than a boy. Facing battles such as few, if any, of his political contemporaries were compelled to fight, he served three terms as a member of the house of representatives and three as governor of Wisconsin, was four times elected to the United States senate, and finally, became an independent candidate for president in 1924.

**Center of Storm.**

Perhaps few American public men ever drew such bitter criticism as was heaped upon Senator LaFollette during and immediately after the World war, and certainly none could have been more staunchly defended by his friends. His speeches and public policies had been the target for widespread denunciation previous to 1917, while the great conflict was raging in Europe, but the crisis came when he voted against America entering the struggle when the Louisiana outrage and other violations of our neutrality were still burning in the public mind. He was hung in effigy and even threatened with expulsion proceedings in the senate, but in the 1922 elections he was sent back to his place in Washington by a tremendous majority.

Three Senator LaFollette was placed in nomination for the presidency in republican conventions—in 1908, in 1912 when he charged Theodore Roosevelt with promising to support him and then becoming the progressive candidate himself, and again in 1916. In each convention LaFollette had the support of a small but intrepid bloc of delegates. He did in the 1920 and 1924 republican conventions when he received a handful of votes, although not formally placed in nomination.

**Born Near Madison.**

Born on a farm near Madison, June 14, 1855, LaFollette was a contemporary of Cleveland, Harrison, McKinley, Roosevelt, Taft, Wilson and Harding, as well as "Czar" Reed, Jas. G. Blaine and Mark Hanna.

In stature he was a figure to attract attention. His build was short, heavy and exceptionally strong, with a broad chest, a wide girth and powerful arms. He wore a high, heavy pompadour above deep-set, sharp blue-brown eyes with overhanging brows; and had a broad, high forehead, prominent aquiline nose and mobile mouth.

Senator LaFollette derived his name from ancestral stock of French Huguenot refugees. His Kentucky father, Josiah LaFollette, and his mother, Mary (Ferguson) LaFollette were pioneers in Wisconsin, where they went from Indiana. Their children were reared in the face of poverty, but all were able to attend the rural schools.

**Prominent in University.**

Robert was admitted to the University of Wisconsin by special waiver of entrance charges. He soon attained prominence in dramatic and debating classes, and also as editor of the college magazine. After his graduation, he was called upon to support his mother and sister while teaching in a country school and studying law. He was admitted to the bar in 1880 and soon entered politics as a candidate for prosecuting attorney. Despite the opposition of what he termed political bosses and machines, he was elected and subsequently re-elected. Again over the opposition of party leaders, he was nominated and elected to the forty-ninth congress in 1884, becoming at 29 years of age the youngest member of the house.

**Known as "Insurgent."**

He was appointed to a place in the ways and means committee by Speaker McKinley, then a member of the McKinley committee. His first speech in the house was against "pork barrel" river and harbor appropriations, and, by blocking or amending bills sponsored by the leaders, he early classified himself as an "insurgent."

Elected governor of Wisconsin in 1901 on a reform platform, he launched a fight against railroad influence in state politics, and also led the movement for the direct primary law, adopted by the Wisconsin legislature

### Careless Smoker Causes \$70,000 Fire in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18.—Smokers' carelessness may have caused the fire which last night swept through more than 3,000,000 feet of lumber in the yards of the Eastern and Western Lumber company, said Deputy Fire Marshal McFarlane and Moore, following investigation of the blaze. They estimated the loss at \$70,000.

Their estimate corresponds closely with that of W. B. Ayer, president of the company, who today said he believed the loss would be under \$100,000.

The blaze started in a corner of the dry shed directly adjacent to the long stacks of lumber piled on the west side of Front street.

### Trial for Alleged Slander on Today

Several cases presented to the grand jury were being considered today but up to late this afternoon no returns had been made. The jury was called for 10 o'clock this morning.

The case of Brown versus Peterson in which the plaintiff sues for damages for alleged slander is being heard in circuit court today. It is expected that the case will continue over until tomorrow, Judge G. F. Skipworth today sustained the demurrer filed by Sheriff Frank E. Taylor in the habeas corpus case brought for Richard Albert Moore, recently paroled on a check charge. Moore is being held in the county jail on a deportation charge of the government.

### Gilbert Furrow of Weed, Cal., is Dead

Gilbert Furrow, nephew of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Howard of motor route A, Eugene, died at the hospital at Weed, Cal., Wednesday, according to word received in Eugene today. He was 31 years old.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. John Blake of Annville and two sisters, Mrs. William Burnett and Mrs. E. J. Brisch of Los Angeles, Cal.

The body is being shipped from Weed, and the funeral will be held from the Vestch chapel in Eugene Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. Mammie Bissonop, pastor of the Church of God, will preach the funeral sermon, and interment will be in the Masonic cemetery.

### Timber Cutting in Umpqua Will Open

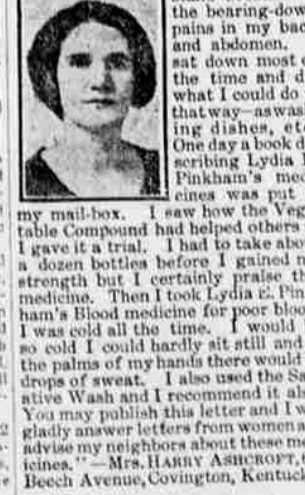
According to reports from Cottage Grove, the Anderson and Middleton company will commence within the next six or eight months to saw out its timber in the Umpqua district on a contract with the national forest service, which requires the cutting of 40,000,000 feet yearly. Operations will be in the area set aside for an experiment in sustained yield over a period of 100 years.

In addition to the government timber cutting license, the Anderson and Middleton company will operate on its own timber to keep the saws going at the company's two mills, which have been rebuilt to modern standard. The company's logging railway is being extended into the timber west of Cottage Grove, and additional equipment has been ordered.

### MRS. O. P. COSHOW DIES IN SALEM FROM PARALYSIS

SALEM, Ore., June 18.—Mrs. O. P. Coshow, wife of Justice Coshow of the Oregon supreme court, died suddenly at her home here about 9:30 o'clock this morning following a stroke of paralysis. She was 59 years old.

Mrs. Coshow was a daughter of the late Thomas Kay and Anne Kay, Oregon pioneers. She was a sister of State Treasurer Thomas B. Kay of Salem, Mrs. C. P. Bishop of Salem, Mrs. C. T. Roberts of Hood River and Mrs. Bertha Kay Fisher of Portland. She is survived by three daughters, Mrs. K. J. Pickens of Salem, Mrs. John McClintock of Lebanon and Mrs. Dale Thompson of Portland.

Mrs. Coshow was born at Ellendale, Polk county, but with her brothers and sisters was reared at Brownsville, Linn county. After her marriage to Judge Coshow she lived many years at Roseburg where she was prominent in social and fraternal circles. When Judge Coshow was appointed to the supreme bench about two years ago by Governor Pierce, she came with him to Salem.

The stroke that caused Mrs. Coshow's death came early this morning while she was in apparently good health. She had suffered two previous strokes many months ago, and for the last 10 months had been improving in health. Of late she had been able to go about without inconvenience.

### NEW OAKRIDGE ROAD TO START

Work on the Willamette highway in the Lowell district will probably be started this year and it is hoped that operations will continue through next winter, according to P. M. Morse, county engineer, who was at Portland yesterday to confer with officials of the bureau of public roads in regard to the proposed improvement.

It is planned to start a crew to run lines in the near future according to present arrangements being made by the bureau, the engineer states.

Work has been started on the Cerro Gordo road at Row river, the engineer said. Stakes are being set out for the Ferguson road improvement. This work is near finished between Ferguson and the Turnbull road. About one and one-half miles will be improved, the engineer said.

Clinton Hurd, county commissioner, and Raymond Walsh, engineer of the state highway department, are in the Blachly district today to inspect the road work under way there by the state and county.
